LANSING, Kas., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Two state penitentiary convicts escaped from a work detail, hid in a nearby woods until nightfall and then made their way to a highway.

U. S., Britain Demand Danube Trade Freedom

"The task of rehabilitating Europe is made infinitely more difficult," Bevin said, "so long as there is a barrier between the west and the east in the Danube area and the commercial interests of the west are met in Romania by a whole host of discriminatory acts."

Bevin said that the Russian proposal, which sought "to restrict the use of the Danube exclusively to the countries along its banks, is not only a retrograde step but a deliberate discriminatory action against their allies."

"It is this policy which gives rise to a good deal of suspicion as to the designs of the Soviet Union in this part of the world," Bevin said.

Navy Turning U. S. Flag Into Scarecrow. Russian Paper Says

MOSCOW, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The government newspaper Izvestia, commenting on the visit of the U. S. aircraft carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt to the Mediterranean, declared today that the American flag "obviously is being turned into a scarecrow with the help of which American reactionaries intend to enforce the policies of the United States."

"The sailing of the American squadron to the Mediterranean sea means that representatives of reaction in the United States have successfully shown their flag to all the aggressive pro-Fascist elements in Europe," Izvestia declared.

"The reactionary crowd of the Mediterranean countries kept their eyes on the American squadron during its whole cruise," the paper added, "and with malicious caws prophesied about the closeness of a new war."

Philippine Boyey Seen

The Communist organ Pravda meanwhile published a lengthy article which declared Philippine independence was a fiction and that Philippine economy remained under the absolute control of American capitalists and American troops stationed in the islands.

"Beneath the declaration of independence is hidden a violation of the principles of the United Nations," Pravda said. "American troops have remained in the Philippines and the national liberating committee is being suppressed on the islands by armed force. Under the guise of giving political independence only new forms of foreign, political, economic and military domination are being forced on the Philippine people."

"Two special bills, which were already adopted by the American congress and signed by Truman bear witness that the United States is tending to preserve the colonial character of Philippine economy, to perpetuate the economic dependence of the Philippines on American capital and to make the islands into a permanent base for the American army and navy in the western Pacific."

LONDON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—U. S. headquarters in Europe today lifted a mysterious ban on American plane flights over Czechoslovakia, but continued suspension of flights over Romania and Hungary, and an American pilot said here he believed the order was linked with Russian army maneuvers.

The ban on flights over the three countries, all in the Rus-

sian sphere of influence, was dropped down suddenly and without explanation yesterday by U. S. authorities in Frankfurt, Germany. Similarly, no explanation was given why the Czechoslovak ban had been removed, just as suddenly as it was imposed.

ups and downs of national economy throughout the country's history, and predicted another depression in the near future unless some new system is adopted.

He lauded Governor Snell for the latter's successful efforts in increasing the rate of old-age assistance in Oregon, but pointed to the difficulties encountered by pensioners during the current inflationary period.

The United States, he said, has 17 million people above the age of 60 years, and only 20 per cent of these are capable of making a living wage. "Therefore," the speaker concluded, "we ask each of you to pay a tithe of three per cent of your income back to your state to enrich the lives of your elders so that you may make a profit on their release from slavery and submission."

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board's position as untenable at present and to contend that continued wage controls are inappropriate and inadvisable.

The recent order of Reconversion Director Steelman, in effect bypassing the board's decision denying part of the pay increase negotiated by AFL seamen with shipowners, was understood to be one of the major factors in bringing about the resignations.

Barrett said all other industry members of regional boards would follow suit and that some telegrams of resignation already had arrived at the WSB.

Crisis Foreseen

Even though President Truman was able to fill the two principal industry jobs on the main board, it would be difficult to choose new employer representatives for each of the regional boards.

For that reason there were suggestions that a new executive order might set up the WSB as an agency with only public members.

Barrett told a reporter that he and Cannon had foreseen a crisis like that of the maritime dispute and for that reason had attempted to withdraw as of August 17.

The AFL has been agitating for withdrawal of labor representation on the board, on the theory that price controls have been virtually nullified and that the continuance of wage controls imposes a hardship on wage earners. Brutality of Jap Doctor Narrated

TOKYO, Oct. 10.—(AP)—A former Japanese medical officer today was accused of operating on allied prisoners of war while under the influence of liquor and of performing surgery although he was qualified only as a physician.

He is 2nd Lt. Hiroshi Fujii, formerly of Omori POW camp, who also was accused in war crimes charges of beating prisoners and converting Red Cross and medical supplies to his own use.

The charges specified that Fujii performed a hemorrhoid operation on a screaming soldier without anesthetic, although there was a liberal supply in the next room, then held up his scalpel and exclaimed: "This knife has now found American blood."

He was charged with torturing James J. Landrum, Richmond, Va., by performing an appendectomy before a spinal anesthetic took effect.

He was charged with beating Alfred A. Weinstein, Chelsea, Mass., with his fists, kicking him, throwing him through a window and forcing him to stand an hour in the rain.

Other alleged victims were listed.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Oct. 10.—(AP)—A 10-year-old boy burned to death in a fire which late last night leveled the home of Sam Wong, prosperous farmer of Chinese descent living on the state highway between here and Merrill.

Jack Chinn, 10, Wong's son, was the victim of the blaze, and his brother, Joe, 8, was severely burned.

Pay Hike Granted Bakers

A strike of AFL bakers in Washington, which had curtailed the capital's bread supplies by about 50 per cent, was settled. A union spokesman said the strikers had accepted a recommendation of their negotiations committee giving them a raise of 15 cents an hour. The old pay scale ranged from 65 cents to \$1.45 an hour for both day and night workers.

In New York a seven-day walk-out by 400 AFL bus drivers and maintenance men ended after the members of AFL Amalgamated Association of Street, Electric and Motor Coach Employees of

America voted to settle their strike against the Isle Transportation Corporation by accepting a \$1.15 hourly wage rate, a boost of nine cents. The union had demanded a hike of 20 cents.
