

Chiefs Lose to Medford Craters By 5-to-4 Score

Medford's Craters will play Ashland Friday night to decide fourth spot in the Southern Oregon Baseball league, as a result of Medford's 5 to 4 victory over

the Umpqua Chiefs on the Medford diamond Wednesday night. Unaccustomed to playing under lights, it took the Chiefs nine full innings to find the ball, but a sixth-inning rally in the last frame almost dashed Medford's chances to stay in the Shaughnessy playoffs.

A flock of misuses gave the Craters two unearned runs in the first inning. Bud Sporer, Roseburg's ace hurler, held Medford to two hits, which should have given him a shutout, as he allowed only one hit in the fifth and one in the seventh, but wildness and errors made Medford a gift of the game.

Champion singled as the first man up in Medford's three-run half of the seventh inning. Sporer then walked Sutherland and George Gitzel to fill the bases, and Hoffard came through with a hard drive which scored the three runners then on bases.

Debernardi, first baseman, and Sporer shifted places in the eighth inning, Debernardi retiring the Craters in order.

Following eight innings of very weak offensive play, in which they gathered only two hits, the Chiefs came to life in the ninth.

With one out, Virgil Sanders started the rally with a single. Hill and L. Baker rapped out safeties, and V. Baker cracked out a double to produce three runs. OPA Standing Firm on Meat Price Increases

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terday announced a delay until Sunday to permit the agency to complete work on a new set of price tops for packers, wholesalers and retailers reflecting the higher levels ordered by the secretary.

OPA said ceilings still will apply Sunday to slaughterers and packers, on September 5 to wholesalers and on September 9 to the butcher shops.

To complete the program, the

Reconstruction Finance Corporation announced last night that effective Sunday it is restoring the slaughter subsidies which lapsed with price control June 30.

New Boosts Announced

Otherwise the food price picture included increases for prepared pancake and waffle mixes, canned Hawaiian pineapple and pineapple juice, canned salmon, and most syrups.

OPA said the popular 20-ounce sizes of plain pancake and waffle mix as well as buckwheat pancake mix will rise two to three cents because of higher prices on flour and corn meal.

Fancy sliced Hawaiian pineapple will come four cents a No. 21 can. The agency said this resulted from an increase of 13.5 per cent allowed pineapple processors on the entire 1946 Hawaiian crop.

A one-pound can of Alaskan red salmon will cost six cents more while the pink variety goes up four cents. This results from a 12 1/2 per cent increase for salmon canners ordered by Anderson to encourage production.

The retail increase on pineapple will apply on the first shipment that stores receive at the higher price. Although processing of the 1946 Hawaiian pack is about 60 per cent complete, the

increase will cover most of the time required from the islands to pack because of the shipping this country.
