New Decontrols Hasten Death of OPA

Jellies and preserves; dry beans; canned fish; bananas and most whisky.

Trade sources generally expected some temporary rises but said there should be a gradual return to the old price system of supply and demand.

Liquor industry spokesmen predicted that some aged Bourbon, Scotch and other whiskey may appear again but at somewhat higher prices than they said OPA ceilings had tended to keep them from markets.

A New York bakery leader anticipated little change in consumer prices of bread and baked goods, saying he expected flour prices to remain about the same. But a Chicago miller spokesman forecast a jump of 25 to 60 cents a hundred pounds on flour.

Besides cosmetics, with soap excluded, today's new decontrol list ranged from hot water bottles and other drug sundries to assorted lumber and paper items.

The lumber items are the few needed neither in home building nor for pulp paper.

OPA yesterday raised ceilings on pocketed coil inner spring mattresses 9 per cent effective October 28.

The price hike will be passed on at retail when distributors receive their first shipments of the mattresses from manufacturers at the higher price level, OPA said.

OPA also announced that many edible and inedible oils were released from price ceilings last night.

At the same time OPA announced decontrol of a number of mixed animal feeds and their ingredients.

Freed from controls were: Grain seed oil, domestic and imported; olive oil, domestic and imported; sesame seed oil; sunflower seed oil; sorghum grain oil; tea seed oil and safflower oil.

Also decontrolled were imported and domestic castor beans and No. 1 and 3 castor oils.

Grain seed oil, used in making marine engine oils and art gum craters, also was decontrolled.

Freed Seed Listed

The animal feeds freed included rice bran concentrate, rice bran oil meal cake, and all animal and poultry mixed feeds and

by-product ingredients from commodities previously released.

Because of soap and paint shortages, OPA specified 17 other inedible oils used in their manufacture.

These included: Linseed oil; tung or chinawood oil; palm kernel oil; palm oil; coconut oil; olive oil; fish oil; perilla oil; castor oil, dehydrated; neats foot oil; cod oil; fish oils; oilseeds; inedible tallow; inedible grease; wool grease; and a number of minor imported oils such as tucun and poppyseed oils.

the campaign and declared that the movement was sponsored by individual members and not by the organization itself.

This was in answer to a protest by J. D. Vance, attorney member of an American Veterans' Committee, who said refusal to rent violated a state law prohibiting conspiracies injuring public welfare.

A statement issued by the building service employees asked union members and tenants to notify the union of any cases of vacated apartments being withheld from re-renting, "and we will forward this information to various veterans' groups for their action."

Landlords Outside Law
Meanwhile the district OPA rent control office at Portland said OPA could do "nothing" about the decision of the property owners' union here to refuse to re-rent quarters when they are vacated.

T. J. Edmonds, OPA director here, said "whether the action is in the public interest or not" the landlords were not compelled to rent vacated units if they had been vacated legally.

Delmore Lessard, president of the month-old Property Owners' Union, warned yesterday that some roomers and tenants would be evicted. The union reports 500 members, but there has been no statement on the number of units it controls.

Lessard was one of three defendants ordered by federal court yesterday to refrain from charging excessive rents.

An OPA witness told the court her rent had been doubled from \$37.50 to \$75 monthly in violation of the ceiling.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Arthur W. Binns, president of the National Home and Property Owners Foundation, said today OPA apparently is determined to "isolate rental housing from the rest of the economy" through retention of existing rent controls. This, he said in a statement, "is paralyzing this industry and is perpetrating a great fraud upon the veteran."

"There is no justification for maintaining rents at nearly pre-war levels while all other commodities are undergoing tremendous price increases," he added.

Binns cited the rent strike of Seattle, Wash., landlords as "additional evidence of the forced collapse of the rental housing industry," and asserted it resulted from "unfair and unrealistic policies of the OPA."
