Roseburg Grade Schools Receive Refrigerators

Three new refrigerators were installed recently in the Rose, Fullerton, and Benson schools. Superintendent of Schools Paul S. Elliott said today. All schools in the Roseburg system, including Edenbower, are now equipped with refrigeration for the hot lunch program.
