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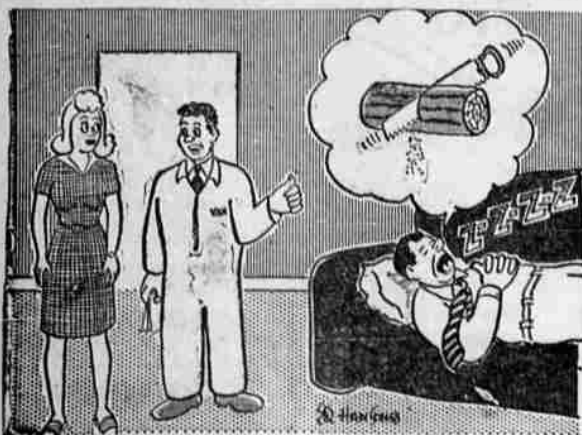

Catholic Missionaries Expelled by Chinese Reds

SHANGHAI, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Father Frederick A. McGuire, head of the Franciscan mission in Shanghai, charged in an interview today that the Chinese communists held areas of Shansi province and had seized mission property.
He estimated mission property worth \$250,000 had been taken over at Shaohsien. The missionaries were not even permitted to take their personal belongings, he added.
Father McGuire said trouble between the communists and the Catholics in Shansi started in 1941 when the missionaries stationed at Tienping were served eviction notices by the Reds, who have them 15 minutes to collect their belongings and clear out.
Two Catholic fathers were later kidnapped and released upon payment of ransom, he related, and on Aug. 19, 1945, the bishop of Tienping was seized and held until he promised to surrender all arms and ammunition which the mission kept as a precaution against bandit attacks.

will cruises of American ships. Halsey's views were expressed in the wake of an exchange of "unofficial" diplomatic rebukes between Soviet-backed Poland and the United States which provided fresh evidence of mounting tension.
At the end of his news conference, dealing with the South American tour, a reporter said: "In view of reported protests that U. S. ships in the Mediterranean constitute a threat to some other nation, do you think we should get our ships out of there to avoid such criticism?"
"No, I do not," Halsey replied. "It's nobody's damn business where we go. We will go anywhere we please."
"Do you mean anywhere in the world—any navigable waters?"
"Not to any foreign country; I don't mean that," Halsey retorted.
"But to any ocean or sea—to any waters not within the legal limit of a country's sovereignty?"
"Yes. Any free water. Anywhere in the world," he declared.

Forest Blaze Still Defies 300 Fighters

Baker fire fighters were barely holding their own today. Last night's storm started 11 new blazes, bringing to 60 the total now burning, officials said.
One fighter — Ellsworth Kelly, believed to be from Endicott, Wash. — was twice injured early this morning. He first suffered a broken leg while fighting the Silesta Creek fire on the Canadian border.
Later, while he was being packed out to Glacier, his horse slipped and fell, breaking the same leg again in two places and possibly injuring Kelly internally, according to a radio message.
Medical supplies were being

dropped in by plane this morning and an ambulance was sent from here to bring Kelly out.
The 1,400-acre Silesta Creek fire and 400-acre Joker Mountain fire in northeastern Whatcom County were "both bad," according to Hugh Ritter, fire dispatcher. Crews were attacking both fires on new fronts in an effort to control them.
Eight more trained mountain "smoke chasers" have joined the fight.

an average of between 2.5 and 3 cents a pound and beef about 6 cents.
OPA Assent Lacking
A department official said he had "no knowledge" that Anderson's action had been approved by the OPA. Officials of both agencies have reported, however, that there was a difference between the two agencies with the OPA opposing increases favored by Anderson.
In taking the initiative to fix the new ceilings, Anderson cited provisions of the new price control law.
He said the act provides that "when the secretary of agriculture determines that maximum prices applicable to any agricultural commodity which is in short supply or impeding the necessary production of such a commodity, he may recommend to the price administrator such adjustments and such maximum prices as the secretary determines to be necessary to attain the necessary production of such a commodity."

Porter had publicly urged that the new price ceilings be rolled back to near June 30 levels.
Initial reaction at OPA was that the proposed ceilings must be accepted although a statement was promised later in the day from the price control agency.
The meat reconrol becomes effective tomorrow midnight on live animals. Once these ceilings are fixed, OPA said it will be easy to determine packer, wholesaler and dealer prices which begin to apply in that order next week.

Sugar Ration Stands

Housewives got a mixture of good and bad news from OPA late yesterday. They were told that the present limit of five pounds of sugar for each ration stamp must continue during the last four months of this year and at least the beginning of next. Spare stamp No. 51 will become valid September 1, but OPA granted a 30-day extension on stamp No. 49 which was to have expired August 31 because many

buyers have been unable to find sugar.
Another staple, canned tomatoes, will soon cost an additional two cents for the standard No. 2 can. OPA said Anderson had allowed an immediate increase of 14 cents on a case of 12 cans to processors and that this would cause the boost on top of the recent two cent increase allowed to offset the end of subsidies.
Most baby and junior foods were freed from price control meanwhile, under an automatic provision of the new law requiring such action when OPA finds supplies adequate. The agency said it expected prices to remain near present ceilings.

Favors Milk, Butter Lids
In New York Porter told a rally of OPA employees that he would "insist" that price lids be restored to milk, butter, and the long list of dairy products.
This is a step only the independent decontrol board can take. It held last week that price rises in milk so far had not been unreasonable, but it promised to keep a close watch on the situation.
Porter said he believes the prices "will get out of hand."
Black pepper is reported to be selling at 60 cents a pound in the open market at New York today following elimination yesterday of the OPA ceiling price of 15 cents a pound.
