

Heavy Electrical Storm Halts Roseburg Service

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Reports of fires from their lookouts. The radio antenna at the association's headquarters was struck twice by lightning.

Minor damage resulted at the Archie Elliott home, 1022 W. Second St., Roseburg, early today when lightning caused a short circuit in the wiring system. The basement was filled with smoke, but little damage resulted.

Reports from Canyonville said that electrical service there was interrupted by lightning.

In Roseburg, the thunder and lightning was accompanied by hail, which turned to rain, at 8:30. Pools of thunder continued intermittently all morning.

Scattered Fires Reported
Several scattered lightning

fires and interrupted communications were reported later this morning by the Douglas Forest Protective Association. There were four or five lightning strikes at Mt. Scott on the North Umpqua. Both telephones at the lookout station were burned out. Smoldering fires were started on the Calapooia side of Mt. Scott. Other fires were started in logging slash at Red Hill near Yoncalla, at Camas Valley, and two near Roseburg, on the Rifle Range Road and on Deer Creek.

A check by Ray B. Hampton, in charge of fire control for the Umpqua National Forest, with his lookouts, revealed that today's thunder and lightning storm had not reached the forest boundaries, but was confined largely to the South Umpqua Valley. "We don't mind a wet storm like this," Hampton said.

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any "purely pressure drives," he asserted, and the ceilings will be held at "firm and equitable" levels.

Other officials reported that OPA's staff of meat inspectors is being increased well above its June 30 strength of 800 men.

More Ceilings Boosted

More than a score of ceiling increases were ordered by OPA yesterday, the 30th day since congress restored the agency to life. Price boosts for trucks, tires, cotton goods, fats and oils, tuna fish, warm air furnaces, metals and building materials—most of them required by the new price control law—poured out from morning until night.

New ceilings generally higher than the June 30 level were fixed for margarine and other fats and oils.

The agency also put into effect a previously announced increase of about 7 cents a hundred pounds in millers' ceilings for flour. Retail flour prices will not be raised, OPA said.

Complying with a decree of the decontrol board for restoration of ceilings on fats and oils, OPA said consumer sized packages of various salad and cooking oils and products made with oil will be increased about 1 cent over June 30 prices, effective September 9.

For example, margarine and shortening will be increased 1 cent a pound, OPA said.

Auto Prices May Soar

As a climax, OPA opened the door for further price increases on new automobiles, but not in a way likely to please automobile dealers.

Porter rejected a proposed general 3 per cent increase, designed to cover handling charges on new cars. It was requested by dealers under the price law amendment which guarantees prewar profit margins. The increases would have come on top of a 7.3 per cent boost granted two weeks ago.

Instead, Porter offered individual increases to any dealer who can show that he charged substantially more before the war for "preparing and conditioning" automobiles, than he is getting now.

The six-foot, 210-pound mother was well, too, but a bit worried about all that impending washing. "I used to think one was a lot of work," she said, "and now look what I got!"

The smallest baby, Jessie May, was being nursed by her mother. Josephine, Joe, and Jerry were drinking formula.

Texas Voters Nominating Governor, 5 Congressmen

DALLAS, Tex., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Texas will nominate a governor, three other state officials and five United States representatives today in the run-off Democratic party primary.

Democratic nomination is tantamount to election in Texas. Chief state interest is in the governor's race, with Benford H. Jester, present railroad commissioner; and Dr. Homer P. Rainey, ousted former president of the University of Texas, in the runoff.

The only early trend in the voting came from Houston. The Houston Chronicle in an unofficial tabulation of 3,650 votes from 50 of Harris county's 156 precincts gave Jester 1,908 votes and Rainey 1,149.

Rep. Joseph J. Mansfield, is in a close race with L. J. Sulak, publisher and state senator.

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Father, Four Sons Drop From Sight

STAMFORD, Conn., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Abraham Kohn, 45, a Stamford auditor, his four sons, aged six to 14, and a three-year-old Chinese boy have disappeared from Kohn's home here, leaving as the only clue to their whereabouts a row boat found drifting in Long Island sound about a quarter of a mile off a breakwater at Mamaroneck, N. Y.

The boat was dry and empty save for the oars and a pair of child's shoes when it was found last evening.

Kohn, Detective John McInerney of the Stamford police reported, left behind a homemade phonograph record addressed to his wife which said:

"This is three weeks for me since I didn't see you. I am crying all day long. . . . Goodbye, sweetheart. I am telling you again, goodbye, sweetheart." McInerney quoted Kohn's sister, Mrs. Minnie Gordon, as saying Mrs. Kohn left home upon the advice of a physician who was treating her after she suffered a nervous breakdown.

Those who left here with Kohn yesterday, ostensibly to go fishing, were his sons, Leonard, 14, Samuel, 12, Robert, 9, and Louis, and Jim Sing, Jr., 3, son of a Stamford laundryman.

'Regrettable' Tito Says

Verification that the five died in the Aug. 19 crash had been foreshadowed by a note to Ambassador Patterson from Tito saying there were no survivors. Tito described the incident as "regrettable" but offered no apology. He said the Yugoslavs "were not responsible."

