Speculator Makes Fortune in Cotton

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 16.—(AP)—There's no secret to making \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000 in cotton—just buy the market and watch the staple go up 1200 points.

That advice comes straight, in a copyrighted interview with the New Orleans States, from Tom Jordan, whose associates in the New Orleans cotton exchange call him one of the most important individual traders in the world cotton market.

The States quoted his own story of his success, beginning in 1941: "I went to the bank and borrowed \$300 to pay my taxes. After I obtained the loan I spent the evening at Southport (a gambling section near New Orleans) and left the tables with a little over \$1400 profit.

"I drew the other \$300 as an advance on my salary, giving me \$2000. I went into the market immediately and was busy that

month and the next—February—buying carefully. By May I had liquidated for something over \$1,000,000."

Jordan says he is confident cotton "eventually" will go to 60 cents a pound before world production catches up with the demand.

That's the conviction on which he banked, and he said he watched without surprise the 1200 point rise in the past eight months—from about 24 to the current 36 cents.
