List Coming At Close Of Today's Marts

Certain Canned Goods to Be Included; Meat Limits Effective at Midnight

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—(AP)—OPA controls will go off another batch of farm and food products late today while the livestock industry makes the shift from free prices to new ceilings effective at midnight.

Following close upon OPA's announcement of the higher-than-June 30 livestock prices, the Department of Agriculture made ready to announce its first list of "agricultural commodities in short supply."

All products not on the list automatically go off price control at once, under terms of the new price control law.

As soon as the Agriculture Department list is out, OPA will start telling consumers, farmers and processors which individual items are affected and which are not.

To avoid upsetting commodity markets, agriculture officials planned to withhold the announcement until the day's market operations are ended.

Scarce Items Foreseen

The only reliable indications to date are that certain canned goods will be decontrolled—OPA already has removed ceilings from soup and that fats, oils and sugar will be on the scarcity list.

Dairy products also will be listed in short supply, but this does not mean that ceilings will go back on milk and butter. These products are under jurisdiction of the three-man price decontrol board, which exempted them from ceilings on August 20.

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Nazi Trial Verdicts Slated for Sept. 23 After Defendant Plead

Goering Yells His Innocence, Hess Abusive

Other Defendants Blame Hitler for Many Crimes Charged to Nazi Regime

NUERNBERG, Germany, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The verdict in the nine-month-old Nuernberg war crimes trial will be given Sept. 23, the tribunal announced today.

The disclosure was made by Lord Justice Lawrence of Britain, presiding, after 20 henchmen of Hitler in the prisoners' dock completed their final pleas.

Lawrence announced that the international military tribunal would recess until Sept. 23, when the verdict is to be given against Hermann Goering and his fellow defendants and seven Nazi organizations.

For four hours the tribunal heard impassioned speeches by the ringleaders of Hitler's war machine denying they were guilty of war atrocities and crimes against humanity.

It was their last chance to explain Nazi Germany's conduct before they learn their fate. Most of them blamed Hitler for war developments. Some said nevertheless they were not afraid to die.

Four of the 24 men originally indicted were not in the court. They were Martin Bormann, a Hitler aide several times reported dead, who was tried in absentia; Ernst Kaltenbrunner, secret police chief who suffered a cranial hemorrhage; Gustav von Bohlen und Halbach Krupp, ailing armament maker, and Labor Boss Robert Ley, who committed suicide.

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Mantz Smashes Speed Mark In Bendix Air Race Victory; Jacqueline Cochran Second

CLEVELAND, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Striking cross-country at a scorching speed averaging 435.6 miles an hour, Paul Mantz, Burbank, Calif., flier who virtually grew up with aviation, today held the winner's share of the Bendix trophy race prize—with an assist from "movie stunting" that showed him a way out of a jam.

The 43-year-old pilot's speed was more than 150 miles an hour faster than the former record for the 2,045-mile dash from Van Nuys, Calif., to the National Air Races.

The previous record was set by Frank Fuller in 1939 when he averaged 282 miles an hour. Jimmy Doolittle, who lived to bedevil the Axis with bombers, won the first Bendix in 1931 with an average speed of 223 miles an hour.

Mantz, flying a North American P-51 Mustang salvaged from military surplus, fell just short of doubling Doolittle's speed, and his four hours, 42 minutes and ten seconds elapsed time from Van Nuys, Calif., was only 33 minutes behind an Army Air Force jet-propelled plane which flew the same course at 493.5 miles an hour.

Jacqueline Cochran, war time leader of the WASP and the 1938 Bendix winner—only woman ever to take the \$10,000 first prize—finished in second place with an average of 420.8 miles an hour.

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Brazil's High Living Costs Provoke Riot

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Rioting which stemmed from Brazil's economic crisis killed one person and injured nearly 100 as mobs moved through downtown streets smashing store windows last night.

Sporadic attempts to renew the demonstrations today were foiled when merchants, after opening their shops briefly, slammed steel shutters across the store fronts. Police at the same time were busy dispersing crowds.

