Campfire Girls' Services Worthy Of Chest Sharing

The Campfire Girls, an agency of the federated Roseburg Chest drive which will begin October 16, has shown marked growth in the past three years throughout Douglas County as well as in Roseburg. Their budget, submitted and accepted by the local chest committee, stands at \$500. At present this nation-wide organization for girls has 10 groups active in Roseburg, as well as groups at Drain, Glide and Melrose, for a total of 185 members. In 1942 there were only two active groups within the county. All these groups are advised by the Roseburg council, which is composed of 15 members, all local residents.

Within the Roseburg area there are also two Bluebird groups, for girls 7 to 9 years of age, at Fullerton school and Rose school and Mrs. Harrie W. Booth, chairman of the council, reports, a formation of a third group at Benson school in the near future. Activities of these younger girls is mostly pre-Campfire work in preparation for the older organization.

Expansion Planned
Budget funds obtained through the Community Chest will provide for much expansion in 1947 of the Campfire Girls in this county as well as aid in the salary of the council's new executive secretary, Mrs. Walter Allen, who recently set up an office in Roseburg for the promotion, coordination, and expansion of this organization within this county. Also the budget will finance the national field quota, annual play days and field demonstrations by the local groups, and the Council Fire where the girls are awarded various honors for Campfire activity participation.

Although the local council is not at present strong enough of an area to have its own summer camp, the chest receipts will support a summer play day outing for those unable to self-finance themselves to Camp Kilowan, owned by the Willamette Council, where groups of the state have met in previous years. It is hoped Mrs. Booth stated, that sometime in the near future a Douglas County site will be obtained for an annual summer camp for the girls.

Civic services of this organization include selling poppies and "Forget-me-nots" for disabled and hospitalized war veterans, participation in and ushering in various city ceremonies and parades. The Roseburg groups recently acted as a weekly project of the cleaning up and maintenance of the city park on Jackson and Lane streets. Also local groups will take part in the Roseburg chest drive.

Its first director was John Stark Evans, now head of the music department at Lewis and Clark College, and its first president was Harris Ellsworth, now congressman from Oregon's Fourth district. For the past 10 years, Ralph M. Church has been director and Mrs. Homer Grow accompanist.

The club owns its piano and about \$600 worth of music, now located in the City Hall where rehearsals will be held each Thursday.

All men interested in organized singing are urged to attend the first meeting.

A special invitation is issued to newcomers to the community. Director Church reports. As resumption of activities following a lapse of three years will be akin to beginning a new organization, newcomers will be at no disadvantage, the director said.

The only qualification is an interest in group singing, and ability to function in one of the voice groups. Any newcomers interested are urged to be present at 8 P. M. Thursday when a sing will be enjoyed following the business session.
