If our crowd loses the election and I lose my job? That will mean the end of the world so far as I am concerned. Maybe I've been wrong about price controls being good for the country. They certainly won't be good for ME if they cause me to lose my job."

Too much of that kind of thinking is largely what is wrong with us. We've got to have SOME SINCERITY in our government. Otherwise, we're sunk.

SPAKING of meat, here is a little story from Berlin:

"A German locksmith arrested by American military police is awaiting trial in a military government court on charges of larceny. He has admitted stealing a dog belonging to an American civilian employed by military government and killing it IN ORDER TO GET MEAT FOR HIS 5-YEAR-OLD CHILD."

There is little politics in the meat shortage in Europe.

THERE is a strike on in Wash- ington that has closed 18 of the city's best-known hotels. As a result, this morning's dispatches tell us, "upwards of 10,000 guests made their own beds, carried their own bags and waited for non-striking white-collar help to run on occasional elevator. If they got hungry, they ate out."

LET'S take a good, clear look at this situation.

Considering the kind of people who flock to Washington and jam the hotels, it will do the average guest no harm to make his own bed, carry his own bags and walk up stairs—if he has to. It would even be good for the kind of people who live in hotels in Washington if they couldn't "beat out" and had to cook their own food and wash the dishes afterward. It would bring the realities of life home to them.

Washington is a political city. Most of the people who come there are engaged in the processes of politics. It is quite different from an industrial city, whose inhabitants and visitors are engaged in PRODUCTION.

The effect of interrupting production is to lower the standard of living of all of us. The effect of interrupting politics MIGHT be good. It might cause the politicians to do a little realistic thinking.

So let's not worry too much over the tribulations of Washington's hotel guests who have run head-on into a strike.

THE Duke of Windsor and his American duchess are back in London, where they are creating quite a flurry. The dispatches tell us, for example, that society dowagers are in a tizzy. (They are fussed because they fear that if they snoot Edward and Wallis it might be betting on the wrong horse—which in the higher brackets of "society" ranks as the No. 1 boner.)

The Duke doesn't help them any by remarking that "we shall be seeing Mr. ATLEE and Mr. Churchill and hope to make a number of visits to London." That might mean they'll get back in the swim.

ALL of which serves to remind us common, everyday people who work for a living that EVERYBODY has his troubles.

THE BALLOT MEASURES

Oregon's election system, permitting laws to be initiated by the people or a referendum either by the legislature or by petition, has many points in its favor. On the other hand, it has many disadvantages and weaknesses. It offers opportunities for organized minorities, special groups, crackpots, and others to get legislation before the people. It thereby becomes possible to pass BAD laws because of light votes, failure of the voter to inform himself on the issues, misleading or false presentations, etc.

Oregon's initiative and referendum procedure could be most valuable if every voter was conscientious in his duty. As long as we continue this system it is necessary that voters carefully study each ballot measure. The obligation is essential to the effectiveness of the system.

Of the nine state measures on the November 5th ballot, some are of a complicated nature and others are simple and easily understood.

One of the least complicated is the first measure, a proposed constitutional amendment, which would establish the line of succession to the office of governor. It would add two more officers, the secretary of state and state treasurer, to the line of succession, which now includes the president of the senate, and speaker of the house.

In other words, it places four instead of two persons in line for service should the governor's office become vacant permanently or temporarily by death, resignation, absence from the state, or other inability of the elected governor to discharge his duties.

A technical question is involved as well—a question which has never been brought to issue. This question involves the legal authority of the president of the senate and the speaker of the house to qualify as acting governor between an election and the following Jan. 1, when a new legislature would be organized.

Terms of legislators are only from election to election, not until their successors are elected or qualified. There is a question, therefore, whether a legislator, serving as president of the senate or as speaker of the house would be entitled to claim that rank after an election and prior to organization of the next legislature, even though he might be reelected to his office of senator or representative.

This question has been raised in the past, but has never been definitely settled.

Elective officers hold their positions until Jan. 1 following an election, or until successors have been elected and qualified, which would leave either the secretary of state or state treasurer qualified to serve, should there be any dispute over eligibility of other alternates.

The amendment simply is a safeguard against vacancy in the office of governor, assuring a constitutional successor under any circumstances.

Furthermore, no tax is involved—a rarity on a state ballot.

The second measure on the ballot also needs no interpretation. It proposes a tax levy of 45/100 of a mill for a period of 10 years to construct armories in 22 Oregon cities—more if funds are available. Enlargement of the National Guard is anticipated and the state military authorities are endeavoring to provide facilities for a more extensive defense system.

Aside from the defense angle, it is pointed out that the enlargement of the national guard is economically sound.

The proposed tax would raise approximately five million dollars over a 10-year period. Each national guard company receives federal pay. Guardsmen are paid for each drill they attend, while federal funds cover expenses. During the 10 years Oregon would be raising money to build armories, it is estimated federal payments would amount to \$30 1/2 million. Federal payments would increase in proportion to enlargement of the National Guard.

Principal opposition comes from labor organizations, always suspicious of the state military forces which are available to preserve order, and from anti-tax organizations.

