

St. Louis Wins World Series; 7th Game 4-3

Slaughter Scores Final Tally on Daring Run as Pesky Delays His Throw

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 16. (AP)—The gas house gang spirit still lives in the world champion St. Louis Cardinals who have stolen the 1946 series from the favored Boston Red Sox on the sheer "hustle" of Enos Slaughter.

If the 30-year-old veteran of the '42 Giant Killers hadn't rounded third base like a runaway colt while Shortstop Johnny Pesky hesitated one second too long, the 43rd classic might be going yet.

The score was tied at 3-3 in the eighth inning of yesterday's decisive seventh game and the full pressure of baseball's 16th million dollar series was riding heavy on every pitch when Slaughter made his wild tour of the sacks.

Harry Walker lined a base hit into center and "Eno" catapulted off first base, rounded second and headed for third while Culberson retrieved the ball and made a quick relay to Shortstop Pesky.

Making the full sweep at third while Coach Mike Gonzales flapped the come-on sign like an excited mother hen, Slaughter lit out for the plate. Pesky, apparently not expecting that sort of daring base-running, had dropped his arm half way, watching Walker run toward second, before he realized Slaughter was hot-footing home with the tie-breaking run. His peg to Roy Partee was too late as Slaughter topped off his magnificent heads-up running with a fine slide that scored a run worth \$3,757.04 to each Cardinal share holder.

That run meant the ball game, for Brecheen, making a relief appearance when Dickson weakened, clung grimly to the 4-3 margin through a threatening ninth to become a three-game winner.

Not since 1920 when Stanley Coveleskie whipped Brooklyn three times to give Cleveland the title, had any hurler picked up three victories in a single series.

Dickson Routed in 8th
Oddly enough a two-run double by Don DiMaggio over Slaughter's head off the right field wall that almost lost the game, actually gave Brecheen his chance to get into the record books.

Dickson, like Brecheen a pint-sized workman, had handcuffed the Boston for six innings after giving up a run in the first on singles by Moses and Pesky followed by DiMaggio's run-scoring fly to Slaughter. After Doerr led off the second with a scratch single, Dickson did not allow a base hit until the eighth when two pinch hitters drove him from the box.

Russell, hitting for Catcher Wagner who had gone up 13 times for no hits, started it with a single to center and moved to third when Medovich, battling for Relief Pitcher Dobson, doubled. Although Manager Eddie Dyer knew Brecheen was weary from a full nine-inning victory Sunday, he had faith in the little left-hander to subdue this sudden threat. After striking out Moses and taking Pesky on a fly to right Brecheen yielded the tying runs on DiMaggio's two-bagger.

Williams Falls in Pinch
Gone was the two-run edge that Dyer had been coddling since his Cardinals knocked Dave Ferriss out of the box in a two-run fifth inning. Departed was that walking-on-air feeling of being only four outs away from a world championship in Dyer's "freshman year" as a big league pilot. Instead of a two-run cushion the score was knotted with a man on second and the "mighty" Ted Williams at bat. Brecheen dug in courageously and forced the kid to loft a high pop to Schoendienst back of first.

After Slaughter's brilliant base-running on top of Walker's double, Brecheen once more had the series in his hip pocket, but this most thrilling of any closing game in several years was not over yet.

9th Frame Rally Halts
Successful singles by York and Doerr created a delicate ninth-inning situation that required all the skill and the cunning of "The Cat" to deflate. As Higgins forced Doerr at second, Pinch Runner Campbell moved to third with the tying run, and only one out.

Then Partee to pop for the second out and finally ending the season when Pinch Hitter McBride bounced to Schoendienst for a series clinching force of Higgins at second base.

Scrap, Power to be Offered by Chiefs In Game Tonight

Scrap and power, plus a starting line-up weight average of 194 pounds per man, will be the main offensive of the Roseburg Chiefs tonight as they meet the Southern Oregon College JV's on Finlay Field at 8 o'clock.

With only two weeks preparation, the Chiefs, newly formed commercial football club, have had no 1946-season game experience, but have displayed considerable talent in inter-squad scrimmages and will field a team of potentials seemingly capable of staging a tough contest for any opposing eleven.

Coached by Steve Fowler, ex-University of Oregon gridironer, the Chiefs' recent workouts have consisted of polishing up on pass defense and their offensive Notre Dame box formation with a balanced line.

"The main advantage of the 'Sons,'" Fowler said Tuesday, "will be pre-season game experience and conditioning. We certainly have the material on our club as for past football experience and have experienced reserves two deep in most positions."

Chiefs' Line-Up Impressive
Five former Roseburg High School grid stalwarts light up the Chiefs' starting line-up with all starters having two to six years pigskinning behind them.

Two outstanding former Roseburg high backfielders, Bill and Fred Scherner, will hold the starting halfback slots. Both were considered triple-threaters while under the orange and black colors and Fred was a three-year backfield star at Linfield College.

Knute Kershner, ironman guard, and Red Hatfield, tackle, both held all-district titles during their three years at the local high school. Bob Myers, end, was an outstanding lineman under the helm of Indians' Coach Mel Ingram last year.

The Chiefs' reserve list of 16 huskies include high school, college, and service team experience throughout.

Previously scheduled to open their season tomorrow night, the

game was changed Tuesday morning to tonight through an agreement with Ashland College Coach Al Simpson, in order not to conflict with the operatic presentation at the local high school sponsored by the Treble Clef Society.