Plate glass from store fronts was scattered throughout the business section of the Brazilian capital. The mobs, protesting against high living costs, attacked movies, grocery stores, music shops and even funeral parlors.

Troops occupied strategic points at midnight but later returned to barracks.

Communism Hinted

Federal Police Chief Lira said the riot, in which groups of high school students participated, was inspired by more serious motives than a mere student demonstration. He did not elaborate, however.

The communist newspaper Tribuna Popular, which reappeared yesterday for the first time since its recent 15-day government suspension, said today that the student cost of living demonstration was a peaceful one, but "provocateur elements infiltrated among the students" and brought about the rioting.

Maratorium on Debts

The presidents of the association, Warren and Chester Doonan, Chicago policemen, were among the early arrivals. So were the two secretaries-treasurers, Anna and Loretta Zimmer, South Bend, Ind., beauty operators.

Hollywood was scheduled to offer a pair of movie starlets, Lee and Lynn Wilde of St. Louis.

The youngest pair this far registered were Polly Kay and Patsy Lou Goeman of Grand Rapids. They are four years old—four apiece, that is.

The convention long-shots are John and George Sessler, 22, Columbus, O. albino twins, Dr. Davis C. Rife of Ohio State University, who accompanied them, estimated the chances of albino twin births at one in 300,000,000.

Petitions Also Offer 7 Names For Council Jobs

Albert (Al) G. Flegel, Roseburg transfer and storage man, became the only nominee for mayor yesterday, in a six-hour political crisis resulting from the fact that apparently no one was aware that today is the final day for the filing of petitions for candidates seeking municipal offices in the November election.

Yesterday morning, County Clerk Roy Agee, following the calendar in the Digest of Election Laws issued by the secretary of state at Salem, informed city officials that only one day remained before the time set for his office to receive the official certification of ballots from the city recorder.

A statute passed by the 1945 legislature changed the filing date from 40 days to 65 days in advance of the November general election, and even the League of Oregon Cities, which issues bulletins to remind city officials of various deadline dates, was apparently unaware of the change.

The Roseburg Boosters' Club yesterday began the circulation of petitions in behalf of Flegel for mayor, and H. C. Carstens, Hal Ayotte, Paul Ryan, Paul Lund, H. J. Sullivan, Harrison Winston, and George West for seats on the council.

The petition in behalf of Flegel's candidacy was filed with City Recorder Geddes at 3:30 in the afternoon. Boosters' Club members had not obtained the required number of signatures for councilman candidates, however, until late in the evening.

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'Branding' of Child Cloaked in Mystery

DETROIT, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Seventeen-months-old William Joseph Kelly, apparently still harmed by three initials "branded" on his left shoulder, played unconcernedly as police investigated the mysterious injury.

Officers questioned neighborhood children regarding the initials—an A. S. with a faint L. beneath—which were reported Thursday night by the child's father, William G. Kelly.

Attendants at receiving hospital, where little William was taken, said only first aid treatment had been required. They could not determine how the marks had been made.

Mrs. Margaret Kelly, William's mother, said she left the baby in the yard Wednesday afternoon with several children from the neighborhood. A team of detectives has been assigned to question the children closely in an attempt to find one who might have seen the "branding" done.

The parents told police they did not notice the marks until Thursday when scabs formed.

Sentences Meted To Culprits Here

John W. Amos, Roseburg, was sentenced to serve one year in the state penitentiary yesterday, by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly. Amos was indicted on two counts—that of obtaining money by false pretenses, and delivering a bank check with insufficient funds.

Amos pleaded guilty and Judge Wimberly sentenced him to one year on each count, the sentences to run concurrently, and to begin at the expiration of his present commitment for three years from Jackson County.

Other sentences yesterday included one for four years to the state penitentiary, imposed on Fred Ryther, who pleaded guilty to the district attorney's information charging him with contributing to the delinquency of minors.

