Dewey, Taft Split Over Nazi Hanging Sentences

Chiseling on Retail Price Tags to Stop Sales Must be Made on Basis of Cost at Time of Shipment, OPA Edict

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—OPA changed some of its price tag rules today to end what one official called "chiseling by some retailers."

Involved are many so-called "brand name" items such as clothing, shoes, furniture, rugs and shower curtains. Usually well-advertised and sold on a uniform price basis, the retail price ceiling has been placed on them by the manufacturer and producer.

Previously when this ceiling price advanced, OPA allowed the retailer to re-tick the entire stock at the new higher prices. This must stop October 14, OPA announced, so that sales are made on a basis of actual cost at the time of shipment—plus the legal profit margin at that time.

The result may be that some retailers will be offering identical "brand names" at different ceiling prices.

"Too many retailers were getting wind of impending price increases," the OPA official told a reporter. "Then they would hold their entire stocks back, wait for a new shipment and re-tick the whole lot at the higher price."

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Timber Industry of Douglas Slated for Large Expansion, Questionnaire Replies Show

Douglas county's timber industry is scheduled for large expansion as materials, equipment and manpower become available, according to early returns from a questionnaire sent out by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

The questionnaire, mailed to 289 logging, sawmill and piling operators, lumber products and wood manufacturing plants, asks figures on present plant capacity, proposed capacity increase, present number of employees, anticipated increase in number of employees, present annual car loadings and anticipated increase in annual car loadings.

Only a small percentage of replies has been received to date, but almost without exception plans for expansion are listed.

Information received is to be used only in totals, and individual reports will be kept confidential.

Fairness of Trials Defended By N. Y. Governor; Cleavage Elates Democratic Leaders

(The Associated Press.)
Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, potential rivals for the 1948 Republican Presidential nomination, split sharply today over the Nazi crimes trials.

As Democrats kept up their attacks on Taft's criticism of the Nuremberg verdicts, Dewey touched off the GOP leadership clash in New York last night when he came out bluntly in opposition to the Ohio senator's views.

Without mentioning Taft by name, Dewey defended the fairness of the trials and declared: "No one can have any sympathy for these Nazi leaders who brought such agony upon the world."

In Washington, Democrats who have experienced their own intraparty troubles of late, gleefully hailed the Taft-Dewey cleavage as likely to lessen the emphasis on the recent foreign policy schism between former Secretary of Commerce Wallace and Secretary of State Brynes.

Senator Lucas (D-Ill.), describing Taft's stand as a "classical example of his muddled and confused thinking," predicted in a statement that Carroll Reece, chairman of the Republican National Committee, "will not permit the senator to make any more speeches." Lucas added: "I charge the senator (Taft) made the statement about the Nuremberg trial solely for political vengeance or advantage. And I predict that this will be a

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Petition Demands Decontrol of Meat

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The fight for decontrol of beef headed for a showdown today when the beef advisory committee formally authorized filing of a petition to remove price ceilings from cattle, beef and veal.

The committee voted 11 to 1 to petition for decontrol, and authorized Robert G. Thomas, executive vice president of the Lima Packing Company, Lima, Ohio, to file the petition.

Hayne told reporters that the petition will be based on a contention that, under terms of the Price Control Act, beef is eligible for decontrol. One eligibility requirement is that beef cattle be in ample supply.

An OPA official told reporters the agency now is working on new regulations which he said deal with distribution of meat supplies and increases in prices on some meats.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson has virtually committed himself to rejecting the beef advisory committee petition. The next step would be an appeal to the Independent Decontrol Board.

No Progress Made in Logging Strike Parley

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Negotiations between CIO loggers and operators of 60 stricken camps in the Columbia River basin resumed today after no particular progress was made yesterday.

About 5,000 loggers are idle in the dispute over a contract provision that operators contend the strike stems from a local issue at a Deep River, Wash., camp where CIO workers refused to work with non-union employees.

Sheriffs Liable if Wrists Served on Sundays, Ruling

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—County sheriffs who serve writs of attachment on Sundays may be criminally liable and thus subject to a fine of \$5 to \$50. Attorney General Neuner ruled today.

Justices of the peace have power to release from jail persons who are serving sentences of less than six months, Neuner also ruled.

Salem Plans Limit on Speed of S.P. Trains

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Salem city council voted last night to draft an ordinance limiting the speed of trains to 25 miles an hour.

