What we are trying to do is to convince Russia that it will be more profitable for her to cooperate with us instead of trying to undermine and destroy us. BAD TROUBLE is a crop that usually sprouts from the seed of ill will.

SAN FRANCISCO'S wise and tolerant Mayor Lapham says in a speech in Portland that "improved labor relations will result if industry's top men will talk directly with labor rather than through spokesmen."

That is sound modern doctrine. The time when The Word could be handed down from on high to those who live and work below is past. Results in industry in these days must flow from CO-OPERATION.

HERE'S an interesting little inflation note: Officers and men of the Chinese army are to get, by order of Chiang Kai Shek, pay boosts of 50 to 70 per cent. The purpose of the boost is to keep up with the shrinking Chinese dollar.

Under the new scale, a full general will get the present equivalent, in American money, of about \$125. In the old days, "be-fo' de yah," \$125 American was about \$250 Chinese. Now it is the equivalent of 400,000 Chinese dollars.

That is what inflation does when it gets loose. (T)he pity of it is that the boost in Chinese army pay will merely result in a corresponding up in Chinese prices. That is another thing inflation does when it gets loose.)

A BALLOT SUMMARY

During the past few days we have reviewed in detail the various initiative and referendum measures appearing upon the Nov. 5 election ballot. While we have expressed our own opinions on some of these measures, it is not our purpose to propose that our recommendations be followed blindly.

Too often voters wait until the last moment to study their ballots and go to the polls in comparative ignorance of the issues submitted for their decision usually voting "no" on those they don't understand. We have endeavored to forestall this situation by presenting fact and opinion.

We will review the measures, today, and offer our personal recommendations. Bear in mind we are not asking voters to follow these recommendations but, rather, to study each issue carefully and act independently.

1. Constitutional amendment providing for succession to the office of governor. An amendment placing the secretary of state or state treasurer in line of succession with the president of the senate and speaker of the house in case the office of governor becomes vacant permanently or temporarily. A simple precautionary measure. Our recommendation—Yes.

2. Bill authorizing tax for construction and equipment of state armories. The proposal is to levy a state tax of 45/100 of one mill annually for 10 years to build armories in Oregon cities. Principal opposition is voiced by Labor and anti-tax groups. The bill would add to military defensive strength in Oregon and would produce greatly increased revenue from federal pay sources. Our recommendation—Yes.

3. Bill establishing rural school districts. This measure would create a county school board, which would exercise control over the budgets of all districts except those of first class. The tax would be averaged and each district would pay on an equal levy instead of widely varied levies as at present. The proposal has many good features, particularly in the matter of tax equalization. However, as one educator said, "It is an attempt to sneak the county unit system through the back door." It offers little more than already is possible under the existing county unit law. It offers a good tax plan, but fails to provide any substantial uplift in educational standards. Our recommendation—a very weak No.

4. Bill authorizing Chinamen to hold real estate and mining claims. Chinese born in the United States are considered American citizens, and, therefore, cannot be barred from property ownership. The U. S. and State Constitutions bar alien Chinese from owning real estate. Thus the provision of the state constitution is obsolete and simply dead wood. The title of the bill is somewhat misleading, as the object is to repeal the old statute. Our recommendation—Yes.

5. Amendment permitting legislative bills to be read by title only. This bill would save a great deal of time by discouraging filibuster tactics. We cannot see where it endangers privileges of weak minorities, as opponents claim. Our recommendation—Yes.

6. Constitutional amendment increasing the number of senators to 31. This measure does not belong before the people. The State Constitution provides the formula for apportionment of senators and places responsibility upon the legislature. The legislature, however, has reached a stalemate and asks that another senator be added to relieve a very unjust situation in Deschutes and Klamath counties. This opens up a dangerous precedent, in that future resort to this procedure could enlarge the senate still more and unbalance our legislative structure. One advantage is that an uneven number would eliminate tie votes. Our recommendation—a very mild No.

