FAIR GROUNDS MEASURE

The Douglas County court, acting upon legally prepared petitions, is submitting to the voters at the Nov. 5 election a special measure proposing to levy a tax of 1-mill per year for a period of three years, outside the 6 per cent limitation, to provide funds for permanent improvements to the county fair grounds.

The county's current assessed valuation is approximately \$36 million. A 1-mill tax, therefore, would produce around \$36,000 annually, or more than \$100,000 in three years.

Money so raised would be used to erect pavilions, livestock sheds, stables, race track, and other facilities to permit restoration of the annual county fair, abandoned more than 25 years ago.

Acting upon authorization from the county's voters at a former election, when a tax of 3-mills was authorized to purchase property for fair purposes, the county court acquired approximately 90 acres of land in Umpqua park, abutting the South Umpqua River.

Through arrangements with the County Fair Board, the Douglas County Sheriff's Posse sponsored construction of rodeo grounds and the present large grandstand. Posse members advanced money to be used with county funds in building the stand, and proceeds from the rodeo have been used to pay off construction costs and add improvements.

Earlier this year, the rodeo grounds were enclosed by a steel fence, after vandals had caused extensive damage to the stands. Money from this year's rodeo is being used to construct a roof over the seats.

Income from the annual rodeo sponsored by the Sheriff's Posse goes to the fair board for improvements to the grounds, but it will take several years to obtain enough from this source to provide facilities necessary to produce a county fair.

Re-establishment of the annual fair will require erection of an auditorium or pavilion, stables and sheds for poultry and livestock, and other buildings. It is proposed to construct a half-mile track to permit revival of horse racing as a part of the fair program.

The facilities also would be available for 4-H club fairs, the Northwestern Turkey Show and other such purposes.

The question to be determined in the minds of voters is whether we desire early resumption of the county fair and construction of buildings and equipment to house other attractions providing entertainment, education and promotion activities throughout the entire year. If we desire these things in the near future it is necessary that we furnish money for them.

The proposed 1-mill tax is believed to be ample to meet all anticipated construction costs. Profits from fairs, horse racing, rodeos, etc., should be sufficient to maintain buildings and fixtures, once they are installed.

If facilities become available, there is some prospect of uses other than those previously listed. One promoter, for instance, is considering a midget automobile racing circuit. Dog races might be arranged.

There has been much discussion of eventual development of other recreational facilities at the fair grounds site.

If voters want these things enough to pay for them at the rate of 1-mill per year for three years, assurance can be given that they will be provided, if a favorable vote is given the special county measure on the ballot at the coming election.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 23.—(AP)—William G. Carlin, 20-year-old Coatesville, Pa., youth, yesterday was awarded the "star farmer of America" award at the victory convention of the Future Farmers of America.

He was chosen for the high honor, from among 200,000 members of the young farmers organization studying vocational agriculture in the nation's high schools.

Dennis O. Heitman, 20, Gardenerville, Nev., was named "star farmer" of the Pacific region.

The "star farmer" of the Pacific region began his farming program in 1940 with four half acres and a quarter acre of corn. Now his enterprises include 30 head of beef cattle, 60 swine, 40 sheep and some 20 acres of growing crops, besides having complete responsibility for management of his mother's 1,300-acre cattle ranch. Heitman was president of the Nevada FFA Association last year.

Suit to Oust Veterans From Eugene Park Fails: SALEM, Ore., Oct. 23.—(AP)—War veterans living in trailers in Sladden's Park in Eugene were unanimously upheld yesterday by the State Supreme Court, which affirmed a decision by Circuit Judge Skidworth of Eugene in denying an injunction sought by abutting property owners who wanted the veterans ejected from the park. The court ruled that the veterans could use the park during the duration of the housing emergency, but not later than Jan. 1, 1948, and that not more than 100 trailers could be placed in the park.
