Congestion in Schools Stressed

Showing by charts the percentage of increase in school enrollments in Roseburg during the past six years, Superintendent of Schools Paul S. Elliott yesterday told the Roseburg Kiwanis Club of the crowded conditions that exist in the local schools.

The number of pupils has increased 50 per cent, while the teaching staff has been augmented from 49 to 75, Elliott said.

The number of persons training for educational work has fallen "so low" on account of pay inadequacies, that a "very grave problem" is presented for the future, he declared.

Oregon is at a "serious disadvantage" in competing for teachers with Washington and California, where salaries are higher, he said, in making a strong plea for the Basic School Support Bill, which he described as "the only hope at present" for sufficient funds to meet the present situation.

Selective Timber Cutting Slated in Diamond Lake Area

New areas for lumbering in the Diamond Lake working circle are to be opened next spring to the selective cutting of an estimated annual yield of 24 million feet of timber. It was announced today by M. M. Nelson, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest.

The tract, which will be located in the Diamond Lake, 12 miles west of Diamond Lake, where there is an estimated 50 million feet of timber will be open to competitive bidding November 18.

Log haul from the Diamond Lake circle will be approximately 35 miles to the rail head at Chemult, Klamath County, on the Southern Pacific Cascade route.

Fredomant species in the timber sales will be Douglas fir, white pine and sugar pine.

All cutting will be well away from all recreation camps near Diamond Lake and the North Umpqua. Eight miles of the present Diamond Lake-North Umpqua road is being widened for log hauling. Wherever possible, recreationists and log trucks will be routed over different roads where this is not feasible, the road will be widened to eliminate danger.

Forest Ranger Joe Elliott will supervise the sales and the cutting of the trees near Diamond Lake.

Prof. George Adam Smith was addressing a group of students at the University of Edinburgh. The college term had just begun, and in front of the speaker were hundreds of boys from country homes, enjoying their first taste of independence and responsibility, and yet with a certain sense of fear. Dr. Smith used the words "As thy days thy strength shall be," and made this up for a sentence: "The strain will bring the strength." Our greatest discoveries have been made at the point of need. We needed more light and Edison gave us the incandescent lamp. We needed more speed, and the Wright brothers began experimenting with the airplane. The finest characters have been developed by strain. Recall David Livingstone in darkest Africa, "Anywhere, provided I have forward," or think of Madame Curie in the darkness of the shed seeing the light of radium. But there are conditions upon this strength. We must take our life from God, and seek to do His will, to rely upon Him for power. The dependence will bring assurance and confidence. We may be weak but God is strong and He will always meet the need. "The Lord is the strength of my life, of whom shall I be afraid?"

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Bridegroom-to-Be Dies In Flaming Plane Crash

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Oct. 30. — (AP) — A Wisconsin bridegroom-to-be was killed and his bride-to-be and the pilot were seriously injured when their small plane caught fire in flight and crash-landed at nearby Peterson Field Monday.

George W. Crouch, 51, Madison, Wis., was found dead 100 feet from the blazing wreckage. Chief Deputy Sheriff Warren H. Smith reported today Crouch was believed to have been dragged to death when he attempted to leap from the plane as it hit the ground.

Miss Betty Allen, 31, La Junta, Colo., who told a hospital attendant today she and Crouch had chartered the plane to fly to their wedding at Raton, N. M., suffered burns and other injuries. The pilot, burned and other hurt, was Octave A. Chanute, 24, Denver, descendant of an aviation pioneer.

aspires to be a movie producer, was honeymooning today with Kathleen Winsor, who hit the jackpot in her first literary try with "Forever Amber."

Their surprise marriage yesterday in Juarez, Mexico, caught Hollywood napping. Nobody even seemed to have known they were romancing. The film colony was unaware that Kathleen had obtained a divorce from Bob Herwig, former University of California football star who won a hero's citation as a Marine captain at Okinawa.

It was the fifth marriage for Artie, who at one time was regarded as the nation's top hot clarinet player. His first wife was a New York nurse; his second, Lana Turner; his third, Jerome Kern's daughter, Betty, and his fourth, Ava Gardner, who divorced him only last week on testimony that he belittled her when she talked and ridiculed her when she remained silent.
