Without peace, they can't earn or produce. If reparations are what Russia wants, she is going about it in the wrong way.

THE Communist Daily Worker in London (which says what Moscow tells it to say) attacks the Mediterranean cruise of an American task force as "a blatant example of gangster diplomacy" and says it "threatens British as well as Russian interests."

In Washington, a reporter asks Admiral "Bull" Halsey if he thinks we should get our ships out of there to avoid such criticism.

Halsey replies: "No, I do not. It's nobody's damn business where we go."

He adds that we will go anywhere where we please in oceans and seas that are free and do not enter waters that are within the legal limit of any country's sovereignty.

WHAT is a better answer than the navy department's official explanation the day before that we are sending our warships to the Mediterranean because the Greeks so greatly admired the late President Roosevelt that they ought to be given the chance to gaze upon the great American aircraft carrier that bears his name.

An explanation so obviously absurd as that would make ANYBODY mad—not to mention the touchy communists in Moscow.

POOR little Greece is on the hot spot these days.

The reason for it is quite simple. She lies EAST of the line that Moscow has set as the boundary between Russia and the rest of Europe and insists on being friends with Britain and the United States.

MORE than 2,000 years ago, little democratic Greece faced huge despotic Persia, and stood her ground against the Persian hordes. Is history preparing to play a return engagement of that tremendous show?

THERE is a revealing dispatch from Moscow.

The Soviet newspaper Red Sport comments that Russian athletes perform FOR THE GLORY OF THE STATE and not for personal fame in sport or desire to break records.

THAT is a simple and understandable definition of the difference between communism, fascism, nazism — TOTALITARIANISM in all its forms — and the system of free enterprise.

In the free enterprise countries (THAT ARE LEFT) the state exists to serve the welfare of the INDIVIDUAL. In the totalitarian countries, of which Russia is now the head and front, the individual exists to SERVE THE STATE.

EVEN in such relatively minor matters as sport.

THERE is a brief but rather significant dispatch from Batavia, in the Dutch East Indies, to the effect that Dutch troops killed 92 Indonesians and captured 30 more in a ruckus near Socra-baja the other day.

To get the full significance of this little story, go down to the store and try to buy some pepper. The reason you will have trouble is that the bulk of the commercial pepper comes from the Dutch East Indies—where the various factions are so busy hush-whacking each other that they have no time left to grow pepper.

NO BARGAIN OFFER

Notices are being sent News-Review subscribers announcing there will be no Bargain Rate this year.

For many years the News-Review has made a bargain offer each fall, with subscribers receiving a premium rate on paid-in-advance yearly subscriptions. In late years, because of the newsprint shortage and rapidly mounting costs of publication, the Bargain Rate was offered only to old subscribers and was not extended generally as in previous years.

The reasons which force the News-Review to cancel out its Bargain Rate this year are, we believe, quite obvious. Costs of publication are soaring. Prices on newsprint have been advanced several times—although we still would be willing to pay more if we could get it.

We are very hopeful that subscribers will find they are getting a real bargain after all from our present rate.

As soon as newsprint is available there will be a startling expansion in the News-Review. The newsprint quota under which the News-Review is forced to operate is based upon 1941 consumption, with only minor amendments. The amount of paper we now receive is only about one-half of our requirement.

Business, both new and old, desires advertising space. The majority of new business firms in Roseburg are accustomed to the use of a liberal amount of newspaper display. But because of newsprint shortage, the News-Review has been forced to drastically limit space for its advertisers.

We sincerely hope this condition eventually will be remedied, although there are no prospects of immediate betterment. But when the time comes when the News-Review is able to expand its service, to both reader and advertiser, subscribers will find they have obtained a real bargain.

In preparation for the time when expansion will be possible, the News-Review has made many improvements to its facilities. Recently added mechanical equipment includes a material maker; a new Linotype, particularly designed for use in setting advertisements; a Linotype trade, in which a small machine was exchanged for a larger one; complete remodelling of the engraving department, with cut capacity enlarged from quarter-page to full page size.

A contract recently was signed for purchase of a 16-page tubular press, with delivery schedule for next March, although we will be most pleasantly surprised if we get it at that time, in view of past experience in trying to receive machinery on dates specified.

The News-Review is equipping itself to give its readers a much larger and better newspaper as soon as the handicap of newsprint shortage is relieved.

Thus the News-Review—a bargain at any price—will be a better bargain than that for which you bargained, if you get what we mean.
