

Rainbows Win Final Game in Playoff, 3 to 0

Monarchs Held to 4 Hits By Sanstead; Winners to Battle Cottage Grove

The Rainbow Grill softball team will represent Roseburg in the District No. 15 eliminations, preceding semi-finals of the state championship series. The Rainbows won the entry Thursday night as the result of a 3-to-0 shut-out of the Monarchs, City League champions, in the third of their three-game series, each team having previously won a game.

The Rainbows will travel to Cottage Grove tonight to play the first of the three district games. The second game will be played in Roseburg at 8:30 P.M. Tuesday. If a third game is necessary, the location and time will be determined by the flip of a coin.

Sanstead Hurls 4-Hitter Pitching superb ball for the Rainbows, Sanstead allowed the Monarchs only four hits, scattered over as many innings. He was never seriously threatened until in the first of the seventh when, trailing by three runs, the Monarchs made a desperate attempt to get back into the ball game.

Virgil Sanders leaped a walk out of Sanstead to lead off the seventh inning for the Monarchs, but was doubled at second when Bill Scherner laid down a bunt. Paul Morgan, manager, went in as a pinch hitter for Laurence, pitcher, and his hard grounder to first base was juggled by Loomis, putting two runners on base with one out. Scherner was forced at third when Hill's grounder was fielded by Pitcher Sanstead, and Debernardi's running catch of Fred Scherner's short line drive into center field ended the rally and the ball game.

Sanstead turned in six strikeouts and issued only two walks. He received excellent support in the field.

Story of the Scoring The Rainbows gained their first run in the fourth inning, after both teams had played three innings of airtight ball.

Loomis popped a humpbacked liner into short right field, the ball bouncing off the fingertips of Fielder Glenz, attempting a shoestring catch. The ball got away from the fielders and Loomis went to third. Debernardi rapped out a solid single into short left center to put the Rainbows into the scoring column.

Two runs were chalked up in the sixth, Sanstead opening the inning with a single, advancing on a hit by Wimberly. Sanstead scored on a hard two-base clout by Shaprow. Wimberly going to third, Loomis was called out when struck by the ball while attempting a squeeze bunt down the first base line. Debernardi came through with his second single in a row, scoring Wimberly. Shaprow was thrown out at the plate after Baughman had walked, Dominico being safe at first on the fielder's choice. Boucek flied out to end the inning. The type of defensive play exhibited by both teams was shown by the fact that the Rainbows secured only two runs despite four hits and a walk in their big sixth inning.

Pinto vs. Gray, Hager vs. McEuin On Saturday Card

Jack Pinto's jaw is still puffed up like a balloon, but his physician has informed him there is no fracture in the injury received here last Saturday night at the hands of Karl Gray. So, against doctor's orders, he will be at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night for his challenge match against the Wisconsin slugger, who downed Jack in the finals of a "battle royal" last week.

Pinto informed Matchmaker Don Owen that he would be in top condition by Saturday—that some of the swelling has already gone down and that the "jaw" will be okay regardless of what the medics say.

The veteran Gray, who once held the world junior heavyweight title before he entered the army some five years ago, was supposed to depend on a Duesette-like full-Nelson for his victories. Last Saturday, with several hundred dollars on the block, he resorted to fisticuffs to cop the top prize over Pinto. That's how the Californian's jaw was injured and resulted in his challenge of the highly-touted Wisconsin matman.

Gray accepted the challenge and the terms, which call for the winner to collect the entire purse. The skirmish is almost certain to turn into a Donnybrook.

Hager vs. McEuin Just as interesting and probably involving more wrestling will be the semi-final attraction between popular Tex Hager and kidney-punching Billy McEuin. The two light-heavyweights are "natural" opponents. Hager a fine scientific matman and McEuin an out-and-out villain.

Hager will hold the edge in speed and agility and will be the popular choice of Douglas county fans. McEuin, who holds the southwestern light-heavy title, will have a margin in experience, strength and aggressiveness. The match may turn into a "show stealer."

A three-round boxing exhibition is being planned as the opening event, starting at 8:30 p. m. Elton Owen will referee all three matches.

Goal of 100,000 Men Neared by Marine Corps

The Marine Corps is approaching its authorized peacetime strength, and young men interested in joining are advised to take stock in that direction at once, according to announcement from the Eugene Marine Corps recruiting station.

The corps lacks only 18,000 of its 100,000 strength, and the quota is expected to be filled within the next six or eight weeks, recruiters say. The Portland recruiting district, of which Eugene is a part, will need only 230 men in the next eight weeks.

Until the expiration of the GI Bill of Rights October 1, new enlistees will be eligible for three years of college after completion of a two-year enlistment.

A three or four-year enlistment makes them eligible for four years of college training. Men still are being accepted by the Marines for two, three or four-year enlistment in general duty, but for aviation duty, the period is for three or four years only.

Cotton Clothing Ceilings Boosted; Cherries Freed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15. —(AP)—OPA yesterday announced higher ceiling prices for cotton clothing made from finer grade textiles.

It estimated the retail increases from five to seven per cent on the clothing affected.

The agency disclosed a week ago that prices will go up 6 to 8 per cent on cotton garments made from basic grade textiles.

In each case the forthcoming clothing increases will result from price hikes for cotton textiles required by the new price control law.

OPA authorized an average increase of 13 per cent in mill ceilings for cotton textiles made from fine, or combed, yarns. The price boost is retroactive to August 5.

Mill increases announced last week for basic, or carded, yarn textiles averaged 16 per cent.

OPA said that both basic and finer grades of textiles are used in the same types of cotton garments. The only difference is that prices run higher on clothing made from finer grade textiles.

Under the new price control act, textile ceilings must be based on the market cost of raw cotton, rather than on the parity price. In addition, ceilings must be based on 1939-41 industry earnings. The base period under the old law was 1936-39.

In another action the OPA removed price controls on processed cherries.

This eliminates ceilings on canned, frozen, brined, maraschino and glazed cherries, as well as on preserves, jellies and fountain fruits made from cherries.

OPA said ceilings are being discontinued on these items because "they do not enter significantly into the cost of living or business costs."

Supt. Elliott to Attend Teachers Assn. Meeting

Superintendent of Schools Paul S. Elliott will go to Portland tomorrow to attend a two-day committee meeting of the State Education Association to discuss teachers' dues and memberships, he said this week.

Monday he will attend a meeting of school superintendents from throughout the state, called at Salem by Rex Putnam, state superintendent of public instruction.

Elliott plans to return to Roseburg Monday night to attend a session of the local school board. He is not sure whether he will return to Salem Tuesday for the final meetings called by Putnam.