In a written reply to newspaper correspondents' questions, the Yugoslav chief of state declared unauthorized flights over Yugoslavia were for the purpose of "reconnoitering those regions which our military units are occupying in Zone 'B' and the rest of the frontier zone."

Zone "B" is the eastern part of Venezia Giulia, disputed by Italy and Yugoslavia.

The question which the Yugoslav premier was answering was: "Do you believe the infringement of Yugoslav frontiers to be deliberate, and, if so, for what purpose?"

Continuing his answer to that question, Tito said: "Furthermore, the systematic flying over our territory in upper Slovenia by Allied transport and passenger planes has not been accidental error from routes, or on account of weather, but intentional and arbitrary acts by Allied pilots who do not respect our sovereignty and who fly over our territory without permission in order to shorten the way, as they themselves state."

Tito accused American military authorities of attempting to intimidate his followers and encourage his erstwhile opponents. Heavily armed craft such as Flying Fortresses were being employed to these ends, he said.

There was no indication in Belgrade of any tension between Yugoslavia and the United States. Newspapers carried brief accounts of developments, but none spoke of the American note as an ultimatum.

Reports from outside Yugoslavia that had rejected the American note were not borne out here.

Authorities noted the Yugoslav announcement said the American ultimatum had been "set aside" as being now irrelevant and no longer applicable. "Set aside" was first translated as "rejected."

Conspiracy Charged to Fishermen's Union

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Local 36 of the CIO International Fishermen and Allied Workers of America and 15 of its officers and members were indicted by the federal grand jury yesterday on charges of conspiracy to fix prices of fresh fish brought into southern California ports.

The indictment, declaring the members of the union are not laborers in the ordinary sense, but independent business men who sell their catches independently, charged that the alleged conspiracy conspired California and six other western states from receiving their normal supply of fresh fish.

Winch, Business Head Of Oregon Journal, Dies

PORTLAND, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Simeon R. Winch, business manager of the Oregon Journal since 1921, died last night at the age of 58.

Winch, also vice-president of the newspaper, had been ill two months.

Great-grandson of Dr. John McLoughlin, Hudson's Bay Company factor and famed northwest pioneer, Winch graduated from Princeton university in 1911 and later studied law at Harvard.

Mrs. Millie Ingram Dies in California

Mrs. Millie E. Ingram, 71, former Roseburg resident, succumbed to a heart attack at her home in Blacksburg, Calif., August 13, just as her brother, who had been visiting her for a few days, bade her farewell and drove off in his automobile for home.

Mrs. Ingram dropped into a faint from which she never recovered. It was impossible to attract the attention of her brother, Orvil Whitsett, as he drove away toward his home at Weed, Calif.

Mrs. Ingram was born May 5, 1875, in Roseburg. She and her husband, the late Edward Ingram, moved to Blacksburg 15 years ago. He was killed in an accident two years ago.

Mrs. Ingram is survived by her daughter, Miss Etta Ingram of Blacksburg; a son, Lee Ingram of Quincy, Calif., and her brother.

Marines Warned By Chinese Reds

HSIANGCHO, China, Aug. 24.—(AP)—A demand that U. S. marines notify Chinese Communists before moving troops through Red-held areas came today from a Communist army officer who warned that marine vehicles would be stopped and searched.

Wang Chih-Tao, vice commander of the Communists' 14th military district, issued the warning. Forces under his command attacked a marine convoy July 29 near Anping, taking the lives of four marines and wounding 11.

Wang appeared before a truce headquarters team investigating the Anping incident. He listed "belligerent acts of U. S. forces against Communists in my area" and denied that Communists had ever taken any "belligerent actions towards marines."

The Communist said government troops were instigating clashes between marines and Communists, adding:

"Step by step the Kuomintang (government party) is getting Americans into China's civil war."

Shirley Temple's Drink In Film Stir Protest

CHICAGO, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Mrs. D. Leigh Colvin, president of the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, yesterday urged KO Radio Pictures, Inc., to cut a scene in the unreleased motion picture "The Bachelor and the Bobby Soxer," showing Shirley Temple taking a drink.

The scene, announced generally by columnists, would be a disservice to American youth, Mrs. Colvin said in a statement. "Shirley is idolized by youngsters generally and unthinking teenagers are certain to be caused to protest. If Shirley Temple drinks, why can't I?"

Mrs. Colvin said Miss Temple and her mother have, in the past, opposed the use of alcoholic drinks in her pictures.

"It would be unfortunate were this restriction lifted for merely one drink," she declared. "Shirley's responsibility . . . to set a good example for American youth is great."

16 Indicted as Sequel To Racial Disorders

ATHENS, Ala., Aug. 24.—(AP)—Sixteen persons were indicted yesterday by a special Limestone County grand jury at the conclusion of its investigation of racial disorders here Aug. 10.

Frank P. Turner, jury foreman, said 77 witnesses were heard during the five-day inquiry. He added that testimony "covered all phases" of the disturbance, which followed an altercation between a Negro and two white men.

Names and specific charges against those indicted were withheld pending the serving of the warrants. Ten persons were arrested on unlawful assembly charges before the grand jury was convened. County authorities said these charges would be dropped if the grand jury preferred more serious charges.
