## Marries at Candlelight Ceremony

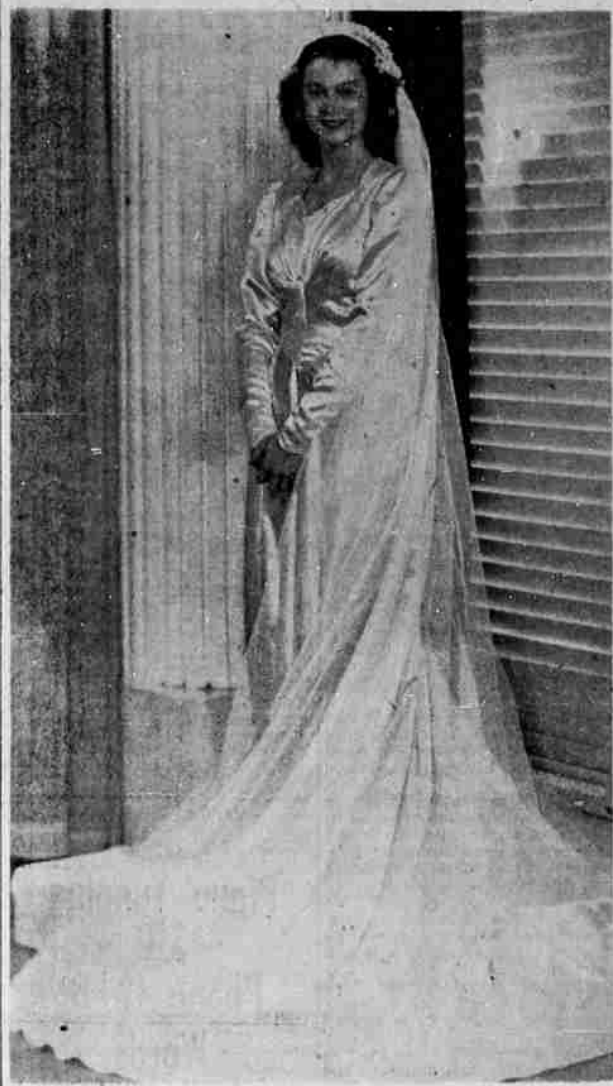
