## Ship Sinks in Northern Gale, but Crew Is Safe

SEATTLE, Sept. 30. — Army port of embarkation authorities today awaited an official report on the sinking of the Army transport Brig. Gen. Zalski in Grenville channel yesterday while en route from Seattle to Whittier, Alaska.

Sketchy details received from crew members last night indicated the 45-man crew was safe. Army officials said the 2,612-ton transport apparently struck a ledge while in heavy, gale-whipped seas. She carried no passengers but was loaded with general cargo.

Prison Camp Fugitives Nabbed With Theft Loot — PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 30. — Thousands of dollars worth of robbery loot was recovered here yesterday when police thwarted a tavern burglary and later arrested two California prison camp escapees.

The two were booked as Odie P. Goodwin, 22, and Earnest V. Verdiek, 22. Police said loot in their hotel room may clear up a score of thefts from Oakland, Calif., north to Seattle. Jewelry from a Seattle robbery of last week is valued at \$10,000.

Patrolman W. T. Fisher reported he surprised both men as they tried to enter a tavern. They fled, but Fisher found one hiding in bushes. As he handcuffed the suspect, the companion stuck a gun into the patrolman's back and both men again ran off. They were recaptured later.

Mother Charged With Drowning Two Children — CLEVELAND, Tex., Sept. 30. — A 30-year-old Cleveland mother is being held in jail today on charges that she drowned her two children in a bathtub.

Mrs. A. H. Brent, wife of a Shell Oil Company employee now in Venezuela, was charged yesterday with two counts of murder after neighbors to the Brent home found the children submerged in the bathtub. Liberty County Attorney Jeff Cochran said.

The children were Linda, 3, and James, 18 months old. At the jail, county officials reported Mrs. Brent to be hysterical and seemingly unaware of the tragedy.

## Fire, Oil Blast Inflict Big Loss to Portland Pier

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 30. — A fire and oil explosion at the General Petroleum Corp. docks here early yesterday caused over \$275,000 damage to an oil barge and a pier.

A tug crewman was tossed high into the air by the explosion of the barge, but escaped serious injury.

R. E. Black, manager of the Oregon branch of Socony Vacuum, reported damage to the firm's pier and dock area was \$200,000 and O. C. Bennett said replacement cost of the Tide-water-Shaver owned barge would be \$75,000. The tug was not damaged.

Crated After Delivery — MISSOULA, Mont., Sept. 30. — Apple boxes and peach crates solved a shortage of living quarters at St. Patrick's hospital.

The hospital has facilities designed for only 12 new born babies but 38 infants arrived during the past few days. Boxes and crates solved the problem. They were rigged up as cribs.
