Jail Scheme Film Writer, Jeanie M'Pherson, Dies

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 27.—(P)—Jeanie MacPherson, 63, screen writer who once had herself jailed so she could get authentic material for a Cecil B. De Mille production, died yesterday in a hospital after an operation.

Using the name Angie Brown, Miss MacPherson got herself sentenced to 10 days in jail Dec. 14, 1921, in Detroit on a theft charge, she once told an interviewer. She was seeking color for the movie "Manslaughter" and stayed in the lock-up three days, she said, before calling for De Mille to arrange her release.

Before joining De Mille, whom she helped produce "The Ten Commandments" and "King of Kings," among others, Miss MacPherson was an actress and a dancer.
