Farm Income Not on Par With High Wage Levels

SPOKANE, Aug. 19. —(AP)—While prices for farm products are now at the highest level in history, I. W. Duggan, Washington, D. C., governor of the Farm Credit Administration, says "the farmer has not prospered out of proportion to other groups."

"If farm prices had been correspondingly increased with wages," said Duggan, "butter would be selling for \$1.27 a pound on the farm, hogs at 36½ cents on the farm and most other products in proportion."

The FCA governor said "the average income of the individual farm worker, which includes the farmer, for last year was \$1,568. This includes the food he consumes and a deduction for the

housing he occupies. The average income of the industrial worker was \$3,250."

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
