Myrtle Creek Naval Officer Given Medal for War Duty

Captain Edwin V. Raines, USN, of Myrtle Creek, assigned to duty at Twelfth Naval District headquarters, San Francisco, as assistant port director, was presented the Legion of Merit with citation by Rear Admiral M. S. Tisdale, USN, commandant, San Francisco Naval Base, in ceremonies held last Thursday in the admiral's offices at Mare Island Naval Shipyard. Admiral Tisdale is a son of the late Mark Tisdale of Sutherlin. The citation of Raines, signed by Admiral J. H. Towers, USN, reads as follows: "For exceptionally meritorious conduct in the performance of outstanding services in the Pacific ocean area from September, 1939, to November, 1944. As commanding officer of the USS Robin, he initiated a radical change in target practices which was used throughout the war. He organized four staffs within the service force and an overseas base at Auckland, New Zealand. Subsequently as commanding officer of the USS Kankakee, he supported the bombardment by three destroyer squadrons of Rabaul and Kavieng in February, 1944. As a task unit commander of fleet oilers, he contributed materially to the raids on Palau, Yap, Woleai and Ulithi from 30 March to 1 April, the capture and occupation of Saipan, the first battle of the Philippine Sea from 11 to 20 June, and the occupation of the Palau Islands in September, 1944. His performance of duty was outstanding and his conduct was at all times in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service." Mrs. Raines was present at the ceremony.