Harvey Deard Duke, 49, was sentenced by Judge Wimberly to 60 days in the county jail for taking and using an automobile without the permission of its owner. He pleaded guilty. The sentence will start at the expiration of his present commitment from the justice court for drunk-driving.

Sentence was postponed for Mrs. Dorothy Jean Thomas, 18, of Reedsport, who pleaded guilty to larceny in a dwelling. Judge Wimberly dismissed the charges against her husband, Clifford L. Thomas, who was taken into custody at the same time as his wife. They had allegedly taken money from the home of their employer, Stanley Stiles.

Pease, who said he earned a living "digging potatoes and doing odd jobs," returned home with his bride yesterday after the couple was married by a justice of the peace in Joplin, Mo.

The bride, sitting in a rocking chair because she said she wasn't as young as she once was, termed their romance "one of those whirlwind affairs."

State Fair Readied For Record Crowd

SALEM, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Oregon's state fair, after a four-year lapse during the war, opens Monday for a week's stand, with advanced ticket sales indicating the largest crowd in its history.

All concession space has been sold for the first time on record. All exhibit space has been taken, too.

Workmen hurried final construction work today on the grounds and buildings, which have been given a thorough renovating.

The fair livestock show will include every breed listed in the original premium list, and more than 150 horses have been entered in the combined horse show and rodeo which will be held each night.

The Army ground and air force mobile display units arrived today, while the crack Second Infantry division band, which will play daily, will arrive this evening from Fort Lewis, Wash.

About 300 horses will run in the six-day fair racing meet on Lone Oak track. The daily racing cards will include two harness races and eight running events for a \$400 minimum purse.

A vaudeville show will be given each night in front of the grandstand, while Jimmy Grier's orchestra will play for the dancing.

Ex-Officer Slays Rival in Romance

CLE ELUM, Wash., Aug. 31.—(AP)—Richard Hill, 55, was shot to death last night at the climax of a quarrel, Prosecutor Henry Wager said, with another man over the affections of Edna Pierce, 53-year-old divorcee.

Wager said the other man was Ole H. Olson, 65, of Redmond, Ore., and that he and Miss Pierce told a complete story of the shooting to the prosecutor and Police Chief Tim Plouffe.

Olson was held at the city jail on an open charge.

Wager quoted the couple as saying they had planned to be married last night. They met Hill, who Miss Pierce described as an old acquaintance, and drove outside town to discuss the marriage plans. Olson and Miss Pierce had planned to go to Wenatchee for the wedding.

The quarrel developed when they told Hill their plans, Wager said they told him, the man declaring he "would not give her up." The two said Hill was shot as he choked and slapped Miss Pierce outside the car, and that he died as he lunged inside the car and fell on top of Olson.

Wager said Olson told him he had been a sheriff's officer at Prineville, Ore., in the 1920's and was privileged to carry a weapon as a former police officer.

Prison Terms Given Two Arrested Near Drain

MEDFORD, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Donald Henry Barther, 17, of Celina, Ohio, received an indeterminate prison sentence yesterday from Circuit Judge Hanna on his guilty plea to assault and robbery.

His companion, James Ellis Clark, 18, also of Celina, in the confessed abduction of Mrs. Naomi May Young and a small boy in her charge last April, is serving a 10-year sentence. Barther's sentencing was delayed while the judge studied clemency pleas.

The two were arrested near Drain, Douglas county, after Mrs. Young reported she was forced to drive two men north from here. She was robbed of \$7.50 and the boy and the boy were freed near Gold Hill.

Glenn Elliott, Pitcher, Sold to Boston Braves

SEATTLE, Aug. 31.—(AP)—The Seattle Rainiers yesterday announced another deal which sends Glenn Elliott, left-hand pitcher, to the Boston Braves in a straight cash deal. The price for the vastly improved twirler, for 1947 delivery, was unannounced.