The action is the result of an accident in which three youths were killed at the Madison Street crossing when their car was hit by a train.

The council also decided to ask the Southern Pacific Railroad to install signals at four crossings.

Gold-Bearing Ore of New Pine Creek Find Assays \$1,776 a Ton

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Wellman Smith, miner who recently reported a rich vein of gold-bearing ore on his Meade County, Calif., property, has struck a gold fissure in his mine assaying at \$1,776.75 a ton.

Smith said the Colorado Assaying Co., Denver, which confirmed his previous discovery of a \$800 a ton vein, had assayed the new vein run.

(At Denver, Edmund E. Phillips, vice president of Colorado Assaying Co., confirmed Smith's new find, but said he did not know where Smith's "excellent" ore was found.)

The New Pine Creek district prospector said samples of his new ore had been picked at random from wall to wall of a fissure vein which had widened to about 20 inches and was 24 feet deep.

A small rush of gold hunters was set off by his earlier report several weeks ago, but most of the prospectors will be unable to work their claims because of snows in the mountainous sector along the California-Oregon-Nevada border.

Roosevelt, Rogers Pace Demo Drive

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 8.—(AP)—There's a Roosevelt on the stump in California and the state's Democrats hoed today to combine the potent political name with that of Will Rogers, Jr., into a November 5 victory in hard-fought state and house races.

The Roosevelt is James, 38-year-old eldest son of the late President. As Democratic state chairman he has teamed with Rogers, son of the late humorist, in a tussle not only to win an election but to rejuvenate and control a Democratic party which suffered a smashing defeat when Republican Gov. Earl Warren won both major party primary nominations to succeed himself.

The two young men, with a mission that admittedly looks as much toward 1948 and thereafter as to next month's test at the polls, have thrown their well-known names into a battle with Senator William F. Knowland, youthful Republican, for the seat which the latter has filled by Warren's appointment.

Both sides say the race is a close one with Roosevelt and Rogers trying to turn the victory trick with a caravan campaign that has taken them into every corner of this expansive state and Knowland battling vigorously in a stunning tour that hasn't missed a way-station.

Cleaner Business Here Purchased by C. H. Honn

The Mercury New Method Cleaners at 217 E. Douglas street was purchased this week by C. H. Honn, formerly of Cheyenne, Wyo., from V. H. Van Horn of Roseburg.

Honn, previously foreman of a large cleaning plant in Cheyenne, last week established residence in Roseburg with his wife and four-year son, purchasing a home at 419 Pitzer street.

"We had heard of Roseburg being a very promising city for an independent business and upon looking it over my wife and I both thought the city very favorable," Honn said. His father, from whom he learned the dry cleaning trade, operates a similar establishment in Akron, Kan.

Honn reports he can handle any and all types of dry cleaning on a cash-and-carry basis. When the necessary transportation equipment becomes available delivery service will be put into use. The present staff of employees will be retained, Honn added.

Cigaret Prices Upped By Two Manufacturers

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Cigaret price increases of 25 cents a thousand, effective yesterday, were announced almost simultaneously by two of the major producers, the American Tobacco Co., and Philip Morris and Co., Ltd.

The net increase is equivalent to one half cent a pack. However, it is anticipated in trade circles that retailers probably will boost prices one cent a pack since they were required to absorb the 1 cent increase granted to manufacturers by OPA last April. The prices of cartons are expected to be lifted from five to seven cents. American is the maker of Lucky Strikes.

PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Civilian Production Administration yesterday announced that Arbuckle, Inc.'s request for a \$2,000 store alteration at Roseburg had been rejected by the Washington CPA office.

Collection of Garbage Given Higher Rates

An ordinance boosting Roseburg's garbage collection rates was passed by the city council last night. The new rate schedule is in line with those of other Northwestern cities and sets the basic residential collection rate at \$1.25 per month, effective November 1.

Mayor Charles W. Wharton reported that J. C. Compton of McMinnville who assumed the Lloyd M. Hill contract for reinforcing the sewage disposal plant dike, when he purchased the Hill property here last August, will be unable to fulfill his contract until a later date.

Wharton also reported no word from the State Highway Department as to when the traffic signals at Oak and Cass Streets, on Stephens, will be installed. Several months ago the city paid \$1,600 to the state as its share.

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U. S. Needs Patience With Russia, Eleanor Says

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt says patience and perseverance are necessary for "an understanding with Russia."

