

## Giant Cedars In Idaho Grove Rival Famed Redwoods

SANDPOINT, Idaho — Few people of Idaho know it but hidden away in forests of the state's panhandle are giant cedar trees which rival California's great redwoods in size and age—trees that were seedlings when ancient Greece was at the height of its power and glory.

The redwoods are older and larger, but the cedars are lusty competitors ranging up to 12 feet in diameter and to 150 feet in height.

The U. S. Forest Service gave recognition to the antiquity of the Idaho trees by setting aside one grove as the Roosevelt Grove of Ancient Cedars.

**Many Centuries Old**  
The forest veterans were first studied by foresters in 1919. They determined that many of the trees were 2,000 years old, and some probably more than 3,000 years.

The forest service studies indicated the cedars were already giants when the pilgrims landed in America. The trees have taken 340 years—since 1606—to put on the last eight inches in diameter. They have added only four inches in the last 210 years, or since about the time Georgia was settled.

Several groves of the forest plants have been located in the Granite Creek area on the west side of Idaho's Priest Lake. In the grove set aside by the Forest Service, easily reached by road, nature seems to have created its own natural park.

The trees, ranging from four to 12 feet in diameter, are fairly evenly spaced, giving each one ample room for development. The grove stands on a ledge through which the north fork of Granite Creek has slowly cut its channel, forming a series of cataracts and falls.

for army service completed in 1889.

The check, just delivered, represented travel pay from Manila, where he was discharged in 1899, to Portland, where he had enlisted. The payment was made under a 1940 law authorizing travel pay for Spanish-American war veterans.

## Dividend Declared by American Telephone Co.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21. (AP)—Directors of American Telephone & Telegraph Co. today voted the usual quarterly dividend of \$2.25 a share on common stock payable Oct. 15 to holders of record Sept. 13.

The dividend involves payment of approximately \$45,866,250 to about 685,000 stockholders. The directors also adopted proposals calling for a new issue of \$351,000,000 of convertible debentures and an increase in the authorized capital stock from 25,000,000 to 35,000,000 shares.

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## Grain Use Limits May Be Relaxed

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22. (AP)—Secretary Anderson said yesterday the Agriculture Department is studying the possibility of relaxing limitations on use of grain in making beer, whiskey, flour and livestock feed.

A review of the restrictive orders is under way, he told a news conference. In view of the prospective bumper grain crop.

These restrictions limit distribution of flour, require a high wheat flour extraction rate which produces darker bread, limit use of wheat in feeds and prohibit use of wheat in making whiskey and beer.

The wheat restrictions were established last winter, when grain supplies were scarce and this country was having difficulty getting enough to meet its pledges of aid to hungry areas abroad.

The department has earmarked 250,000,000 bushels of this year's wheat supply for export. Anderson said that if it were known that shortage areas would require no more than that amount, it would be possible to remove most, if not all, of the restrictions on domestic use of grains.

"My guess is," he added, "that restrictions on the use of wheat will not be quickly abandoned because of foreign needs."

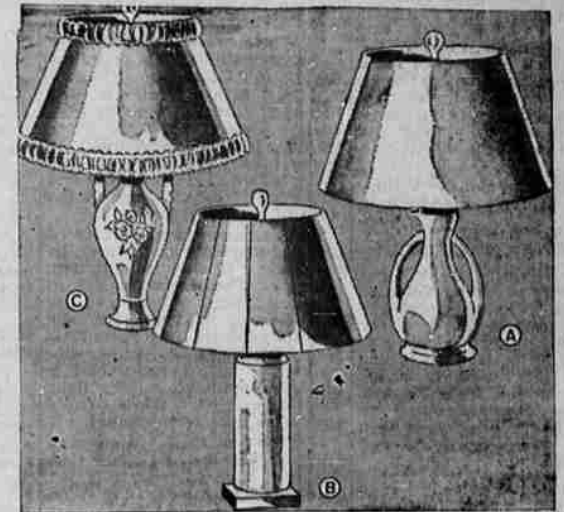

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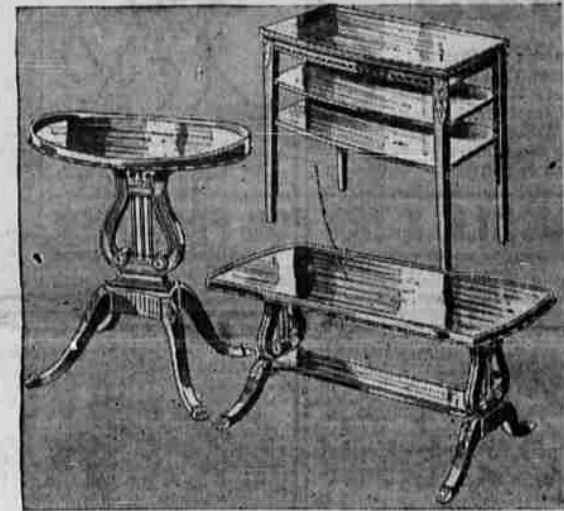

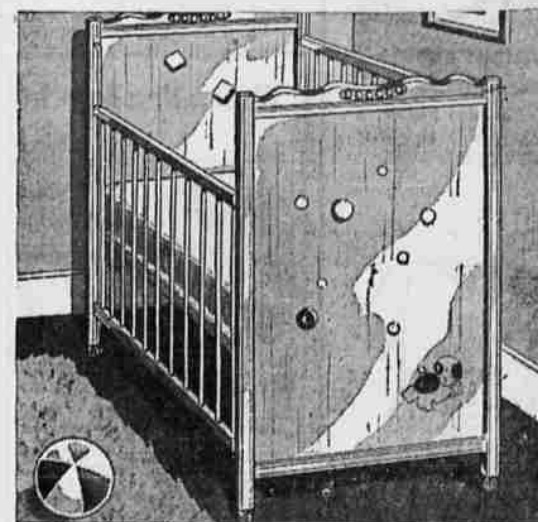
