Douglas County 4-H Club members will have a number of exhibits at the Pacific International Livestock Show at Portland, October 5 through 12, said Kenneth C. Minnick, county club agent, today.

Carol Schattner will exhibit an Angus steer; Edna Mae Andrews, Redpoll; Kenneth Swift, Donald Ollivant, Looking Glass, and Bill Matthews, Melrose, will all exhibit fleeces.

Canned fruit will be exhibited by Ann Roth, Marjorie Zeller, Nancy Nichols, and Morna Moffett, all of Brockway. Marjorie Zeller will also have her clothing IV project on exhibit.

Rural youth from most of the Northwest will be represented at the livestock exposition, with 4-H entries from Oregon and Washington including 49 dairy cattle, 106 sheep, 246 hogs, and 263 beef animals.

In addition to the livestock showing, club events will include competition between judging and demonstrating teams, including 50 livestock judging teams, 10 poultry teams, and 12 crop teams.

Byrnes Joins With Stalin in Denying New War Danger

PARIS, Oct. 3. — (AP) — Secretary of State Byrnes declared today that the difficulty facing the world's peace-makers was that, while no nation wants war, nations may pursue policies or

courses of action which lead to war.

Secretary Byrnes hailed the recent statement of Soviet Prime Minister Stalin that there was no immediate danger of new armed conflict, but he said that "nations may seek political and economic advantages which they cannot obtain without war."

"That is why, if we wish to avoid war, we must deny not only war but the things which lead to war," he said in an address to the American luncheon club here.

"Just because war is not now imminent, we must take the greatest care not to plant the seeds of a future war. We must seek less to defend our actions in the eyes of those who already agree with us and more to defend our actions in the eyes of those who do not agree with us. But our defense must be the defense of justice and freedom, the defense of the political and economic rights not of a few privileged

men or nations but all men and all nations."

No Danger Seen

Byrnes said the "conflict of viewpoints among the allies" was serious, but, echoing Stalin, he said there was no immediate danger of war.

"After every great war which has been won by the combined efforts of many nations, there has been a conflict among the allies in the making of peace," Byrnes said. "It would be folly to deny the seriousness of the conflict in

viewpoints among the allies after this war."

"To ignore that conflict or minimize its seriousness will not solve the conflict nor help us along the road to peace."

"To exaggerate that conflict and its seriousness, on the other hand, only makes more difficult the resolution of the conflict."

"I concur most heartily in the view recently expressed by Generalissimo Stalin that there is no immediate danger of war. I hope that his statement will put an end to the unwarranted charges that

any nation or group of nations is seeking to encircle the Soviet Union, or that the responsible leaders of the Soviet Union believe."

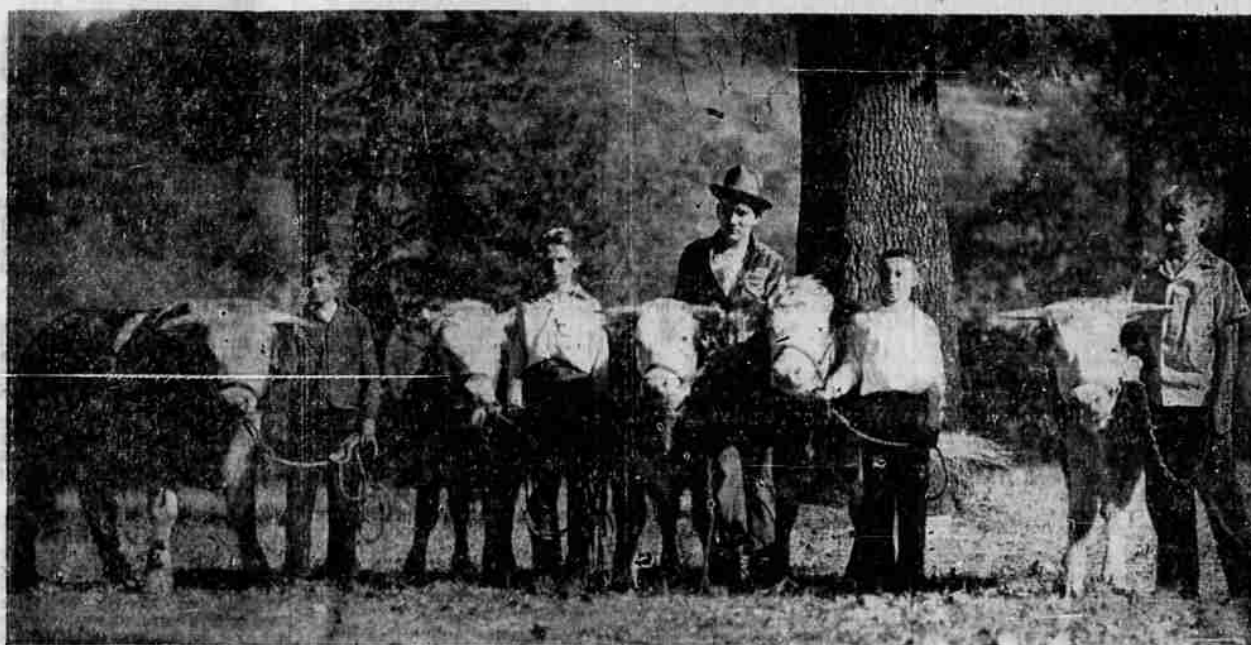