"Why should we be frightened at Russia?" she asked 400 women of the National Citizens' Political Action Committee yesterday. "We have the power, Russia hasn't."

"It is the most exasperating thing in the world, but I have made up my mind that I am going through all the arguments just as though I didn't know at the time that it would have no effect. If I have patience enough, in a year from now, perhaps the Russians will come with a different attitude."

Women's League Scores Dairymen on Claims

PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Oregon League of Women Voters has accused Oregon dairymen of making conflicting claims about butter and milk supply to justify price increases of both commodities.

In a letter to the National Decontrol Board at Washington, D. C., Mrs. Jerome L. Holzman, president, said milk producers are claiming a milk price boost is necessary because the fluid supply is going to creameries. She said the butter industry recently justified a butter price hike by a similar argument that fluid butterfat was going into the milk trade.

W. W. Henry, manager of the dairy cooperative here, reported the milk supply was dwindling. Other milk producer spokesmen declined to be quoted but predicted a 1-cent a quart price boost by the end of the week.

Court Refuses to Jail 92-Year-Old Defendant

PORTLAND, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Multnomah District Judge Hendrickson barred the jail to 92-year-old Albert Miller and sent the nonagenarian home yesterday because he was too old.

Miller had to be helped across the threshold of the court house and supported by officers as he walked into the courtroom to face charges of assault and battery.

CAA Engineers to Receive Requests for Aid in Airport Project on Roseburg Visit

Engineers of the Civil Aeronautics Administration will be in Roseburg October 14 to assist interested groups in filing requests for federal aid in building and improving public airports, it was announced today by Donald N. Harper, district engineer for the CAA.

Project requests may be filed by communities, cities, counties, and other public agencies, or a combination of the foregoing, interested in developing or improving an airport.

The filing of project requests will furnish a guide for the amount of federal funds desired under the Federal Airport Act, enacted May 13, 1946, and will aid in the allocation of such funds to meet the aviation needs of this area.

The filing of a project request does not obligate the federal government to definitely allocate funds for a project, nor does it obligate the public agency concerned to commit itself to a development program. The filing of a project request by a public

Arrest of Former Reichsbank Head Under Anti-Nazi Law Challenged By His Counsel

STUTTGART, Germany, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Dr. Richard Schmid, state attorney of Wuertemberg-Baden, challenged today the legality of Hjalmer Schacht's arrest last night and demanded that the former Nazi economic minister be released until he is convicted by a German denazification court.

Schmid cited the German denazification law, which provides that Germans accused of Nazi affiliation should not be confined until after they are convicted by a denazification court. Schacht's arrest was ordered on charges that he had been a "leading" Nazi.

The irascible former reichsbank head was arrested here last night an hour after he arrived from Nuremberg, where he was acquitted of war crimes charges by the International military tribunal a week ago today, and several hours after the chairman of the Nuremberg denazification board announced that proceedings had been instituted against Schacht, Franz Von Papen and Hans Fritzsche, who also were acquitted.

Schacht's arrest was ordered by the Wuertemberg-Baden ministry of state despite a declaration earlier in the day by Lt. Gen. Lucius D. Clay, deputy U. S. Military Governor that the military government preferred that the three acquitted defendants not be arrested "until they can be tried under denazification laws and found guilty."

BERLIN, Oct. 8.—(AP)—The Allied Control Council for Germany will meet in extraordinary session here tomorrow to consider clemency appeals filed for Nazi war criminals sentenced by the International Military Tribunal a week ago.

Appeals have been filed by all but three of the 19 Nazis sentenced. Those who disclaimed appeals were Ernest Kaltenbrunner, the gestapo chief, sentenced

Body of Missing Child Found in Stagnant Pool

SECAUCUS, N. J., Oct. 8.—(AP)—The sight of a tiny hand protruding from oozy mud at the edge of a stagnant pool brought to a tragic end last night the three-day search for Douglas Koeneveld, two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Koeneveld, Sr.

The body of the youngster who disappeared Saturday morning while he was playing with his brother on the pig farm home of his parents, was discovered on a stock farm 500 feet from his home while searching parties were dynamiting other nearby pools. Police theorized the detonations had brought the body to the surface, shaking it loose from the mire bottom of the pool.

The mother collapsed when told the boy was dead but the father received the news stoically.

