Fall Recreation Plans Discussed By Director Gray

Plans for a youth recreation program this fall, which will include all young people and stress individual participation and development in sports, were announced today by H. W. Gray, city recreational director.

In order to stimulate interest in sports and to increase the participation of those who do not make the school teams and do not earn team letters, he would organize touch football and basketball teams according to the capabilities and proficiencies of those taking part.

Gray recently attended in Portland a meeting of recreational directors from all parts of Oregon. Representatives of other communities, he said, urged that special taxes be levied for the support of their recreational programs.

In Eugene, he pointed out, a two-mill tax passing three-to-one by popular vote, provided \$16,000 for recreational purposes and \$15,000 for development of parks.

In Portland, school gymnasium and playfields are open the year 'round, and physical education "overbalances all other activities" in the amount of time devoted to it, he observed.

In other cities, the recreation program is designed to meet the needs of all the community adults as well as youth. Gray said he hoped to expand the scope of the local recreation program to include citizens of all ages.

"We in Roseburg are very fortunate to have the Armory in which we can develop our community teams and thus increase the community interest in recreation," he observed.

to forego over 60 other demands. "In many cases," he said, "granting a single one of these demands would mean an increase of more than the \$5 representing what the board turned down." He said the \$5 was "a small fraction of one per cent of the total labor costs."

Double Dilemma Faced
The board was gravely aware that America's merchant fleet lay motionless as the members met for a second look at their ruling.

The resumption of ocean shipping is at stake.

So, too, perhaps, is the future of the board itself and the whole government wage-price policy laid down last February 14.

Here is the board's dilemma: 1. If it sticks to its August 23

ruling that able bodied seamen should get no more than \$17.50 a month as a wage increase, the strike might go on with dire results.

2. If it reverses its position it would be doing something which a majority of its members have said "would seriously weaken the whole stabilization program."

The White House, the Labor Department, the Maritime Commission, the Army, Navy and other agencies stood by. There were conferences, but no definite plan of government action emerged.

One thing that could make the task easier for the Wage Stabilization Board is "new evidence."

Government officials close to the situation take the view that if important new facts were presented, the board might be able to reverse its ruling without wrecking its prestige or revamping the whole policy of wage and price control.

Season Ticket Sale for RHS Grid Season Slated

A season ticket sale for Roseburg Senior High School football games will start the latter part of this week, it was announced today by Omer J. Monger principal. First game of the season will be between Roseburg and Myrtle Point, Friday night, September 20.

To meet the demand for reserved seats, season tickets at a slight additional cost will be sold for the center section of the grandstand, Monger said. Other season tickets will also be sold for the unreserved sections of the grandstand.

All home games will be played at night at the Senior High School field, starting at 8 o'clock. "I am very optimistic," Monger said, "in feeling that Coach Mel Ingram and John Newby will give us the best team we've had since Ingram came here two years ago."

Beer License O.K. Cuts Off Council From 'Drys'

PHILOMATH, Ore., Sept. 10.—(AP)—An application for a beer license to give this town its only tavern was approved by the city council last night in a vote that withdrew council support from community "dry" interests.

The council, which previously refused to vote on the application when "dry" groups promised to seek a ballot referendum in November, reported no petition had been filed for the election.

The council-approved request of Trilvia and Bob Carter, proprietors of the Philomath pool hall, will now go to the State Liquor Control Commission.

Policy on New Buildings Told By CPA Official Here

Only \$300,000 worth of new construction in Oregon can be permitted each week by the Portland office of the Civilian Production Administration, said J. H. Bushnell, industrial analyst for the CPA, who is in Roseburg today to counsel local persons who are seeking approval for commercial or industrial building projects.

Bushnell faced a morning crowded with interviews at the Chamber of Commerce, where he may be consulted for the remainder of the day.

The Civilian Production Administration does not issue "priorities" for construction projects, Bushnell pointed out. It merely gives "permission" to obtain materials to build.

It is a "physical impossibility," he said, for the Portland district office, which has jurisdiction over most of Oregon and three southwestern counties of Washington, to approve all applications for new building projects, when a limit on new construction is placed at \$300,000, and consideration must be given legitimate losses, such as destruction by fire, and evictions.

Not too much consideration can be given to the construction needs of normal business expansion, he said.

Buildings already started on the "freeze" date, March 26, are allowed to be completed by the CPA. The pouring of concrete footings on other concrete foundations, the laying of reinforcing rods or mats in the foundation, the laying of pipes, conduits, or wires as a permanent part of the building, or the erection of foundation walls constitute a "start" on construction.

Buildings that were in the foregoing stages of construction on March 26 may be completed, and their builders are permitted to buy scarce construction materials if they can find them. No "priorities" are issued however. These are given only by the Federal Housing Administration.

Pacific Highway Name Change Is Favored

Resolution that the Pacific Highway be known hereafter as

the "International Highway," since it reaches from Canada to Mexico, was the result of the Oregon Pacific Highway Association meeting in Yreka, Calif., yesterday, said County Judge D. N. Busenbark.

Representatives of Multnomah, Marion, Lane, Douglas, Jackson and Josephine Counties, and Siskiyou County, Calif., were in attendance at the meeting, including the Douglas, Jackson and Josephine County courts.

It was further resolved to change the name of the Oregon Pacific Highway Association to the "Highway 99 Association," and to invite counties of Washington and California into membership, Judge Busenbark said.

Next meeting of the association will be at Salem in January.
