

'Grey Mask' Wins Light-Heavy Title By Downing Cohen

The "Grey Mask" is now the current champion of the light-heavyweight wrestling championship. He annexed the coveted symbol by defeating Sammy Cohen in a three-fall tussle at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night while boos of disapproval rose from the spectators, numbering nearly 1,000.

The Mask employed his usual technique of head-butts and back torturing with the rasplike bandage worn on one knee, plus sundry other rough stuff, and by crawling under the ropes to escape threatening holds. Sammy garnered the first fall of the bout in 16 1/2 minutes with a surf-board hold, after slugging the hooded man to the mat in retaliation for head-butts, one of which sent him through the ropes. Sammy succumbed in the second round, however, to his opponent's noggan attack, followed by a Boston crab hold. In 11:10. In the third and deciding round, both grapplers gained a fall, but Cohen's was ruled out by Referee Elton Owen because the Mask was trapped at the time by one leg in the ropes. Upon regaining his feet, the Mask promptly butted Sammy to the floor and fastened his crab hold, ending hostilities in the brief time of five minutes.

In the first supporting bout on the card, Tony Ross and Ernie Piluso renewed their long-standing feud, and the fans witnessed one of the most savage battles ever staged on the Armory mat. Using his trademark neck-breaker hold, Tony emerged victor at the end of ten minutes. He also wore a bloody gash over one eye, the result of Piluso's punches, two of which also floored Referee Owen as many times.

In the second bout of the night, Billy Fox defeated Carl Gray in 21:05. It was a fast, close battle in which each grappler used about every legitimate hold known to the game. These falling Fox finally conquered his foe with successive shoulder butts and drop kicks.

Indians Will Face Hardest Game In Tilt With Ashland

Roseburg high school's most formidable contests of the season in the Indians' campaign for state football recognition are yet to come, according to Coach Mel Ingram. He termed last week-end's 13-13 tie with Cottage Grove as just a taste of future competition for the high-flying Indians.

Ashland is the next opponent of the Indians, vying on Finlay Field Friday night, with Grants Pass on tap down there November 8, and the pre-season scheduled finale here against Sweet Home November 16, with possible playoff games pending the outcome of the remaining scheduled tilts.

Over-confidence throughout the squad was tagged by Ingram as the main reason for the break in the Indians' impressive victory record this season. Somewhat crippled by following last week's fray at Cottage Grove, where the Indians went into a slump as compared to previous contests of the Tri-County League, the locals are in for a lot of hard work this week, and, Ingram added, the real competition is yet to come.

Always a top opponent of Roseburg in athletics, the Ashland Grizzlies, in seven meetings with the Indians, which began in 1923, hold the victory column with five wins, Roseburg winning in 1924 and under the coaching of Ingram in 1944, by 33-7.

The Grizzlies lost last Friday to a strong Marshfield eleven 20-12. Grants Pass, Indians' foe November 8 at that city, tell to Medford 56-0 on the "Tornadoes" turf Friday, and Sweet Home was idle over the weekend.

John Ulrich Designated As "Athlete of Week"

John Ulrich, scrappy fullback, and the Indians' mainstay in their 13-13 tie last Friday with Cottage Grove, was given "Athlete of the Week" title Saturday by unanimous choice of coaches, officials and press box judges.

Now in his third year of Roseburg High School football, the 17-year-old, 170-pound fullback not only outshone teammates in

Friday night's game in hard-driving yardage gains, but took the vote from linemen in his well-played defensive maneuvers. Ulrich broke into the starting backfield position during his junior year in 1945 after reserve duty in his sophomore year. This year he has started in each game and proven himself invaluable in the Indians' backfield as well as capable of holding guard duty on the forward line.

UCLA, Leading Conference, Will Face St. Mary's

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 28.—(AP)—Football fans demand proof, a winning score being the convincer, and this weekend may prove whether the University of California at Los Angeles really rates in the big league or is just the top team of an average assortment on the West Coast.

The coast conference leading UCLA Bruins, undefeated in or out of the circuit and definitely headed for the Rose Bowl as of now, square off Friday night with the quiet and tricky St. Mary's Gaels. Championship standings will not be affected in the case of the Bruins but the Gaels should provide one of the sternest tests for the southern powerhouse this season. The Gaels, however, were hard pressed to nose out Nevada 13-12 yesterday. St. Mary's of all the rivals UCLA has faced thus far, will offer real speed around the ends, plus an aerial threat. Opponents of the Bruins to date have found it practically impossible to skirt the lanks, four stellar ends being the reason.

Trojans Beat Stanford
Most important of the conference clashes will put unbeaten, once tied Oregon against the defending championship Southern California Trojans. Defeated 6-0 by Oregon State in a tough contest, the star-studded USC squad has fought its way back into contention with wins over Washington and Stanford. Last week's triumph over Stanford was a thriller, the Trojans coming from behind to outpoint the short-enders, 28-20. Oregon, meanwhile, took the measure of Idaho, 26-13.

Oregon State, after edging out Washington State, 13-12, lines up against invading Stanford, Saturday at Corvallis. The Stanfords undoubtedly will be in for a tough afternoon as O.S.C. is on the upgrade after its 50-7 trouncing by UCLA to start the season.

Washington State tackles the California Bears at Berkeley, where the Bears should put on a better showing than their 20-6 loss to Washington last week.