Elliott, a native of Myrtle Creek, started pitching with the Myrtle Creek High School baseball team and, at the same time was ace hurler for the Douglas County American Legion team. He attracted attention of professional baseball scouts because of his excellent pitching with the Oregon State College team. Following graduation from OSC, he was signed by Seattle of the Pacific Coast League.

Church Interior Wrecked By 'Believer in God'

PUEBLO, Colo., Aug. 31.—(AP)—Police sought today a vandal who wrecked a church interior here then left a scrawled note: "Now this is a church, not a place of demons."

Police Capt. William McDonald said the note was signed, "A Believer in God."

Murals and ritualistic paraphernalia in the building, the St. Michael Serbo-Russian Orthodox Church, were scarred and smashed. Robes and vestments were strewn about the floor.

The Rev. Peter Prisnoff estimated the loss at \$2,000.

Grocery Allowance for Persons on Relief Upped

PORTLAND, Aug. 31.—(AP)—An increase in monthly grocery allowances for persons on relief was reported yesterday by Miss Lolla Howard, administrator of the State Welfare commission.

The increase will be about \$2 for a single person and \$1.50 a person a month for a family of four, she said.

Miss Howard asked the board for an increase because of rising living costs, maintaining "we do not feel that our clients are receiving a standard diet."

Romania War Payment to Soviet Fixed at \$300 Million; France Given Slice of Italy

PARIS, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Four-power recommendations that Romania pay Soviet Russia \$300,000,000 in reparations and that the Italian frontier be adjusted in France's favor in the Mt. Cenis plateau region were adopted by peace conference commissions today.

The transfer to France of the upper Tinea, Vesuvio and Roya valleys, the largest French territorial demand from Italy, also was approved. The Vesuvia and Roya valleys contain a combined population of about 4,000.

In her demand, agreed to by the Italian political and territorial commission, France said she wished to move the frontier to the crest of the Alps for military reasons and asserted that the valley dwellers were technically French.

The economic commission for the Balkans and Finland unanimously approved the Romanian reparations plan after a week of debate which had touched upon Romanian oil.

Article 22 of the Romanian treaty, as approved by the commission, would give Romania eight years from Sept. 12, 1944,

Sentence Meted Batavia 'Vamp' for Hiding Loot

BATAVIA, Java, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Baba Wolff, the Eurasian who carried that who would sleep in a gold bed, was sentenced to eight months imprisonment yesterday for concealing \$500,000 worth of the \$36,000,000 Nakamura treasure for her Japanese paramour.

The fortune was stolen from residents of the Dutch East Indies during the Japanese occupation. Capt. Nakamura, who fathered Carla's children, turned over the \$500,000 to her at the time of the Japanese surrender.

It was Carla's mouthings which put allied occupation troops on the trail of the treasure. A British officer has been convicted of complicity in the case. The trials will continue Monday when the case of Renee Ulrich, once celebrated as Batavia's most beautiful Eurasian, will face the Dutch court.

Bilbo Faces Operation For Mouth Affliction

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Sen. Theodore "The Man" Bilbo, whose fiery oratory for white supremacy won him renomination to the Senate from Mississippi last month, will be operated on today for what his physicians said was "inflammation of the mouth."

Clad in bright red pajamas, the 68-year-old senator told newsmen he expected to be out of Touro infirmary within five days.

He added that he felt better than he had "in the past 15 or 20 years."

All But One of German Spy Suspects Liberated

FRANKFURT, Germany, Aug. 31.—(AP)—Col. C. F. Fritsche, deputy U. S. Army intelligence chief in Europe, disclosed today that all but one of 15 Germans arrested on suspicion of Soviet-sponsored espionage in the American occupation zone of Germany have been released from jail.

Col. Fritsche said the only one still in custody was Walter Kazmarek, alleged leader of the Russian-sponsored clandestine organization known as "Free Germany."

Intelligence officers at Army headquarters said the activities of the "Free Germany" group were "not necessarily espionage" and that "Nazi propaganda" was the principal objective.
