Roseburg-Medford Game Today Bears On Playoff Card

Baseball fans in Medford today will get a look at the long-awaited Roseburg-Medford League game, which H. W. Gray, league president, ordered played since Grants Pass and Ashland are tied for third place in Southern Oregon League standings.

If Medford wins tonight, it will mean a three-way tie between the Craters, the Cavemen and Ashland. If Roseburg wins, Medford will be definitely out of the Shaughnessy playoffs, which open in Roseburg Sunday, September 1.

Roseburg and Medford were rained out in their earlier, scheduled game, which should have been played June 23.

Representatives of the eight teams will meet in Medford tonight to decide what to do if Medford wins. Officers will be elected for next year's season and discussion of revamping the league set-up also will take place.

Medford and Roseburg stand even in play this season, with Medford winning under the lights earlier in the year by a 6-4 count and Roseburg taking a league clash on their own diamond, 6-0. Being used to playing under the arcs makes the Craters the favorites, although Roseburg has one of the hardest-hitting clubs in the league.

Gray was making plans to fly Elmer Hill, pitcher and left fielder, to Medford tonight to enable him to play in the game. Hill has a job which will keep him from going down with the team today. Bud Sporer is another hurler who will be a challenge to the Craters.

The Shaughnessy playoffs will be in Roseburg Sunday, September 1, and Sunday, September 8. Monday, September 2, at 2 o'clock the Umpqua Chiefs will meet the Guistina Reds of Eugene, a team in the Cascade League, Gray announced.

Icel Ervin Brantley, 35, well known merchant of Canyonville, died suddenly last night at the Myrtle Creek Hospital. He was born April 28, 1911, in Russell, Kansas, and came to Canyonville three years ago, establishing a produce house there.

Surviving are his wife, Betty; a son, Richard, both of Canyonville; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe Brantley of Medford; four brothers and three sisters.

Late G. W. Young Roseburg Resident For 33 Years

George W. Young, 81, well-known retired Roseburg businessman, died Tuesday morning at his home at 231 East Lane Street. He had been in ill health for more than a year.

Mr. Young was born June 13, 1865, at Temple, Maine. He was the only son of Charles W. and Marinda T. Young.

On October 2, 1889, he was married to Mary A. Snow at Mars Hill, Maine. The couple had three children, Roy O., Faith E., and Howard A. Young.

While in Maine, Mr. Young engaged in the mercantile business, jewelry trade, and served as a doctor of optometry. In 1912, Mr. Young and his family moved from Maine to Southern California, where they resided for a short time.

He came to Roseburg in 1913 and purchased the W. E. Clingeneel Jewelry store at 112 N. Jackson Street, where he engaged in business with D. B. Bubar. In 1916, he sold his interest to the Bubar Brothers.

From 1916 to 1946, Mr. Young was engaged as a partner in the real estate and insurance business on Cass Street under the firm name of G. W. Young & Son and recently sold his interest to his son, Roy.

He was a member of Laurel Lodge, No. 13, A. F. and A. M., and Philetarian Lodge, No. 8, I. O. O. F., of Roseburg, having been a member of both orders for more than 50 years. He was also a member of Roseburg Lodge of Elks.

Mr. Young was a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Roseburg and took an active part in church affairs, having served as a trustee and treasurer. Active in civic affairs, he was a member of the Roseburg city council for several years.

Surviving are his widow, Mary A. Young; two sons, Roy O., and Howard A. Young, and four grandchildren, Virginia, Anita and Randall Young, and Mrs. Faith DeBernardi, all of Roseburg.

a formal charge by the Ukraine against Greece before the United States Security Council, and the forthcoming visit of a U. S. Naval force.

The unexpected announcement of Rodionov's departure was made without any official explanation, but left wing circles said his presence in Greece during Sunday's plebiscite and the almost certain return of the king would be incompatible with the Soviet position of the Greek regime.

U. S. Support Seen
The announcement that the United States was sending the carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt, a cruiser and several destroyers to call at Greek ports was regarded here as a conclusive indication of U. S. support for Greece in the current diplomatic tussle.

Two editors of a Royalist newspaper were convicted last night of publishing what the court termed libellous statements about Russia and Generalissimo Stalin. Both were sentenced to seven months in jail on the charges, which were instituted by the government.

When Marshal Tito summoned Cankar home last week, at the height of the American Yugoslav dispute over the downing of two U. S. planes, Cankar said his return was prompted by Greek monarchist press attacks on Tito and the Yugoslav government. Diplomatic relations between Greece and Yugoslav have not been severed.

The Ukraine has charged Greece before the United Nations Security Council with "endangering peace in the Balkans."
