One Strike Ended On Great Lakes

DETROIT, Aug. 23. —(AP)—The CIO National Maritime union directed its members to return to work aboard five vessels of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana today following ratification of an agreement calling for a work week of 48 hours at sea and 44 hours in port.

Joseph Curran, NMU president, said the agreement had been ratified by a majority of the 2,500 union members in 18 great lakes ports.

A similar agreement was reached with Bethlehem Transportation Company today and will be submitted to the union membership for ratification, Curran said. He added that the NMU is "in consultation with" other strike-bound lake operators but declined to name them.

The agreement with Bethlehem came as the NMU strike entered its ninth day. A majority of Bethlehem employees must ratify the agreement before it becomes effective.

The NMU stood by its claim of 132 vessels idle as a result of the strike. The Lake Carriers Association at Cleveland contends that summer are returning to struck vessels at a faster rate than they walked off.

Playmate's Injured Foot Saved by Boy's Action

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 26. —(AP)—Six-year-old Randy Tays, who acted like a man in a king-size emergency, learned happily today that doctors had saved the left foot of a five-year-old playmate after Randy carried him in his arms a quarter of a mile when a freight train crushed the lad's foot.

Randy and John Joseph Filzinger, Jr., were hunting pigeons with their sling-shots yesterday when the adventurous younger boy decided he would ride a few blocks on a slow-moving train. He missed his jump for a freight car ladder and fell under the wheels.

After the white-faced Randy struggled home with his injured playmate, physicians saved all but two of the boy's toes. They said Randy's prompt action probably prevented more severe shock and loss of blood.

Public Accountants Open Office in San Francisco

Opening of a San Francisco office under direction of the senior partner of the firm, is announced today by Stearns, Flynn, and Co., certified public accountants.

The new office will be under the direction of Russell M. Stearns, who has been with the main office at Portland. Opening of the San Francisco branch is part of an expansion program which is expected to include other coast cities in the near future.

At present, only the Roseburg office is maintained outside of Portland. David McCarroll is

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employed here as office manager. He is assisted by John Dingley and William L. Stradley, and by Mrs. Effie Hungerford, secretary. The Roseburg office is located in the Pacific Building.

Terminal Pay for Vets Explained

Former service men who had unused furlough time when discharged from the armed forces, may claim their furlough payments on forms which local veterans' organizations will supply, it was announced by Erwin Short, adjutant of Umpqua Post, No. 16, American Legion.

Compensation for unused furloughs up to 30 days a year was authorized at the close of the recent session of Congress, and signed by President Truman.

The application forms for claiming furlough compensation may be obtained at any post office, Short announced. For the convenience of veterans and to relieve the post office, local veterans' groups also are distributing the application forms.

The unused leave for former enlisted men will be settled and compensated for on the base pay plus longevity of the individual at the time of his discharge as an enlisted person. All former enlisted personnel will be entitled to 70 cents a day subsistence allowance for the time of unused leave, and those in the first three grades will receive an additional \$1.25 a day for quarters.

Whenever the total amount due is less than \$50, payment will be made entirely by check. When the payment is \$50 or more, payment will be made by United States bond to the highest multiple of \$25 and the remainder by check.

Double Murder, Suicide Seen in Family Tragedy

STERLING, Colo., Aug. 26. —(AP)—A theory of double murder and suicide was advanced by Deputy Coroner Robert M. Jackson Saturday in the deaths of Charles D. Milford, 54-year-old sugar mill official; his wife, Ethel, 50, and their 15-year-old daughter, Ruth.

Milford's pajama-clad body was found Friday night, slumped over the wheel of the family car in the garage, and the bodies of his wife and daughter were discovered in blood-stained bedrooms.

The girl had been struck in the back of the head, Jackson said, and the older woman had apparently been strangled, then her throat slashed.
