Sales Agency For Marketing Turkey Eggs Formed Here

Formation of a sales agency for the marketing of Oregon turkey eggs was announced this week by George L. Routledge, Roseburg hatchery owner, in partnership with S. E. Hodgen, president of the Hodgen-Brewster Centennial Flouring Mills, Portland, and Cliff E. Ensey.

The new company to be known as S. E. Hodgen and Co., Inc., proposes to help Oregon turkey breeders retain and enlarge the market for their eggs by assisting in the selection of their breeders, and advising in flock management for the production of better eggs that will have a higher market value, by supervision of the breeders' operations to provide a stable market that can be maintained.

Routledge also said that the new company hopes to provide better transportation and to eliminate losses in quality and fertility of eggs shipped, by seeing to it that eggs are properly cared for in transportation and delivery, by preventing sweating, chilling and delays in the carriers. In addition, the company will check with, inspect, and advise the hatcheries where eggs are shipped to see that the best results are maintained.

Routledge and Ensey, both hatchery men themselves, will be at the service of the breeders, while Hodgen will maintain the Portland office.

Market Safety Sought
"We believe that due to dissatisfaction amongst the hatcheries in the Middle West with the hatcheries here are getting from Oregon turkey eggs, that this market will be lost to Oregon unless steps are taken to correct existing conditions," Routledge said.

"That is what we will try to accomplish by bringing better connections between the breeder and the hatcheries, thus providing better eggs and better results for both parties."

"We hope to secure for the breeders contracts for definite numbers of eggs over a specific period at a price that will be attractive and thus take some of the risk out of the breeders' operations."

Routledge will resign his connection as a field representative in the Roseburg area for the Centennial Flouring Mills and Hodgen, also is resigning the presidency of the mills. Routledge is currently serving as manager of the Northwestern Turkey Show, to be held in Roseburg, December 9 to 12.

Winter Operators Take In Idled Lumberjacks

Most lumber workers laid off from the few, small "summer shows" are being absorbed into larger, winter operations, said Ray Lea, business agent for Local 7307, IWA-CIO, today. Rigging men, however, are in greater demand than cutting crews. Most sawmills have on hand a good supply of logs on their "cold deck," he pointed out.

Reedsport Will Be Host to Portland Business Visitors

REEDSPORT—The Reedsport Chamber of Commerce will play host this week to a group of 36 Portland businessmen who are on a tour of Southwestern Oregon under sponsorship of the trade and commerce department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, directed by K. C. Eldridge, Jr.

The Portland group will arrive in Coos Bay aboard a special car attached to the Southern Pacific's early morning train.
