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Massachusetts Garners Record Racing Revenue

BOSTON, Oct. 30.—(AP)—The Commonwealth of Massachusetts received an all time high income of \$10,147,983.67 in taxes from horse and dog racing during 1946, nearly double the \$5,352,657.34 received in 1945.

The increase was attributed to added taxation on a sliding scale, a greater number of days of racing and more betting at tracks.
