later). Stick to necessities and do
without luxuries. Consider the
other fellow's problems (every-
body has 'em these days).

PRODUCE ALL YOU CAN.

Only increased production will
cure what ails us.

THERE is always a little good
news mixed in with the bad.
This, for example:

More than 480 million cases of
vegetables, fruits and other can-
ned goods were packed during the
12-month period ending Septem-
ber 1—an increase of 100 MIL-
LION cases over the preceding
year's pack, an all-time new high.
(The figures are from the cen-
sus bureau.)

HERE is a cynical but very il-
luminating little story:
Samuel Schofield, of East Wey-
mouth, Mass., ordered some
World War II Army surplus
goods. He reports he received 64
bars of soap MADE FOR USE IN
THE CIVIL WAR.

On the label of each piece, he
says, was the slogan: "Save soap
to win the war" and the stamped
signature: "Abraham Lincoln,
Commander-in-Chief."

IT was government red tape, not
pure cussedness, that kept this
soap in storage all these long
years. It is government red tape
that is keeping in storage in
government warehouses all the
billions of dollars worth of sur-
plus war goods that would help
so much to kill the dragon of in-
flation if RELEASED NOW to a
market that is hungry for them.

THE WRONG PLATFORM

There are two candidates on the forthcoming election bal-
lot whom we could not personally endorse, even though we
did not know their opponents. On the basis of their published
statements, both oral and written, we could not approve the
candidacies of Dr. Louis A. Wood, Eugene, for congressman
from the Fourth district, nor Carl C. Donagh, Portland, for
governor.

Of course, we must admit to a decided personal prejudice
in favor of their Republican opponents, Congressman Harris
Ellsworth of Roseburg, and Governor Earl Snell of Arling-
ton. But even though we did not approve so highly of both
Congressman Ellsworth and Governor Snell, the platforms
of the two Democratic candidates would deter us from
approval.

Our particular objection centers around the advocacy by
both Democratic candidates of the Columbia Valley Author-
ity. This, in our opinion, is sufficient grounds for rejection
of any candidate. We realize that many people disagree with
our views on the proposed CVA and we respect their rights
to a contrary opinion, but we are most vigorously opposed
to this particular piece of legislation and could not support
public office anyone pledged to its enactment.

It is surprising, in our opinion, to see a man running for
the office of governor on a platform which advocates sur-
render of state rights, or a candidate for Congress propos-
ing to place the district he represents under dictatorship of
a Washington bureau, tossing local autonomy into the dis-
card in favor of a communist-patterned "authority."

CVA would place the Pacific Northwest and its inhabi-
tants under strict dictatorship of a three-man board, ap-
pointed from Washington. The board could seize land, di-
cate what crops a farmer should grow and in what quantity,
control every phase of our economic life, and regulate our
business and industry.

A glowing picture is painted of possibilities for develop-
ment under Washington's planned economy, and many
people have fallen for the Utopian propaganda emanating
from the National Capital. But can anyone show any gov-
ernment agency, bureau, authority or department which has
functioned as propagandists said it would?

OPA, instead of controlling prices, has regulated profits,
produced unnecessary shortages, stimulated black markets,
encouraged lying, cheating and misrepresentation, and has
plagued the country with its unrealistic management. CPA,
organized to stimulate home construction, has, instead,
slowed the construction program to a snail's pace, boosted
housing costs, kept thousands of people from procuring
shelter, impeded business and industry and forced veterans,
whom it was supposed to benefit, into paying highly inflated
prices for shelter. The wage stabilization program has
broken down under the weight of its blunders.

Experience with government controls should be conclusive
that a CVA, instead of promoting the welfare of the Pacific
Northwest, would make conditions intolerable. Yet we find
two candidates for high office advocating such a piece of
legislation.

Marshall N. Dana, editor of the editorial page of the *Ore-
gon Journal*, speaking recently before the National Reclama-
tion Association convention in Omaha, said:

The Tennessee Valley Authority need not be either the
horrible example or the proof of the pudding for proposed
Valley Authorities in the West. Eroded soil combined with
eroded lives to make the Tennessee Valley its own problem
and TVA is that problem's unique solution. Erosion of soil
and of life has not proceeded far enough in the West to ren-
der desirable the same character of exterior animating or-
ganization as TVA in the drainage areas west of the Missis-
sippi. On the contrary, we have to fear the repressive and
regimenting effect upon the very qualities that compose
the bone and fiber of the American spirit if subnational au-
thorities are set up to govern without the consent of the
governed through appointees who are not selected by aid
of the ballot box and whose qualifications may be predom-
inantly political. Reclamation officially represented by the
Bureau of Reclamation in the Department of the Interior
logically is set up to represent national policy in reclama-
tion. But with Valley Authorities reclamation as a national
policy cannot continue, but will be superseded by as many
non-popular variable and perhaps antagonistic regional poli-
cies as there are Valley Authorities. As one Westerner, I
am not ready to abandon the tried and proved effectiveness
of the Bureau of Reclamation, the Army Engineers, the For-
est Service, and other agencies of national federal policy for
feudal and irresponsible Valley Authorities. It is far more
desirable to establish a coordination in the field and a co-
operation with the people.

Disregarding the fact that the two Republican candidates
for Congressman and Governor have records of high excel-
lence and have proven themselves, as incumbents, to be
worthy of continued support, the very fact that their Demo-
cratic opponents would surrender us to the dictates of a po-
litically-dominated federal bureau is, in our opinion, ample
reason for supporting the men who advocate continuation
of states' rights and representative form of government in
all phases.
