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Enrollment Up In Roseburg Schools

An increase of 38 in the total enrollment of the Roseburg schools during October was noted by Superintendent of Schools Paul S. Elliott today. Of 1,977 pupils registered, 1,052 are boys, 925 are girls.

Last month's enrollment was 1,939, with 1,031 boys and 908 girls.

Of the school district's five elementary schools, Benson had the greatest enrollment with 374, which included 201 boys and 173 girls; Rose was second with 288, including 158 boys and 130 girls; Fullerton, with 188, was third with 103 boys and 85 girls.

In the two suburban schools, 70 pupils were enrolled at Edenbower (37 boys, 33 girls) and 19 pupils at Sylmon Valley, including nine boys and 10 girls.

Junior High enrollments totaled 513 and Senior High enrollments, 514. The Junior High had 278 boys and 235 girls; the Senior High, 266 boys and 248 girls.

Special meeting for the purpose of closing the National Rifle Association charter will be held November 1 at the Armory. Other officers of the local organization

are Ken Gilkeson, vice president, and Ray A. Tracy, secretary-treasurer.

An outdoor rifle range is expected to be acquired by the Rifle Club before next spring, Wolford said.

Administration, 901 Guardian Building, Portland 4, Oregon, will be received until and opened at 10:30 A. M., Pacific Standard Time, November 12, 1946, for the purchase of timber upon the tract hereinafter described. All timber must be cut and removed within five years from date of approval of contract, the cutting and removal to be carried out in accordance with the Forest Practice Rules approved July 7, 1938, by the Secretary of the Interior. Each bid must state the amount per thousand feet, board measure, which will be paid for each species and the total consideration which will be paid for the timber. Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit of \$5,000.00 in the form of a certified check on a National Bank in favor of the Treasurer of the United States. The deposit will be returned to unsuccessful bidders; applied as part of the purchase price of successful bidders; or that portion of the deposit representing the minimum required by law to be deposited shall be retained as liquidated damages if the successful bidder shall not execute contract and furnish satisfactory bond within 30 days of the acceptance of his bid. Bond will be required in the amount of \$10,000.00. Payment for the timber will be required in advance of cutting, payable at the option of the purchaser, either as one lump sum or in partial payments of not less than \$5,000.00 each, scheduled to keep pace with the rate of timber cutting and payable upon demand from the Chief Forester. The successful bidder will be required, prior to the approval of the contract, to furnish a sworn financial statement showing ability to fulfill the terms of the contract. For copies of the form of pro-

posal, contract, bond, detailed timber estimates, cutting restrictions, and other information, application should be made to the Chief Forester, O. and C. Administration. All timber cut from the following described area must be manufactured in the local marketing area designated by the O. and C. Administration, unless otherwise authorized by the Chief Forester. If the unit prices bid are above those authorized by MPR 460, they will be reduced to the maximum permitted under that order. In case of two or more identical bids for the same timber, the successful bidder will be selected on the basis of comparative ability to produce immediately lumber for the Emergency Veterans Housing program and to further the objectives of the Act of August 28, 1937. The right is hereby reserved to waive technical defects in this advertisement; to reject all bids, or to award the timber for the amount of the highest bid to other than the highest bidder when necessary, pursuant to the Act of August 28, 1937 (50 Stat. 874), in order to provide a continued supply of timber to local industry so as to assure the permanence of the community which is dependent upon such industry. The timber volumes stated herein are standing timber estimates and may be more or less than the actual amounts. The timber sale area is: All of Section 5, T. 32 S., R. 3 W., W. M. The timber offered for sale contains the following volumes in board measure: 14,530 M. feet Douglas fir, 810 M. feet Stamped Ponderosa Pine, 255 M. feet Stamped Sugar Pine, 145 M. feet Hemlock, 300 M. feet White Fir, 55 M. feet Incense Cedar. No bid for less than \$5.00 per M. ft. B. M. for the Douglas fir, \$7.65 per M. ft. B. M. for the Stamped Ponderosa Pine, \$10.95 per M. ft. B. M. for the Stamped Sugar Pine, \$2.00 per M. ft. B. M. for the Hemlock, White Fir, and Incense Cedar, or a total purchase price of \$82,638.75, will be considered. All Douglas fir trees less than 26 inches D. B. H. O. B. are reserved from cutting in that portion of N1NW1/4 lying between Cow Creek and the north line of Sec. 5. On the remainder of the sale area, all Douglas fir trees less than 22 inches D. B. H. O. B. are reserved. Of Pine, only those trees stamped U. S. O. C. are to be cut. The area is to be logged by use of caterpillar type tractor equipment, unless otherwise authorized by the officer in charge of the sale. In the N1NW1/4, buildings and other improvements shall be protected in accordance with Sec. 12, Page 3 of "General Timber Sale Contract Stipulations." Within a strip which extends 150 feet from each side of the county road, no stumps shall be cut to a height of more than 20 inches above the ground level; all logging slash shall be piled and burned; and no log loading will be permitted within this strip unless otherwise authorized by the officer in charge of the sale.
