Building Stop Order Ignored at Grants Pass

ing with organized protest meetings of their own.

Officials directing the meeting here last night included James Chinnock, temporary chairman; Earl C. Schweizer, John W. Carroll and B. R. Staats. A resolution was presented by them to the group which was passed without a dissenting vote.

This resolution pointed out that considerable private construction, both residential and commercial had been stopped in Josephine County by the CPA, that there was little hope that such construction could be resumed under present policies of that organization, and the attendant "extremely grave housing shortage was working an undue hardship on everyone."

Vets Held Hindered

Decrying failure of the CPA to channel materials into veterans homes and stating its belief that "said policy is discouraging and preventing veterans and others from entering into business..." providing themselves and others with sustaining employment in the years to come, copies of the resolution were sent to congressmen and senators representing the state and to various Chambers of Commerce.

"Representing a substantial majority of private and prospective builders," the resolution further urged "the peoples to make immediate and vigorous protest against the unreasonable existence of building restrictions, and to further take such direct action as may be necessary in order to bring about the immediate withdrawal and cancellation of all unnecessary existing federal restrictions to construction."

A copy of the resolution was also submitted to the resolutions committee of the American Legion convention now in session in San Francisco.

Race Track, Gaming Den Hit

One of the commercial builders present said he had been stopped by CPA when he needed only five doors and seven hangers to complete his building, and that he was able to secure some restricted material only after he threatened to release several GIs he had working for him.

Hearty approval was expressed when one of the group assailed the regulations and pointed out that a huge gambling club and race track had but recently been completed in a nearby city and put into operation.

"There must be something vitally wrong when a gambling institution and race track can get all of the materials they desire to build and an honest man, who

is poor, can't get a single piece of lumber to build his own home," the speaker said.

Facing the prospect of court action threatened against any builder defying the regulations of the CPA, members at the meeting, without dissent, agreed to a stand solidly behind one another in their determination to build and to do it now.

39 Die When Airliner Hits Newfoundland Hill

to Berlin and plunged into the side of a rocky hill 10 minutes after it left Stephenville, Nfld., at 3:24 A. M. (EST). It left New York yesterday at 10:55 A. M.

The Air France captain, Jacques Charnoz, said he was at Gander, Nfld., 225 miles from the scene of the crash, when it occurred. "I could see the glow of the explosion before I took off," he said, "after the takeoff, we circled the wreck. The plane hit the side of a hill quite high up and was still smoking."

Earlier reports to the Coast Guard indicated the plane hit one-half mile up the side of the hill and 100 feet from the top of the slope, which is covered with rocks and scrub trees.

Former Horror Recalled
It was the second plane tragedy in the Newfoundland wilds in two weeks. On Sept. 18 a Belgian Sabena airliner crashed near Gander, killing 27 of the 44 aboard.

Stephenville is on the west coast of Newfoundland, 921 air miles from New York and approximately 225 miles west of Gander.

SEATTLE, Oct. 3. (AP)—Rudolph Zane, 42, a passenger on a DC-4 which crashed in Newfoundland early today, was on the staff of the University of Washington Bureau of Mines. His wife, Claire, 43, was also listed as a passenger. Both were on the passenger list as "document analysts."

He graduated from the university in chemical engineering in 1930.

He and Mrs. Zane left here Sept. 22 on an assignment given him by the Department of Commerce to examine German industrial documents. They had a four-year-old boy.

Grocery Bandit Nabbed; Two Others Are Sought

PORTLAND, Oct. 3. (AP)—Robert Gillock, 33, was behind jail bars a few minutes after a grocery store hold-up here last night, but police still sought a pair of gunmen in two attempted robberies in which one clerk was shot and another grocer beaten.

Detectives, recognizing a description of Gillock broadcast by police radio, hurried to his hotel room and arrested him. They said they found \$300 cash in a paper bag taken from the store.

The two others sought attempted to rob another grocery store and wounded George Carpenter in the jaw as he grappled with one gunman. He had first resisted at the door, then tussled again as he knelt at the store safe. They fled as the gun discharged.

Later John Michaelson, 55, was slugged when he refused to open his grocery store safe. He told police the men fired three shots as they fled.

Jenkins Assails False Ideas About Newspapers

PORTLAND, Oct. 3. (AP)—Newspapers' obligation to help teach people "to get along with one another" in a world of powerful destructive forces was emphasized here in a National Newspaper week address by Frank Jenkins, publisher of the Klamath Falls News and Herald.

Jenkins told an Oregon advertising club group "the most precious gift any democratic people can possess" is freedom of the press, and attacked what he said was a public delusion that newspaper policies are dominated by advertisers or politicians. "The truth is," the publisher

asserted, "that government is the undying enemy of the newspaper and will remain so as long as editors are free to tell the truth about politicians who have become corrupt by remaining too long in power."
