No Further Diversion of Box Cars, ODT Head Says

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(P)—ODT Director J. Monroe Johnson today turned down appeals to divert additional box cars and railroad equipment to the movements of grain and grain products.

The head of the ODT made the announcement in response to appeals for the routing of more cars to the midwestern, western and northwestern corn and wheat areas.

Johnson said in a statement that "every effort is being made by the ODT and the railroads to move grain already harvested to elevators and terminal markets. About 1,000 box cars per day are being routed from all parts of the United States through western gateways."

Any further diversion, Johnson said, "would have disruptive effects on various parts of the nation's economy."

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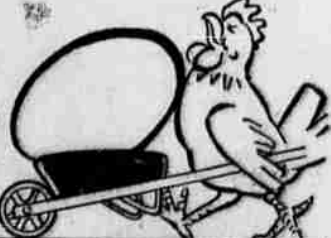
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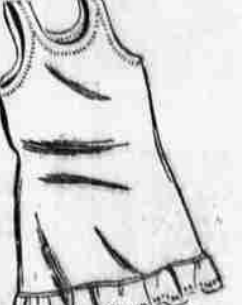
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
