High Court Ousts Suit Against Unit System in Georgia

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29.—(AP)—The Supreme Court yesterday by a 6 to 3 vote threw out suits attacking Georgia's county unit system of elections.

Officials said the court order also wiped out rulings of a special three-judge U. S. district court in Atlanta upholding the system under which Eugene Talmadge was nominated governor without a majority of the popular votes.

Although the order stated no reason, officials explained the court apparently felt that the lower tribunal had been asked to enjoin something that already had occurred—the primary election itself.

The district court held that the Georgia plan does not violate constitutional guarantees of equal rights. It acted on two suits attacking the system both of which were appealed to the Supreme Court. The justices dismissed both appeals and ordered the bills of complaint be dismissed by the lower court.

The lower court observed the Georgia unit plan operates like the electoral college system in electing a president—some without a popular vote majority.

The court also decided to keep hands off the Illinois election setup. It refused to reconsider its 4 to 3 decision of last June which rejected a proposal to remap the state's congressional districts.

Flag Given College by Crites Boys' Mother

Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland has received a gift of a large United States flag from Mrs. Alameda Crites-Cerking of Woodburn, formerly of Roseburg, in honor of her two sons, Eugene Crites, a member of the class of 1941 at Ashland, and Ronald Crites, first lieutenant, Air Forces, who was killed November 17, 1945.

Eugene Crites was killed in an airplane crash near Bakersfield, Calif., March 18, 1942, one day before he was to have received his wings in the United States Air Forces. He was graduated from Roseburg Senior High School and from Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland. While in Roseburg, he made his home with Dr. Charles A. Edwards.

Mrs. Blanche L. Krohn Passes Away in Portland

Funeral services for Mrs. Blanche L. Krohn, who died in Portland Saturday, were held in that city Monday, with interment at that city cemetery.

Mrs. Krohn was well known in Roseburg, having resided here, prior to going to Portland to be near her daughter, Mrs. Arthur (Stella Krohn) Knauss. Besides Mrs. Knauss, survivors include two other daughters and two sons; her mother, Mrs. Isabelle Webb, and sister, Miss Ethel Webb, both of Roseburg.

Chiang's Drive to Darien Intended as Hint to Russians

SHANGHAI, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Foreign observers speculated today that Chiang Kai-Shek's drive toward Darien was his indirect way of serving notice to the United Nations of the continued, illegal presence of Soviet troops in that important port city.

They theorized that Chiang has no intention of trying to eject the Russians by force, but said it appeared he intended to force the issue of Soviet control. The 14-month old Sino-Soviet treaty provided that Darien should be a free port.

From Peiping, Associated Press correspondent Tom Masferson radioed that the city was filled with persistent reports that China and Russia have made or are making an agreement concerning the Liaoting peninsula, on the tip of which Darien is situated.

The drive might have the effect of inspiring peaceful withdrawal of Soviet troops to near-by Port Arthur, where the Russians are permitted to station armed forces under the treaty.

Darien is administered by a Soviet sponsored puppet Chinese city council. Efforts of China's National government to recover sovereignty of the port have been blocked. After V-J Day, the Soviets refused to allow Chiang's troops to land at Darien. Later, the Chinese Communist communists to enter.

If the Soviet troops do not withdraw, observers see the probability that Chiang's forces will halt outside the Soviet perimeter. That would serve the government's purpose well. The Chinese communists in Darien would be bottled up in the city and their important pipeline between Darien and the Shantung peninsula would be made useless.

Alaskan Pilot Feared Dead in Plane Wreck

NOME, Alaska, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Norman Weaver, Alaska Airlines pilot formerly of Tacoma, was believed today to have perished. Part of his missing plane was found seven miles south of Kotzebue. He had been missing since last Monday on a flight between Candley and Kotzebue with mail.

Fined \$25 for Spree

Elsworth P. Martin, 45, Brockway farmer, was fined \$25 on the charge of drunkenness on a highway, Justice of the Peace Hartfield reported today.
