

Lack of Platform, Demos' Blunders Hike GOP Chances

WASHINGTON (NEA) — Now is the time when only the low-grade, run-of-the-mine newspapermen are left in Washington. All the experts and hotshots are out touring the country. They're feeling the public pulse, holding both ears to the ground at the same time to hear the heart-beats of Democracy, sticking moistened fingers into the political winds to see which way they blow, strapping the detectors to the hairy chests of taxi drivers and the blushing bosoms of taxi dancers to learn how that mythical American—the average citizen—will vote in November.

It could be, however, that the outcome of the election was decided right here in Washington while the political journalists were away from home on the road. For if Uncle Harry and the Democratic administration bosses thought they were taking meat out of the congressional campaign by decontrolling it, they're learning better now.

Lifting meat controls isn't going to produce more meat before election day. Saying that the other decontrol will be speeded up is easier said than done, and can hardly be done before election day. Still under control are a fourth of the food products, over half of the non-food items. Iron and steel, other raw materials, building materials, autos, household goods, clothing and rents remain under control and will probably stay that way as long as supply is less than demand.

Republicans Raise Sights
But the pressure to get all these controls off is tremendous and the Republicans are making the most of it. They aren't going to let the decontrol issue die. "You made a mistake by keeping meat controls on as long as you did and admit it," they yell at the Democrats in evidence that all within the administration is confusion.

This bill over the meat situation has caused Republican bosses in Washington to raise their sights and aim at targets they never hoped to reach a month ago. Then they were hoping to carry the House by only a slim margin. The less said about their chances in the Senate, the better.

Now Republican National Committee Chairman Carroll Reece is marking at least 10—possibly 13 states for G.O.P. senatorial victories. Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Ohio, Missouri, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming are his sure bets. Rhode Island, Nevada, and West Virginia less sure, but hopeful. Indiana Congressman Charlie Halleck, chairman of the Congressional Campaign Committee, would add New Mexico and Utah to this list, with the Republicans sure to hold California and Wisconsin. They need nine seats to win control of the Senate.

Reece, Halleck and Ohio Congressman Clarence Brown at G.O.P. headquarters are now all saying the Republicans will pick up close to 50 seats in the House to win a good safe working majority there. They need 27 seats to win control.

A large part of this optimism around Republican headquarters is of course the self-hypnosis auto-intoxication or whatever you want to call it that afflicts the bosses of all political parties as election draws nigh. The harder they work, the more convinced they'll become that their side is going to win. The real truth isn't known till the morning after. Then it's a rosy dawn or a horrible hangover from a bad dream.

Demo Blunders Aid Foo
If the Republicans do come through winners in this election it will be largely because the Democrats have done everything they possibly could to defeat themselves. Their combination of errors since the campaign got

hot has been utterly fantastic. By comparison, all the Republican have to be sorry for are Senator Robert A. Taft's defense of the Nazi war criminals and Chairman Reece's statement that he would cut two million employees off the federal payroll when there are only 2,300,000 on it and it takes 490,000 just to carry the mails.

As for a constructive Republican platform, it simply doesn't exist. Charlie Halleck is still terribly proud of the statement of principles which a committee of G.O.P. congressmen drafted a year ago. But it is all written in glittering generalities, trying to be all things to all people.

Maybe the strongest asset the Republicans have is that they have no program. Harding and Coolidge, Taft and McKinley before them, all rode to power and saw the country through periods of boom on complete lack of program. The country may be in for another cycle of that. Take off all the control. Let nature, with her own mysterious mutations of inflation and deflation, take her own sweet course. How would you like a load of that for a while?

Widow Denies Aiding in Slaying Of Oregon Rancher

CALDWELL, Idaho, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Mrs. Gladys Lincoln Broadhurst, 40, denied yesterday that she had "done or said anything" that would have aided in the slaying of her husband W. D. (Doc) Broadhurst, 51, prosperous rancher.

The red-headed widow and Albert L. Williams, her 23-year-old chauffeur, are charged at Vale, Ore., with first degree murder. Broadhurst, a former chiropractor, was found shot and beaten to death a week ago near a road between his Caldwell farm and his Jordan Valley, Ore., cattle ranch. District Attorney E. Otis Smith of Malheur County, Oregon, said Williams has confessed he waylaid Broadhurst.

The denial issued by Mrs. Broadhurst's attorney, Cleve Groom, said: "Mrs. Broadhurst maintains that she has not at any time had anything to do with any speech, action or otherwise with any person whatsoever and has not done or said anything which would aid or abet or which would lead to the attack upon, slaying or death of the late Dr. W. D. Broadhurst."

"That their marriage was the result of a long mutual admiration for one another extending over 20 years. That their family life since their marriage (last May 21 in Reno, Nev.) has been that of mutual admiration, love and affection for one another and at all times has been of the highest standards of American family life."

Instructions on Yule Parcels For Overseas Issued

Arrangements have been made by the Post Office Department in cooperation with the War and Navy Departments for acceptance of Christmas parcels for members of the armed forces serving outside the continental United States, according to Lester L. Wimberly, Roseburg postmaster.

Parcels for army personnel overseas began October 15 and

continue until November 15 with out written requests from the receivers. Parcels destined for delivery in China, India, the Middle East, and islands in the Pacific should be mailed as early as possible. Wimberly stated: "Persons should indorse each parcel, 'Christmas parcel,' and each parcel should contain the address of the sendee inside as well as outside in case of possible rough handling en route. Christmas cards addressed to soldiers overseas must be sealed, and carry first class postage, Wimberly pointed out.

Since Navy, Coast Guard and Marine Corps personnel overseas may receive parcels without request at any time of the year it

is not the policy to encourage mailing of parcels to such personnel at any particular time. Wimberly said, but parcels should be sent not later than October 31 to insure Christmas delivery. Requests from military personnel are not required during the Christmas mailing season.

Christmas parcels, the same as the domestic rate, shall not exceed 70 pounds in weight or 100 inches in length and girth combined.

Articles should be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fibre board or strong double faced corrugated fibre board. Each box should be securely tied with strong cord preferably by four separate pieces. Sealing of the

flaps of the box in addition to tying is recommended.

WHEEE—IT'S TIME FOR HALLOWE'EN PARTIES

How to plan food for your Hallowe'en party

If what to serve at your Hallowe'en party is a problem, then here are some ideas that may be helpful to you.

HALLOWE'EN BUFFET SUPPER

*Red-Hot POKER ROAST
Red Cabbage, Green Grape and Almond Salad
in Pumpkin Shell Salad Bowl (Use pumpkin for pie, afterward)
Toasted Finger Rolls
*Mocha Gingerbread with Orange Cream Cheese Frosting
Coffee

*Recipe below.

RED-HOT POKER ROAST—Arrange 16 to 24 frankfurters side by side (allowing 2 frankfurters for each person); run string through top and bottom. Broil frankfurters; then tie them, curved side in, around mound of potato salad; press into salad so that it resembles a crown roast. Cut string to serve.

MOCHA GINGERBREAD with ORANGE CREAM CHEESE FROSTING—To a package of prepared gingerbread mix add 1 cup cold coffee and 1/2 cup pecans. Pour into an 8-inch square cake pan and bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 45 minutes, or until done. To make frosting: Mash two 3-ounce packages of cream cheese with 2 tablespoons orange juice and 1/2 teaspoon orange rind. Stir in 1/2 to 1 cup sifted powdered sugar. Add a few drops of orange food coloring for a brighter color and more powdered sugar if a thicker frosting is desired.
