controls be scrapped "as soon as this is compatible with economic security of the nation." One of the group told a newspaperman later that "there is no intention on the part of the president to scrap everything at once, so far as price controls are concerned."

Nutrition Classes Set by Red Cross

Roseburg women interested in "spreading" their food budgets during the coming period of rising costs and increased scarcities, may attend nutrition classes, to be sponsored this fall and winter by the Douglas County Chapter of the American Red Cross, it was announced by Mrs. Arthur Clarke, executive secretary.

The classes are to be conducted by Mrs. Stuart Hauck, member of the local chapter.

Interest was shown in nutrition this week, as Miss Mary Belle Beswick, Red Cross field representative for Oregon and Washington, spoke to the board of directors of the Douglas County chapter on nutritional problems.

Women who are interested in enrolling in the nutrition classes should call the Red Cross office at the Army for further information, Mrs. Clarke said.

Miss Ada Keyes, Red Cross representative at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, also spoke at the board meeting this week, telling how various community services to patients are helpful in the hospital program.

Such services are channeled through the committee on community services to camps and hospitals, a reorganization of the old camp and hospital council, of which the Rev. Morris H. Roach is chairman.

The special need for Gray Ladies at the hospital was stressed. Several groups of Gray Ladies have now completed their hours, Mrs. Clarke said, and it is planned to reorganize the groups.

With the increased number of patients at the Roseburg Hospital, the need for community services by other Red Cross chapters, as well as the Douglas County Chapter, was pointed out by Miss Keyes.

Hero Quits Democrats Over Unkept Promises

HARRISBURG, Pa., Oct. 16.—(AP) Congressional Medal of Honor winner Charles E. (Commando) Kelly, of Pittsburgh, declaring he was "calm and confident" as the day he killed dozens of Nazis on a hillside near Cassino, set out today on a new mission—to stump for the Republican party in Pennsylvania.

The 26-year-old former sergeant, announcing that he had no political aspirations, said he is a registered Democrat but transferred his loyalty to the G. O. P. "when I found out the Democrats are making a lot of promises that aren't being kept."

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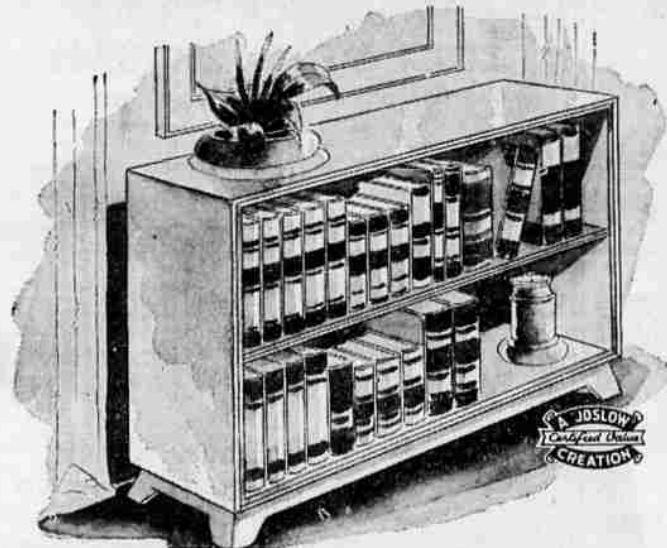

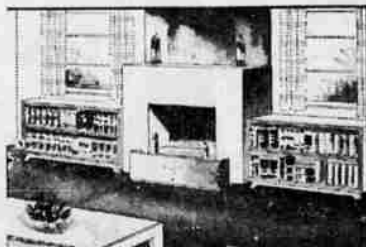
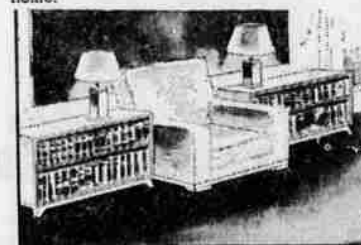
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
