Six Top-Flight Grapplers Billed On Saturday Card

Six of the world's best light-heavyweight wrestlers, the most sparkling array of grappling talent Matchmaker Don Owen has gathered together here this season, will appear on a coast championship program at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night.

The card is headlined by a Pacific coast junior-heavyweight match between Champion Georges Dusette of Montreal, Canada, and Challenger Karl Gray of Wisconsin. But the two preliminary one-fall matches appear almost as attractive.

Pete Belcastro, the so-called "Walloping Wop from Weed," who slashed his way to a victory over Jack Kiser last week, will be meeting another adonis of the mat when he tangles with young Joe Wolf of Teva, formidable and scientific blonde.

Looming as a bloody brawl will be an opener between a pair of experienced villains—Bulldog Jackson and Mike Nazarian. Jackson, alias "Yukon Jake," is one of the real oldtimers of the game. He has lost some speed and agility with the years, but he still packs a terrific wallop both at the rate and on the mat. He is probably one of the most difficult men to beat in the business. But Nazarian, the "Armenian Assassin," believes Jackson's style is right down his fist alley and will attempt to prove his punching prowess. It should be a Donnybrook while it lasts.

Gray, who won the Umpqua Traveling Tourney trophy here recently and gained the title chance by whipping Tex Hager in a battle here last week, will be meeting an equal and possibly a better exponent of the full-nelson when he clashes with Dusette. Gray, the former world champion in the junior-heavy division, is given an even chance of lifting the coveted coast crown, but will have to be in top condition to turn the trick.

The opening match will get under way at 8:30 p. m. Elton Owen will referee all three tilts.

GROUNDLESS WORRIES

The Roseburg Volunteer Fire Department is apprehensive because it feels inauguration of a city manager form of government will interfere with the semi-autonomy it now enjoys. The fire department elects its own officers, including the fire chief and his assistant. The department's acts and activities receive only cursory supervision from the board of fire commissioners. Naturally, the fire department, composed almost entirely of volunteers, is jealous of its position, and fears that a city manager might break up the organization, which, through long years of association, has become closely knit socially as well as in the matter of efficiency.

While we can sympathize with desire of the department's membership to maintain the freedom of organization now existing, we believe its present fears and worries to be unfounded and needless.

It is true that a city manager would have the right to appoint the fire chief and authority to supervise activities, but we do not believe any competent manager would attempt to break up the organization, nor would he be apt to deny the department's membership a voice in management of their affairs. It would be a poor manager indeed who would not welcome an organization with the esprit-de-corps which marks the Roseburg fire department.

Nor would a department, as vitally interested in efficiency as our Roseburg volunteers, hesitate to receive suggestions and supervision which would improve efficiency.

Actually, under the city manager system, the fire department would be no more subject to loss of autonomy than under the existing set-up. The city's fire commissioners have chosen to promote self-organization and management on the part of the department; yet, under the city's charter, the supervisors have almost identically the same powers that would be conferred upon a city manager.

We have heard opponents to the city manager plan declare that the city would be setting up a "dictatorship," and that the system is "not democratic."

These are thoughtless and untruthful words.

The city manager can in no sense be a dictator. He is subject in every act to the approval of the city council. The charter provision under which he will be authorized, providing the amendment is passed at the forthcoming election, permits that he be dismissed by the city council "without cause." In other words, he can be discharged if the council so much as objects to the color of his eyes. Furthermore, he has no recourse from the council's decisions.

It is quite certain that the council would tolerate no injudicious tampering with the city's fire department.

On the other side of the picture, we have no use for a city manager if all of our departments are to be given autonomy. If the fire department is removed from the manager's supervision, the same privilege could be claimed by the police department, the street department, and all the rest of our municipal service organizations. A manager under such circumstances would be useless.

Experience has shown that principal opposition to the city manager plan generally comes from city employees. This is only human nature. No man welcomes a change which might possibly affect his job adversely. He fears that the new system may force him to seek other employment.

Yet a survey of cities in which managers have been installed shows that city managers seldom make any material personnel changes; that employees, once they have become fully acquainted with the system, praise the city manager program and are better satisfied than under previous forms. We have talked personally with policemen, firemen and others in cities where managers are employed and, without exception, we found them to prefer the city manager system.

We believe the fire department's fears to be totally groundless, and further believe that, if the system is established in Roseburg, the membership will be better satisfied than at present, after the program has had a chance to become fully organized.

As to the city manager program being dictatorial and undemocratic, such talk is pure foolishness. No authority is surrendered by the city council. The city manager is only an agent of the council to give close attention to city affairs—affairs which the council can supervise or conduct only perfunctorily.

It is not considered dictatorial nor undemocratic to employ a school superintendent, yet the school superintendent's position is exactly analogous to that of a city manager.

We'll hear more of this sort of talk, so let's peg it now.

As to the fears of city employees and departments, we can sympathize with them, even though we fail to agree, for human nature is consistently antagonistic to change in conditions.

New Police Chief Given Deferred Prison Term

BREMERTON, Wash., Sept. 5. —(AP)—Orville Q. Mitchell, 22, former Bremerton police officer who was recently named chief of police at Sweet Home, Ore., was given a deferred three-year prison sentence by Superior Judge H. G. Sutton Tuesday upon his plea of guilty to a charge of grand larceny by check.
