

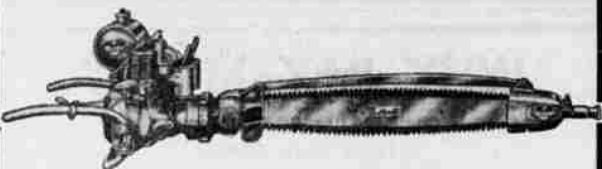

ministry of information made new accusations against aircraft of Britain and the United States yesterday.

The ministry asserted that 110 "Anglo-American military planes" violated Yugoslav territory between August 10—the day after the first U. S. transport was shot down—and August 20.

Tito declared previously that the purpose of the flights was "reconnoitering" regions occupied by military units.

Official and semi-official newspapers in Belgrade called the incidents part of a planned campaign which the western powers intended to use to discredit Yugoslavia at the Paris peace conference.

Borba, official organ of the Communist party, carried a headline: "Invented campaign against Yugoslavia." It accused the foreign press "as if by command" of starting a campaign "portraying Yugoslavia as the guilty one and as if the Soviet Union is instigating her actions."

"This campaign has reached such proportions that it has forced the Paris peace conference into the shadows," Borba said. "The campaign is aimed not only at Yugoslavia, but simultaneously it is an attempt to poison the international situation."

Glas, a so-called "voice of the people's front of Serbia," headed its article "Campaign of Lies and Slander." Politica, independent daily, carried a headline, "Campaign Against Our Country and the Truth About the Forced Landings of American Planes."

(Turkey, meanwhile, demanded that Yugoslavia inform her immediately of the condition of Turkish Capt. Iskan Unesen, who was wounded in the plane forced down August 9, reliable sources in Istanbul said. The other nine occupants of that plane, all of whom were uninjured, have been released by the Yugoslavs.)

John W. Newland, Former Deputy Assessor, Passes

John Wesley Newland died at his home on Umpqua Avenue, West Roseburg, Sunday after a long period of ill health. He was 74 years old.

He was the son of Thomas Wilson Newland and Anna Flook Newland of prominent early-day pioneer families.

Mr. Newland was born at Tenmile, February 24, 1872. He leaves his widow, Mrs. Arilla M. Newland, and daughter, Mrs. Carmel C. Scott, the latter employed at the United States National Bank, Roseburg branch. He also leaves seven sisters: Mrs. Winnie Menegat, Lakeside, Oregon; Mrs. May Carnes, Mrs. Beatrice Howard, and Mrs. Bessie Newland, all of Baker, Oregon; Mrs. Lottie Siegel of Tenmile; Mrs. Grace Barnes and Mrs. Bell Clark of Dillard.

Mr. Newland served in various capacities during his life, being employed for many years as deputy assessor during the terms of office of George W. Staley and Frank L. Calkins. He also was deputy stock inspector, and was employed by the Douglas County fire patrol for many years as a fire warden and forest patrolman, and in later years as foreman for the H. S. Gile and Co. prune packers.

Funeral services will be held at 2 P. M. at Tenmile, Wednesday. Arrangements are in charge of the Douglas Funeral Home.

other lightning fires to battle, Nelson said. The fire is near the boundary between the two agencies.

The fire is raging through the snags of the old burn, which dates from a fire there in 1910, Nelson said, and jumping from the snags to new growth timber, 20 to 30 feet high.

"This is the hardest type of fire to fight," he commented. Fire fighting crews are being supplied by four strings of mules from the Willamette Remount Station on the Willamette National Forest, and from Tiller Ranger Station on the South Umpqua District.

There has been no airplane dropping of men or supplies yet, Nelson said. A camp to be supplied from the air may be established today.

Loggers Aid Battle
 Logging companies are co-operating by assigning their crews to the fire fighting. Roseburg Lumber Company men are aiding the Douglas Forest Protective Association crews at Scaredman Camp, while other crews from the Fir Manufacturing Company, Mist Logging Company, Eugene Plywood Company, Paris Logging Company, and the Douglas County Lumber Company are aiding the Forest Service.

In addition, 25 men from the Forest Service blaster rust control camp on the Rogue River National Forest and a Public Roads Administration survey crew are also fighting the fire.

Saturday's lightning storm resulted in 10 small fires on the Bohemia District of the Umpqua Forest, four on the Diamond Lake District, four on the North Umpqua District, and one on the South Umpqua District. All are under control except the Rock Creek blaze.

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 26.—(AP)—All forest fires on state and private lands in Oregon are well under control, the State Forestry Department said today.

The only fires reported are a few small lightning-set blazes in Douglas County, and two small fires in Lane County west of Eugene.

Today's high fog and high humidity reduced the fire hazard greatly, but the forecast is for increasing fire hazard, with higher temperatures and low humidity.

A 60-acre fire on the timbered slopes of Mount Hood has been circled and foresters regretted little chance the blaze will break out again.

Lightning fires in eastern Oregon mountains and the southern range of the Cascades were reported yesterday after heavy storms, but foresters reported most of the fires were small and apparently not spreading.

BELLINGHAM, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Twenty-two new fires were reported burning this morning in the Mount Baker forest following a lightning storm last night, just as fire bosses were beginning to report that they were "on top" of last week's 54 blazes.

A backfire was started last night by the 225 men fighting the 800-acre Silesia creek fire on the Canadian border. Forest officials hoped to prevent its spread into valuable timber.

American Press Flayed
 Pravda said that following the U. S. note, demanding the release within 48 hours of interned airplane passengers, the "American press, as if under a band leader's baton, raised a frenzied campaign against Yugoslavia with demands for 'most decisive' action against an allied country guilty only in that it had nerve to stand up for its legal rights."

Yakov Viktorov, author of the article, also saw British-American teamwork operating in the dispatch of a note by Britain to Poland regarding the forthcoming elections at approximately the same time the United States forwarded her ultimatum to Yugoslavia.

(Meanwhile the Moscow radio in a broadcast recorded in London, asserted that British-American prestige "bolstered up the sham elections" that placed the royalists in power in Greece and that there was "no doubt at all that Washington sees eye to eye with London in everything relating to Greece.")

(The broadcast came after the Russian Ukraine announced it was filing a complaint with the United Nations Security Council against Greece.)

Surviving are his wife; his mother, Mrs. Myrtle P. Utzman, Los Angeles; two sons, Charles and Stanley; a brother, Kenneth Utzman, Bridgeport, Calif.; a sister, Miss Willis Utzman, Los Angeles; and half sister, Mrs. Patricia Dill, Pasadena, Calif.
