Father Suspends Son In Sack From Rafter
EAST CHICAGO, Ind., Sept. 13. — (AP) John Robinson, 44-year-old steel worker, who, police said, placed his naked seven-year-old son in a burlap sack and hung him from a rafter in a shed, was in jail today under a \$2,000 bond on a charge of gross cruelty.

Police said they found Robinson's son, Eddie, after they had received a call from Robinson's wife, Mae, who told police she had protested the punishment. Police said her husband punished his son "the way my mother used to punish me" and he accused the boy of having taken 25 cents from his mother.

Police said the boy's head was sticking out of the sack, which was tied by a rope and hanging seven feet above the floor. He was not hurt.

ence ratings for scarce building materials because these priority orders have not been presented correctly, he explained.

"New regulations require dealers to hold virtually all critically short building materials exclusively for veterans' housing for an indefinite period, so the home builder who does not handle his HH rated order properly, will cause unnecessary delay in securing the materials he needs," Phone Order Not Valid.

All purchase orders for scarce building materials based on HH

ratings must be in writing and have the proper certification signed by the holder of the priority, Bayles emphasized. Telephone orders are not valid for HH rated purchases of building materials. Also, he explained, the requisitions authorized for priority ratings must specify a date for delivery of the items.

Should a supplier refuse to honor a properly rated priority order, the builder should ask by letter for a written statement as to reasons for refusal. A copy of the rejected order and the supplier's statement should be turned over to the nearest CPA compliance office or to the Compliance Division, CPA, Washington, D. C.

Home Materials Available
Several items of scarce building materials for homes, including large amounts of paint, varnish and lacquer, may be obtained from the War Assets Administration depot at Troutdale, Ore., Bayles pointed out.

Persons who are interested in obtaining listings of housing materials to be sold by WAA, may apply at the local Selective Service office in the county courthouse.

Listings of paint and varnish are in pamphlet H-156; of insulated wire and cable for commercial use, D-151; screening materials, sashes and doors, and roofing paper, F-142.

to abolition of OPA ahead of the present June 30, 1947, deadline. Dairy industry warned rising costs of butter and cheese brought a notice from the Price Decontrol Board today that it may clamp ceilings back on all dairy products.

The board called upon the dairy industry, the public and "anyone else" to submit written evidence bearing on the subject by next Wednesday.

A board spokesman said this amounts to an order to "show cause" why the panel should not reverse its decision of less than a month ago, when it ruled that milk, butter, cheese and allied

products should continue in the free market that began when OPA lapsed on June 30.

At that time, however, the panel said it would keep a close watch on price trends among those items.

OPA today lifted ceiling prices on facial tissues, effective next Wednesday.

The rise is eight per cent at all levels and OPA said this will mean a two cents boost for boxes now selling for 25 cents.

Higher labor and material costs necessitated the increase, OPA said.

Timbers to be Salvaged
Bridge timbers from the Oak Street Bridge which the contracting engineers are letting fall into the river below the span will be salvaged for use by the county, it was stated yesterday by County Judge D. N. Busenbark. Among the timbers are 5 x 12 stringers which can be used on other bridges. The Oak Street Bridge is being redecked with steel.
