Bagged Pheasant Tagging Required

With the pheasant season opening October 19, the Game Commission is calling attention of hunters to the fact that all upland game birds must be properly tagged in the area in which they are killed before they may be possessed or transported to any areas in which there is a closed season or lesser bag limit.

All of the Willamette Valley counties will be closed to hunting. In Malheur county the pheasant season will be open from October 19 to November 3 with a daily bag limit of 4 cocks allowed but not more than 8 in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time. The season in the other 20 counties open to pheasant hunting will be from October 19 to November 3 with a daily bag limit of 3 cocks and not more than 6 in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time. The counties open include Coos, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, Klamath, Deschutes, Crook, Hood River, Wasco, Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler, Morrow, Umatilla, Union, Wallowa, Baker, Grant, Harney, Lake with the exception of the Summer Lake area in Lake County.

Tagging stations will be maintained at all state police patrol stations in the counties open to hunting.

There will be no open season this year on Hungarian partridge, but valley quail may be hunted from October 19 to October 27 in the following counties: Douglas, Josephine, Coos, Jackson, Klamath, Crook, Deschutes, Grant and Wasco.

Bag limit is five a day but not more than 10 in any 7 consecutive days or in possession at any one time.

During a discussion, the announcement said, Comer showed six photographs of the atomic bomb to Rike, whereupon Rike suggested that they try to sell them to a newspaper for approximately \$7,000.

The announcement said the men then got in touch with the Baltimore News-Post. Two representatives of that newspaper, however, became suspicious, the announcement said, and notified the FBI and military authorities.

The FBI said Comer and other un-named ex-servicemen had given copies of the pictures to several unauthorized persons throughout the United States, and added that photographs were recovered by the FBI from persons in Texas, California and North Carolina.

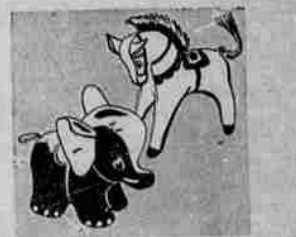

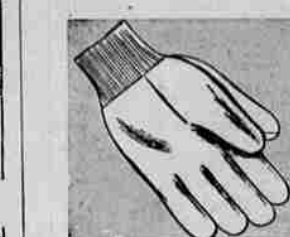
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
