When canning or freezing fruits use only those that are well-ripened. Because mature fruits are sweeter and lower in acid content, the sugar requirement is greatly reduced.

Honey has the same degree of sweetness per cup as sugar and may be used successfully in canning or freezing fruits. It does,

however, impart a distinct flavor to fruits.

Lumber Production in June Tops May Figure

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Lumber production reached an estimated 3,154,207,000 board feet during June 26 per cent more than May and 15.3 above June of last year, the Civilian Production Administration announced today.

Production during June was exceeded during the last three and one-half years only by August, 1944, when 3,238,665,000 board feet were produced, the agency said.

Production of softwoods totaled 2,223,152,000 board feet in June and hardwood amounted to 931,055,000 board feet.

The agency said largest monthly increases, 21 per cent over May, were noted in Nevada and California. June production was 12.4 per cent above that of the previous month in South Dakota, Wyoming, Utah, Colorado, Arizona and New Mexico.

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Suit Blocks Plan To Increase Grain For Liquor Makers

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The Department of Agriculture agreed yesterday to withhold temporarily an increase of 500,000 bushels of grain allocated to the liquor industry after one distiller filed suit in federal district court alleging the method of allocation is unfair.

The department announced last Friday the September allocation will be 3,000,000 bushels, 500,000 more than August.

Publiker Industry, Inc., of Philadelphia, contractor of about one-fifth of the grain allocated to all distillers in August, filed the suit. It protested that the allocation for September was based on "past or historical" production of each distiller, whereas in August the allocation was based on plant capacity.

Counsel for Publiker said the "historical" method of allocation is unfair to their firm because it was engaged in production of war material during the 1939-41 period on which the allocations were based.

In August, the suit related, Publiker was allocated 20.5 per cent of grain set aside for distillers that month, its "big four" competitors, the suit said, got 33.5 per cent.

Attorneys identified the four as Hiram Walker, Schenley, Seagram and National Distillers.

Girl Cashier Confesses Robbing Firm of \$13,000

CHICAGO, Aug. 26.—(AP)—Police Capt. Daniel Alcorn said today a 16-year-old Shirley Jane Danoski has confessed taking \$13,000 from a wholesale grocery where she was a cashier, spending \$3,000 on new clothes and lavishing \$10,000 on a 17-year-old boy friend.

The girl and her friend, Edward Jennings, Jr., were detained without charge for questioning by the state's attorney's office on a complaint signed by the "robbery owner."

Ahearn reported Miss Danoski had signed a statement in which she said "I wanted to get rich fast, I guess, and he and I both needed a car."

Ahearn said \$1,624 of the missing money had been found in the boy's home, and that the youth had bought a 1946 automobile at \$2,000 above the ceiling price with money given him by his \$30-a-week fiancée at intervals since last May.
