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Boy Scouts Fully Deserving of Share In Community Aid

One of the local agencies which will play a part in the Roseburg Chest drive to open here October 16, and a group which has been equitably allocated in the drive is the Oregon Trail Council, Inc., of the Boy Scouts of America. Their requested budget for the current drive for 1947 is \$2,750 in Roseburg with the Douglas County goal standing at \$750.

Communities active with Boy Scout troops in the Douglas District of the Oregon Trail Council are Azalea, Canas Valley, Drain, Edenbower, Garden Valley, Glendale, Glide, Melrose, Myrtle Creek, Sutherlin, Melrose, and Roseburg. Total scouts for Douglas County is 338, of which 118 are Cubs, or boys 9 to 11 years of age, for a total of 17 troops and packs. In Roseburg three troops are active at present.

Major activities of this International organization during the past year have included the conducting of a district camporee for scout participation, merit badge shows, field days, and special scouting projects.

Civic services rendered during 1945 included participation in waste paper drives, book collections for Army camps, distribution of posters and government information, war fund drives, County Health Association drives, victory gardens, ushering, color guards, and safety drives.

The Oregon Trail Council, Inc., which controls scouting in six counties of this section of Oregon, has laid down its objectives for the coming year and has planned a very expansive program of which a part of the Oregon Chest contributions will make possible.

Roger L. Bales, Scout Executive of the Council issued the following statement in regard to the Chest in which the entire state of Oregon will take part: "We encourage our people to actively participate in the Chest and are happy to note that many of our board members and Scouters are active in Chest leadership. The Chest should be, of course, the combined effort of all the communities; as a participating agency, we work to that end."

Probe Follows Fire That Cost Four Lives

PORTLAND, Oct. 14.—(AP)—State police were aiding fire investigators today in a probe of the rooming house fire which cost four lives Thursday and left two lodgers missing.

Fire investigator William Curtis said police were called in at the request of the fire chief to determine "ownership of the building and conditions surrounding the outbreak of the costly fire."

The building was purchased in July by a firm listed as "The Morrison Warehouse Company" from Frederick H. Strong, Portland insurance man, Curtis reported. It was insured for \$8,000.

Vets' Loans Approved
