High Rating Given RHS Indians In Prep Grid Poll

The Roseburg Indians were rated high among nine prep grid clubs of Oregon by an Associated Press poll this week in the state high school race for victorious recognition.

Halfway through the season, nine teams stood out Sunday with Portland's Grant, number one team last year, and Hood River, number two in 1945, looming the largest, according to the poll. Grant achieved undisputed lead in the Portland heap by downing Washington 20-7. Hood River scored its fifth straight win, defeating Oregon City 27-0.

The picture by districts: District 1—Hood River with five wins and Ontario, downed by Nampa, Idaho, but unbeaten in Oregon play.

District 2—Once-tied Medford, which squeezed past Klamath Falls Saturday 7-6, and Roseburg, which racked up its fifth high-scoring victory 50-0 over Junction City.

District 3—Eugene in the southern sub-district. The Axemen took over lead of the Big Six league Saturday by trimming Corvallis 26-0. In the northern sub-district it's McMinnville, Central Catholic and Columbia Prep, all undefeated. McMinnville won its fourth straight, walloping Tigard 41-0. Central Catholic claimed its fourth, downing Astoria 26-0, and Columbia Prep spilled previously unbeaten Parkrose 31-0 for its fourth win.

District 4—Grant, a game ahead of the Portland field.

Schedules Drawn For Douglas County 'B' League Games

Schedules for the 1946-47 Douglas County "B" League basketball and volleyball season were named out Monday by coaches and principals representing the various schools at the Douglas County Education Conference in Roseburg.

Presided over by the newly-elected chairman, Chester Cook, the "B" League Association decided to open its playing season with a basketball jamboree in Roseburg, December 13, with all county teams participating. Also at this time a yell contest between various school student bodies will be held.

Glide, heretofore in the county's southern division, was shifted to the northern division in order to even the number of teams of each section since the dropping out of Reedport, which became an "A" league school due to increased enrollment this past year.

Teams under the northern division jurisdiction are: Drain, Elkhorn, Yoncalla, Oakland, Sutherlin and Glide. Southern division team include: Glendale, Camas Valley, Myrtle Creek, Riddle, Days Creek and Canyonville. Playing schedules will begin December 10 and provide for two basketball and volleyball games to be played weekly, Tuesday and Friday, during the school calendar days through January 31 with the county tournament to be held in Roseburg February 12-15.

pay "outrageous" prices. Spokesmen said the picketing was directed ultimately at packers, to get them to reduce prices to retailers. Prices already have come down.

New York City and St. Louis provided two other instances where prices have dropped under sharp refusal by housewives to buy. Good porterhouse steak dropped from \$1.25 a pound to 95 cents in New York, and in St. Louis it went down from \$1.10 to 98 cents and failed to sell at that price.

As a sidelight, butter prices have been driven down in three cities by the same tactics. In Charlotte, N. C., butter dropped from \$1.00 to 85 cents, in Omaha 95 to 82 cents and in Helena, Mont., from \$1.00 to 90 cents because of a telephone campaign

by housewives, threatening a buyers strike.

Grain Limits Increased For Making Liquor

bakery products are not in short supply.

The department said it could not agree because of the fact that some producers use large quantities of scarce sugar and shortening.

Officials emphasized, however, that the denial of the petition did not mean these and other wheat products would be kept under price control. They said the government preferred to act on all of them as a whole.

The fact that distillers and brewers were granted additional grain was generally regarded as indicating an official belief that wheat supplies are large enough to prevent runaway prices for flour and bread if ceilings are lifted.

Distillers will get around 3,000,000 bushels of grain a month compared with about 2,600,000 in September, and brewers will get about 17,000,000 bushels a quarter, an increase of about 1,000,000, officials estimated.
