Klondike Kate
Finds Mate Dead
In Yukon Cabin

BEND, Ore., Oct. 31. (AP)—Klondike Kate's romance was at an end today, with her husband dead on a trail seven miles from his prospector's cabin in Yukon territory.

The one-time belle of the gold seekers, Kate flew north 10 days ago in quest of her husband, John Matson, 33, from whom she had not heard since April.

Today she sent a telegram to friends at her home here that her husband's body had been found by a prospector who lived some 30 miles from Matson's cabin. He was believed to have died of natural causes.

Klondike Kate—she was Kate Rockwell then—was a dance hall girl at Dawson when she and John Matson met.

"I'm very fell in love with me in 1900," she once said, "but I was in love with someone else, so he just stood by and watched."

But in 1933—two years after they had resumed a long-interrupted correspondence—Matson came out of the north and married Kate at Seattle. He still had his prospecting to do, however, but this year he was to have come out for good.

Last April Kate bought a little place at Halsey, Ore., where "we

could have a little garden and flowers and things." But Matson didn't come back, and Kate went north to find him—and found tragedy.

Teachers Sentenced for
Shielding Draft Dodger

DETROIT, Oct. 31. (AP)—Two women school teachers were given prison terms today in federal court for their part in shielding 33-year-old Lloyd Chavis, former Pontiac football player and self-styled poet, from the draft during the war.

Opal Langhird Chavis, 36, former wife of the convicted draft dodger, was sentenced to six months and Jeanne Brown Foster, 27, Ann Arbor Junior High School teacher, to four months by Federal Judge Frank A. Picard.

Chavis is serving a three-year term for draft evasion.

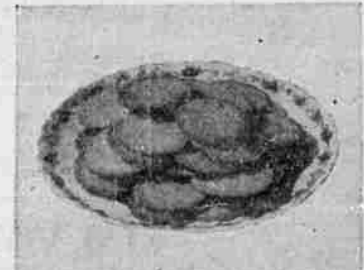
