Ruth M. France gave a very enlightening talk on the subject "Can Women Hold Their Line on Jobs?" Mrs. France said, quoting from reliable statistics, that by 1950 there would be more than 16,000,000 women holding down jobs, approximately one fourth of the working population. That this number could be roughly divided into three groups, those who are more or less temporarily employed, those permanently employed in a business or profession, and those who must work to support themselves and in many cases their family. It has been found that one out of every ten women working are thereby independently supported. There were 84 out of 100 in 1944 that had to support themselves and in many cases dependents. This commendable observation has been made, that wherever women are employed in large numbers, living conditions are improved, that is, cafeterias, rest-rooms and other favorable facilities. From this comes the important question of equal pay. It is now a bill under discussion, it should be of interest to every man and woman. Most of Oregon's school systems have installed equal salary scales for their teachers. It would seem apparent that if women can take equal responsibilities with men in their work, they should expect to be equally compensated for their work, likewise they should take an equally interested attitude toward the making of the laws that control their status.
