and those of the west on the other.

The clashes between Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov and U. S. Secretary of State Byrnes, along with the completely outspoken statements of the Australians, plus the startling indictment of "British dominated Greece" by the Ukraine, have removed all question.

In the middle of this there came the sound of shots from Yugoslav fighter planes and the explosion of a falling American transport. De Gaulle's Vision Cited

In this bleak pattern, adding to the sense of foreboding that hangs heavily over Paris today, there has been the voice of Gen. De Gaulle. Frenchmen and foreigners have varying views of De Gaulle as a politician and as a national leader but very few people question his vision, his feeling for the future.

Long before the second world war he foretold in military terms the kind of war it would be. Just before it started he said France would be overrun. After she was overrun, he declared in the darkest of days that Germany could never remain a winner. What is he saying now?

At Bar-Le-Duc recently he spoke of an inexorable collision of Russia and the United States. This week he criticized the proposed new French constitution on the ground it gave the president too little power.

Behind his words Frenchmen feel was this implication: France was disorganized in 1938. Another 1939 is close at hand and this time she should have a strong hand at the helm equipped with sufficient powers to hold the nation on one course — whichever course that may be.

iously had been raised 81 percent in March—largely to cover wage hikes—and five percent in April to spur production.

The OPA official emphasized that the last two hikes will not be felt by consumers until the goods make their way from mills to retail counters. This may take as much as three months.

It removed price controls from Sterling silver flatware, including knives, forks and spoons; all rubber footwear, and from manufacturer's sales of certain obsolete automotive replacement parts useable exclusively in 1938 or earlier model year automobiles.

Price Hikes Being Written But more than counter balancing these labor-saving moves was the urgent task of a huge staff of statisticians who hoped to complete by tonight the job of writing new price ceilings on livestock within the formula set by Secretary of Agriculture Anderson.

The first list of ceilings will apply at 12:01 A. M. (EST) Sunday on cattle, calves and hogs at both producer and slaughter levels. The maximum price schedules will begin to apply to distributors on September 5 and at retail stores on September 9.

Officials say the retail ceilings will mean an increase above June 30 prices of about 23 to three cents a pound for pork and 53 to six cents on beef cuts.

Meanwhile, OPA's enforcement branch got set for a sweeping drive against black market operations in meats under the direction of Irving Gruber, former chief of the agency's litigation section.

Saying he will throw an army of 2,500 enforcement agents into the field, Gruber told a reporter "we expect to stop all violations."

program intended to penetrate U. S. military circles with Germans sympathetic to Russia, USFIE said.

Russian Origin Claimed The announcement said a Maj. Droachin, a Russian secret police officer, founded the "Free Germany" movement at Stuttgart and said Kazmarek had been paid 5,000 marks (\$300 at the military

rate of exchange) for reporting on American troop movements in the Frankfurt area.

Russian officers in the Soviet reparations commission, were in touch with Kazmarek for some time, the statement said. All Russians concerned have now returned to the U. S. S. R., it added.

Converts to Communism

The U. S. intelligence officers said the 15 Germans newly arrested were among some 1,000,000 German soldiers reported converted to communism as members of the Soviet-sponsored "Free Germany National Committee."

This committee was formed among German prisoners of war and refugees in Moscow in July, 1943. Its announced aim was to help rid Germany of Hitler.

Some of the German officers have returned to Germany to assist in German communist party activities," they said, and various members are known to have returned to the United States zone. There was no estimate of the number.

The officers said the German clandestine movement was believed operating on a large scale in all three western zones of Germany.

pawn of increasingly vital importance.

These islands have been drawn into the global ideological clash, becoming an inseparable part of it with the added importance of their strategic geographical position.

Early in the occupation General MacArthur startled the world by announcing his occupying force of approximately 450,000 would be halved—and he did so. Now, key officers say there is no prospect for the immediate decrease in the total American occupation forces numbering about 138,000.

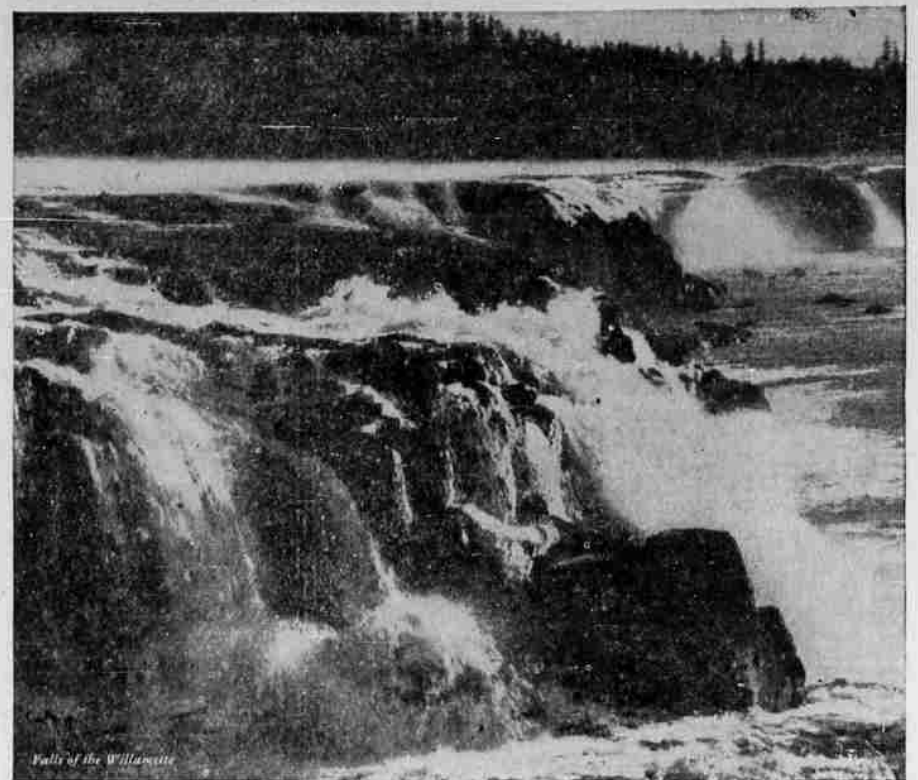
Two Top Jobs Unfinished

Only two major jobs remain to be completed before the purely military aspect of this occupation is finished. One is the final definition and clarification of reparations. The second is the detailed blueprint of Japan's economic future, which will require military supervision to enforce.

Both these assignments have been delayed by international indecision. After one year there still is no clear indication of the extent of reparations or the exact type of economic state industrial Japan will be permitted.

At the outset the Soviets showed little interest in the occupation, but now they have the largest foreign mission in Tokyo. Many travel frequently throughout Japan and to Russia.

There is no doubt they are here to stay—and occupation authorities indicate clearly they will continue their attempts to block Soviet activity at every turn.
