Three Roseburg musicians are included in Ted Hallock's University of Oregon orchestra to appear here Thursday evening for the Knights of Pythias Girls Drum and Bugle Corps benefit Halloween masquerade ball at the Armory.

All graduates of Roseburg High School and now G. I. students at the university, they are Donald J. Frear, Lowell Rhoden and Nathan Steiwig. All three Hallock reports, joined the musical organization last September and have shown up especially well in rehearsals to earn regular berths.

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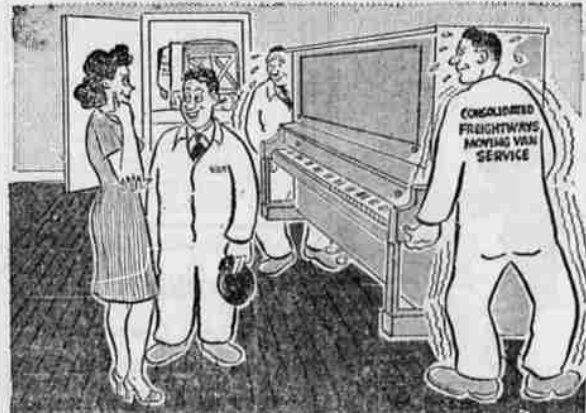
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
