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## Trade Survival To Call for More Salesmanship

SEATTLE, Oct. 22. (AP)—The time is not far distant when American merchants, with shortages a thing of the past, must use more salesmanship than ever before to survive, Ralph W. Carney, Wichita, Kan., business man, told the country's retail lumberman yesterday.

Carney addressed the opening session of the first postwar meeting of the National Retail Lumber Dealers' Association.

Pyramided demands, Carney said, create an artificial situation so that estimates of such demands are not real.

"People place as many as six orders for a single item," he said. "When the item arrives at one store, the other dealers don't know it, but the five other orders are canceled."

"Then, too, when things are available people won't stock new tires in their garages, or hoard up things they might need."

Little by little, the country is getting "caught up" in the manufacture of critical materials and the "pipelines" in the East and the Middle West are beginning to fill, he said. He found more shortages and higher prices in the Pacific Northwest than elsewhere in the country, but soon products should reach this area in larger quantities. He is vice president and general manager of the Coleman Company, at Wichita.

## Nazis Schemed to Down F.D.R. With Lewis, Claim

SWARTHMORE, Pa., Oct. 23. (AP)—O. John Rogge, special assistant to the U. S. attorney general, described what he termed a fantastic Nazi-backed "scheme" designed to thwart the reelection of President Roosevelt in 1940 by having John L. Lewis, President of the United Mine Workers (AFL) come out against him.

In an address delivered at Swarthmore College last night, Rogge said "this scheme involved Herman Goering, a Nazi agent by the name of Joachim Hertslet, and William R. Davis, a promoter of the oil business."

Davis described by Rogge as a peace emissary for Goering in September 1939, died Aug. 1, 1941, after a colorful career.

The Justice Department official added that other attempts were made by the Nazis to prevent Roosevelt's reelection in 1936 and 1944. One included the establishment of an "America committee" in the German foreign office by Joachim von Ribbentrop, Nazi foreign minister recently hanged for war crimes.

## Congress Veers Toward Reaction, Red Paper Says

MOSCOW, Oct. 23. (AP)—Izvestia charged today that the government and congress of the United States were steering "the ship of state toward the side of reaction."

This course was seen most clearly in debates on labor legislation in the seventy-ninth congress, the Soviet government organ said.

"Constantly yielding to a reactionary bloc of Republicans and conservative Democrats," Izvestia declared, "the government and the Democratic party are wasting the political capital they gained under Roosevelt."

## Traffic Mishaps Kill Three in Washington

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 23. (AP)—Three persons were killed in separate traffic accidents in Washington yesterday.

One of the victims, Mrs. Caroline Creasman, about 50, was killed by her own automobile when the parked machine slipped its brakes near Port Orchard, knocked her into a ditch and rolled over on her.

Tech. Sgt. Charles J. Gordon, 28, was killed and Ernest William Austin, 29, Tacoma, seriously injured in Austin's machine crashed into the rear of an army truck which stopped for a traffic signal at the entrance to Fort Lewis.

Mrs. Lake Ramey, 70, of Osborne, Idaho, was struck and killed as she crossed the highway a mile north of Wenatchee.

## Oregon Industrial Jobs Increasing

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 22. (AP)—The number of factory workers in Oregon increased 12.3 per cent during the first half of this year, or double the national gain of 6.2 per cent, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission said today.

Oregon's industrial jobs increased from 105,601 to 118,576 from January to June.

The expansion occurred in spite of a reduction in shipyard employment from 14,813 to 7,719 during the period. Lumber and logging firms accounted for most of the gain, rising from 42,173 to 54,275. Food processing plants increased from 16,495 to 20,931.

Employment by all firms covered by state unemployment compensation reached 273,317 in June, a gain of almost 12 per cent since January. Among non-manufacturing firms, construction was the leader, advancing from 12,290 to 17,718 jobs in the first half of the year.

The commission said continued seasonal demand for workers indicated that employment now has reached an all-time high for any peacetime year.

## Federal Payroll Slash Pledged by GOP Chief

PATERSON, N. J., Oct. 23. (AP)—Carroll Reece, chairman of the Republican National Committee, said last night the election of a GOP Congress would result in the dismissal of "about two thirds" of the federal government's civilian employees to provide an annual saving he estimated at \$3,750,000,000.

Reece said in a campaign speech the federal government's civilian payroll at the wartime peak included 925,000 employees. Since then he said 270,000 more employees have been added.

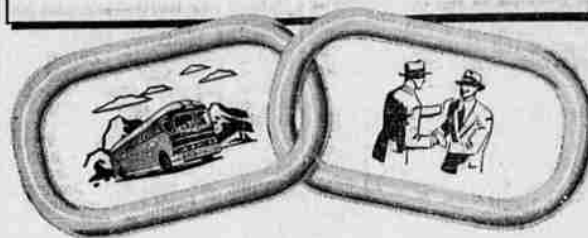
## New Greyhound Buses Slated for December

Delivery of the first of 1,257 new buses on order for the Greyhound Lines at an estimated cost of more than \$30 million is expected early in December, according to Orville S. Caesar, Greyhound president.

The coaches, which are being built by General Motors, will replace one-fourth of the nation-

wide highway fleet. They will be 37- and 41-passenger "Silver-sides," the distinctive Greyhound model developed just before the war but produced in only limited quantities.

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
