Indian Squad to Leave Friday for Springfield Tilt

Team and school spirits were high today as Coach Mel Ingram's Indians took a rest from a week of strenuous workouts in preparations for Friday afternoon's game at Springfield, expected to be the crucial contest of the season.

The Indians, who have rolled up 107 points in three games, while opponents have gathered only two points, an automatic safety scored by University High, have been well groomed for Friday's tussle.

The Springfield Millers will have a heavier and more experienced line than Roseburg, and will be paced by 200-pound Fullback Clingman, a triple-threat man who is expected to give the Indians plenty of trouble.

The Millers, playing in the Big Six league this year, have had two games, one a 0 to 0 tie with Corvallis and the other a 20 to 0 beating from Eugene High, although Springfield outgained Corvallis in scrimmage and broke even on gains with the Axemen.

The Indians will be somewhat handicapped as Willie veteran guard, has a cracked collarbone, and Fullback Ulrich, is suffering from a severe case of shin-splints. Both boys probably will see service in the pinches, but will spend most of the time on the bench.

Ingram announces his starting lineups as: Ends, Benson and Howard; tackles, Marsters and Moore; guards, McCowan and Obenhausser or Wilhite; center, Feldkamp; Keene, quarterback; Harvey and Pope, halfbacks; Evans, fullback. Reserves will in-

clude Stritzky and Denton, ends; Hlaner and Hughes, tackles; Edgar and Mayborne, guards; Ulrich, Davidson, Phillips, Scofield, backs.

Three busloads of students will be among the Roseburg fans attending the game. The Roseburg High School Band, sponsored by the Elks lodge will have 70 uniformed members present and will parade in Eugene and Springfield ahead of game time.

Nails, Once \$3.75 A Keg, Now Bring As High as \$50

WASHINGTON—To those people who remember when their hardware dealer would gladly give them all the nails they needed for a small job around the house, the nail shortage is even more "cockeyed" than the scarcity of white shirts.

Nails sold in pre-war days at around \$3.75 a keg now have been reported by the National

Housing Agency (NHA) to be bringing as high as \$50 a keg in the black market. In thousands of communities a few nails for a household repair job can't be had at any price.

Why the great scarcity? It's a matter of large demands for construction and repair work, combined with the shortage of steel and ceiling prices on nails which have not been high enough to stimulate manufacturers to the required production. Dealers are required to set aside 75 per cent of their monthly deliveries for veterans' housing.

The steel strike, cutting off supplies of that metal, lowered the production of nails early this year. The output dropped from

an annual rate of 516,000 tons in the third quarter of 1945 to 405,000 tons in the first quarter of 1946. Also, despite substantial price increases granted by OPA, the industry claims it has been more profitable to divert steel wire rods into the production of items other than nails.

The total requirements for 1946, according to the NHA, are 795,000 tons. Estimated production is about 592,000 tons. The output in August was 61,000 tons, 18 per cent greater than the July production and two-and-a-half times that of last January. The NHA, however, figures it needs to be stepped up to 85,000 or 90,000 tons a month.

The housing agency has asked

the Civilian Production Administration (CPA) to request producers of steel wire rods to increase the supply of rods for nail manufacturers sufficiently to enable them to meet the 85,000 to 90,000 tons a month goal. Under a previous informal agreement with CPA, the industry guaranteed to meet goals of 66,000 tons per month by September.