7. Bill regulating fishing in coastal streams and inland waters. This measure would place management of our coastal fisheries on a scientific basis through joint studies by the fish and game commissions. It would halt taking of steelheads for commercial purposes, and provide larger escapement of salmon for spawning. It does not prohibit commercial fishing, although it orders removal of set nets, except in Tillamook bay, but legalizes continued use of drift nets. Our recommendation—a vociferous Yes.

8. Bill to create a state old-age and disability pension fund. This is the Little Townsend bill, one of the most dangerous and crackpot schemes yet brought before Oregon voters. It would levy a 3 per cent tax on gross incomes, payable monthly, to pay pensions to persons over 60 years of age who would retire from gainful employment. The bill is based upon the well-disproven "spend ourselves rich" theory. It is contended that circulation of pension dollars would stimulate business and industry. The affirmative argument misrepresents the Hawaiian and Indiana gross income tax laws, which are not comparable to the Oregon proposal, and is fallacious in its "business builder" theory, because of the fact that 97 per cent of Oregon taxpayers represent only 30 per cent of the savings, and would, therefore, be deprived of necessities while someone else spent their money. It would not be new money, for, without taxation, it would be spent by the worker. Instead of creating new business, the bill would induce an inflationary spiral, wreck business and industry and create widespread unemployment. Our recommendation—"No. No. A Thousand Times No."

9. A bill to create a basic school support fund by annual tax levy. This measure would authorize the State of Oregon to levy taxes to provide \$50 per capita for each child within the state between the ages of 4 and 20 years. The school emergency is acute. Our greatest need today is an educated, intelligent public. We cannot safeguard good government without sound education and we cannot have sound education without qualified instructors. We cannot expect to interest young men and women in the teaching profession unless we raise that profession's financial level. The bill has some unfavorable tax angles, but, because of the emergency we believe the tax system should be overhauled and money

provided for our schools. Our recommendation—Yes. 10. Fair grounds Tax. A special measure submitted by the Douglas County Court upon petition to levy a one-mill tax annually to permit construction of buildings and installation of needed improvements leading to resumption of the annual county fair. This is a good measure and in keeping with the county's growth and development. Our recommendation—Yes.

11. City management. A proposed charter amendment for the City of Roseburg to permit employment of a city manager. The amendment does not change our present mayor-council plan of city government, but authorizes employment of a trained and experienced agent to supervise departments, conduct routine investigations and do long-range planning. We believe this change most important in speeding the city's development. Our recommendation—a most emphatic Yes.

Papooses Win Over Medford Jr. High, 21-6

Victors Discard Jitters After Opponents Score On First Play of Game

H. H. "Hod" Turner's Papooses, although green in veteran gridiron tactics, brought home a second victory last night as they dumped a highly touted Medford Junior high team 21-6 in the locals' second contest of the season. The Papooses rolled over the Springfield "Frosh" here last Saturday 33-0.

Although very jittery during the first half of their first game on an opponent's field, and committing 10 fumbles during the contest, the Papooses racked up 14 points in the first half and eased off with a reserve line-up for seven in the final period. Medford scoring their only touchdown on their first play in the initial quarter.

Turner's Papoose line, out-weighting their hosts, held up very good in spite of their inexperience in stopping the Junior Tiger's plunges, but were fooled momentarily on Medford's flanker plays and numerous pass attempts until the final half, when the stage fright began to dissolve.

Medford crossed the goal strip first on their first play of the game, only to trail at the half by two touchdowns by Captain Rodgers, quarterback, and Trent's two successful conversions.

Reserves Get Action In the final half Turner turned the starting positions over to the reserves who immediately sent Gary off on a 40-yard trip to bring the score to 21-6 as Trent again kicked the conversion.

The Papooses' next encounter is against the Grants Pass "Frosh" at Finlay Field Thursday at 2 P.M. The Grants Pass team boasts a team weight average of 175 pounds and the contest should provide local fans with some real gridiron action by these youthful pigskinners. Both teams have won over Medford, Grants Pass tripping them 14-0 last week.