Says Law Misread in Statement Ouster

I read with interest your statement in your September 18th paper "Farrell Explains Ruling on Appeal of Lew Wallace." I am only answering this letter to keep the records straight and I know that your paper will want to do that.

Mr. Farrell's letter of rejection was in part as follows:

"It is necessary for me to rule that the article cannot be published in the pamphlet for the reason that it is in fact a statement prepared by an individual citizen rather than by the State Central Committee or managing officers of the democratic party and for the further reason that it contains matter which the statute above cited requires to be barred from the pamphlet."

Mr. Farrell and the Attorney General both misread the law. They referred to a statement prepared by someone other than the State Committee, whereas the law definitely states "filed" by the State Committee. A perusal of any of the Voters Pamphlets would show many statements prepared by someone but they are all filed by the State Committee exactly as this statement was filed.

Mr. Farrell would have it appear that the Committee upheld his objection. This was not true in any sense of the word. There was not a change in the dotting of an "i" nor the crossing of a "u" nor the removal of a comma in the statement. The Appeal Board, recognizing the difference be-

tween "preparing" and "filing" suggested that quotation marks be placed around all of Mr. Dooley's prepared statement as well as the quotations taken from the Congressional Record included in the statement. This was only a matter of punctuation.

Three Roseburg Teams Billed for Tilts This Week

Football fever will hit a late season peak in Roseburg this week with three local eleven playing host to visiting gridironers at Finlay Field Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday.

The newly formed Roseburg Chiefs' commercial team will meet a highly touted Southern Oregon College of Education junior varsity Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in their debut of the season. The Chiefs, clad in bright red and white suits, will be star-studded with several former college athletes as well as former Roseburg high school turf stalwarts, and, from current reports, will enter the contest slight favorites.

Indians vs. Junction City—Friday evening Mel Ingram's high flying Indians vie for their fourth Tri-County League victory in meeting Junction City. The Indians tripped the Junction City club 34-0 last year and hold a unanimous victory record over the visitors in Ingram's four years at the helm.

The Indians' opponents dropped a 19-0 contest to Cottage Grove, shelled Toledo High School 20-0, and tied Chemawa 6-6 thus far in season play. The Indians will again be favored with their backfield once again at full-strength. Moore, right tackle, injured in last week's tussle with Springfield, will be replaced by Hughes.

The Paposes of junior high, under the mentorship of H. H. "Hod" Turner, will make their first 1946 appearance on Finlay Field Saturday at 2 P. M., meeting the twice-beaten Medford Juniors. Roseburg's squad of 8th and 9th graders began the season entirely inexperienced in turf tactics but have displayed rapid development and, with their decided weight advantage, may trample the junior Tornados, who have dropped contests to Klamath Falls and Ashland.

Roseburg Jr. High Downs Springfield JV Gridgers, 13-0

Roseburg Junior High School Warriors won their first tilt against outside-city opponents yesterday afternoon at Finlay Field, scalping the JV Millers of Springfield, 13-0.

Playing the entire game in the visitors' territory, the Indians scored their first touchdown three minutes after second quarter resumed play. Backfielders Poirot and Scofield set up the scoring alley on three consecutive drives of line scrimmage, first aided by Rogers and Scofield. Poirot took the ball to pay dirt off a quarterback sneak. Madison was rushed by opponents to miss the conversion point.

The Millers were unable to make any major gains against the shrewd scrapper Warriors throughout the game and were repeatedly thrown for losses on line plays. Most outstanding offensive displays of the Millers was the powerful punting of half-back Harris who saved his team against several Indian threats on averaging 40-yard kicks.

In the final stanza Roseburg's reserve halfback, Dick Orr, was snapped the ball on the 35-yard marker and sprinted all the way to the end zone. Madison successfully converted for the final score of 13-0.

Although numerous errors were committed by the locals, and play was exceptionally slow, Coach Jack Newby used two complete evenings during the four quarters, giving valuable experience to all for use in future contests, which include two with Grants Pass junior varsity, and possibly a return match on Springfield grounds.

Aid to Needy in Douglas Increased

Old age assistance, blind assistance, and aid to dependent children has been increased by a total of \$1571 in this county through the aid of the federal government, Miss Helen Falbe, Douglas County welfare administrator, said today.

Federal assistance checks are now being mailed to all Douglas County public welfare clients in the social security category if they are purchasing their own food from their monthly grants but the increased income will have no beneficial influence upon the county's public welfare budget. The additional expense is to be met by the federal government.

Miss Falbe explained that while the extra federal payments, authorized by a congressional amendment to the Social Security Act, will help those on the old age assistance, aid to the blind and aid to dependent children programs, but no gain of benefit will be given general assistance.

Checks for this month, Miss Falbe said, will be mailed to the needy, but in November they will be combined to the larger amount, at the rate of \$5 a month a person for blind and old age assistance recipients and \$3 per child for aid to dependent children families.

Because of the limited general assistance funds the welfare commission has been forced to shorten medical care, eliminating optional surgery, dental work, and optical attendance, confining its payments almost entirely to emergency cases.