U. S. Troops Aid Korean Police to Restore Order

SEOUL, Oct. 8.—(AP)—U. S. troops reinforced Korean police in the Fusan area of Southeast Korea today in the wake of sporadic violence which killed 16 civilians Monday. The Americans succeeded in restoring order without firing a shot, and there were no further casualties.

Police in Seoul remained silent on the fate of Woon Hyung Lyuh, head of the leftist (non-communist) People's Party. His friends feared that he had been kidnapped by communists after he signed an agreement with conservatives. The agreement set up a coalition which promptly asked American permission to establish a Southern Korea legislature.

Thrown Baseball Hits, Kills Athletic Coach

SAN JOSE, Ill., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Harold Gobin, 43, coach and athletic director at San Jose High School, died in a hospital last night a few hours after he was struck in the head by a baseball thrown during a practice game at the school field. Gobin was batting when the accident occurred.

Service Station Bought By Kenny Ellison

A change in ownership of the General Petroleum service station at 740 S. Stephens street took place Monday, with Kenny Ellison purchasing the business from Nick Nicholson.

Formerly a driver of city school buses, Ellison will also have the Roseburg agency of the Beehive U-Drive trucks at the site of his station.

Lifting of Controls on Small Projects Urged

LAKEVIEW, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Proposed lifting of all construction controls on projects under \$15,000 has the support of the Lake County Chamber of Commerce.

The Lake county group said in a resolution joining Grants Pass and Astoria chambers that CPA regulations have failed to achieve their goal on veterans' housing.

Jack Gorthy Finds Way Out Of Coast Area

Sore, Tired After Being Lost in Region While Tracking Wounded Deer

Jack Gorthy, 23, Roseburg, was home today, sore and tired, after being lost since Sunday in the rugged Coast Range, 30 miles from Roseburg. He had become lost while tracking a deer he had wounded in the Hubbard Creek area.

State guardsmen, the Sheriff's posse, and a bloodhound were in the search yesterday. Gorthy had gone into the mountains Friday with a hunting party which included Raymond G. Olson, Sr., lieutenant in the State Guard company here, of which Gorthy was a member; Olson's two sons, Raymond, Jr., and Kenneth; Donald Chasteen and Robert Gorthy.

The hunting party requested aid in the search for their hunting companion after he failed to return to camp, while tracking the deer. Fellow guardsmen joined the search yesterday, using the bloodhound belonging to "Red" Eckhardt of Melrose.

Gorthy found his own way back to camp yesterday. He said he had managed to build a camp fire during his over-night wandering. Sore and tired, he suffered slightly from exposure, and was aided into the truck which returned him to Roseburg late last night, by members of the searching party.

CPA Agent Faces Grants Pass Ordeal

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Decision was expected today on whether Grants Pass builders would continue their defiance of stop-work orders issued by the Civilian Production Administration.

The Steering Committee of the Citizens' Protective Association was to meet today, following last night's mass meeting at which 900 persons engaged in a forum discussion and hurled questions at Charles C. Bayles, National Housing Administration expediter for this area.

C. W. Thornberry, secretary of the Grants Pass Chamber of Commerce, presented the local case, in which he asserted that the CPA has failed utterly in providing homes for veterans. "Grants Pass does not oppose government by law," he said, "but Grants Pass does raise its voice in protest against arbitrary government by men whose abuse of self-assumed power violated the principle of the very law under which they purport to operate."

Sam Bowe, local American Legion commander, presented a resolution condemning the CPA as having failed and urging that its "unreasonable construction restrictions" be discontinued.

Bowe said that "Veterans' Homes, Inc., has filled out the priority forms for veterans only to discover that the group, made up wholly of veterans, was not eligible."

Union Ousts Head Who Charged Red Control

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Delegates to the biennial convention of the CIO United Shoe Workers of America voted by acclamation yesterday to oust their president, Frank R. McGrath of New York, who charged last week that the union was dominated by communists.

Statehood Demand at Issue in Alaska's Vote

JUNEAU, Alaska, Oct. 8.—(AP)—Air-minded Alaska, a crossroads for "top of the world" flights, decides today whether to seek statehood after intensive fighting campaigns by many candidates. The issue was generally expected to carry. Numerous business leaders, however, oppose statehood at this time. They have argued the costs of setting up a state government would be too great for the small population. A territory since 1912, Alaska has never voted on statehood and even if passed today, congress must still pass an enabling law and a constitution be written and adopted.

Heart Attack Kills Deer Hunter After Mile Hike
